INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF HOUSE BILLS

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Health and Human Services Reform.

Freiberg, Carlson, Schomacker and Zerwas introduced:

H. F. No. 190, A bill for an act relating to human services; specifying the operating rate for a certain facility; amending Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 256B.441, by adding a subdivision.
