The following House Files were introduced:

Franson and Hansen, R., introduced:

H. F. No. 3322, A bill for an act relating to taxation; proposing a plastic bottle excise tax; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 297H.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources Finance and Policy.

Franson introduced:

H. F. No. 3323, A bill for an act relating to transportation; establishing certain requirements on driver's license reciprocal agreements.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Transportation Finance and Policy.

Myers introduced:

H. F. No. 3324, A bill for an act relating to environment; establishing a rebate program to replace time-based ion exchange water softeners with demand-based ion exchange water softeners; appropriating money.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources Finance and Policy.

Pursell and Finke introduced:

H. F. No. 3325, A bill for an act relating to data practices; modifying certain data request and retention provisions; providing a fee waiver for certain data requests; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, sections 13.03, subdivision 3, by adding a subdivision; 13.08, subdivision 4; 13.17, subdivisions 1, 7.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Judiciary Finance and Civil Law.
