"Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 624.20, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

Subdivision 1. **Regulation.** (a) ~~As used in sections 624.20 to 624.25, the term "fireworks" means any substance or combination of substances or article prepared for the purpose of producing a visible or an audible effect by combustion, explosion, deflagration, or detonation, and includes blank cartridges, toy cannons, and toy canes in which explosives are used, the type of balloons which require fire underneath to propel them, firecrackers, torpedoes, skyrocketes, Roman candles, daygo bombs, sparklers other than those specified in paragraph (c), or other fireworks of like construction, and any fireworks containing any explosive or inflammable compound, or any tablets or other device containing any explosive substance and commonly used as fireworks.~~

~~(b) The term "fireworks" shall not include toy pistols, toy guns, in which paper caps containing 25/100 grains or less of explosive compound are used and toy pistol caps which contain less than 20/100 grains of explosive mixture.~~

~~(c) The term also does not include wire or wood sparklers of not more than 100 grams of mixture per item, other sparkling items which are nonexplosive and nonaerial and contain 75 grams or less of chemical mixture per tube or a total of 500 grams or less for multiple tubes, snakes and glow worms, smoke devices, or trick noisemakers which include paper streamers, party poppers, string poppers, snappers, and drop pops, each consisting of not more than twenty five hundredths grains of explosive mixture. The use of items listed in this paragraph is not permitted on public property. This paragraph does not authorize the purchase of items listed in it by persons younger than 18 years of age. The age of a purchaser of items listed in this paragraph must be verified by photographic identification.~~

(1) "aerial and audible devices" means fireworks in a finished state, suitable for use by the public, listed in APA 87-1, sections 3.1.2, 3.1.3, and 3.5, and containing 75 grams or less of chemical mixture per tube for a total of 500 grams or less for multiple tubes in a device;

(2) "APA 87-1" means the American Pyrotechnic Association Standard 87-1 from the Standard for Construction and Approval for Transportation of Fireworks, Novelties, and Theatrical Pyrotechnics, 2001 Edition;

(3) "display fireworks" means firework devices in a finished state, exclusive of mere ornamentation, primarily intended for commercial displays that are designed to produce visible effects, audible effects, or both, by combustion, deflagration, or detonation. The term includes, but is not limited to, salutes containing more than 130 milligrams of explosive composition, aerial shells containing more than 40 grams of chemical composition exclusive of light charge, and other exhibition display items that exceed the limits contained in APA 87-1 for aerial and audible devices;

(4) "fireworks" means any device, other than sparkling devices, novelties, aerial and audible devices, or theatrical pyrotechnic articles that are intended to produce visible effects, audible effects, or both, by combustion, deflagration, or detonation. The term includes display fireworks;

(5) "novelties" means devices containing small amounts of pyrotechnic composition that is listed in APA 87-1, sections 3.2, 3.3, and 3.4. The term includes deregulated sparklers, snakes and glow worms, smoke devices, and trick noisemakers, including paper streamers, party poppers, string poppers, snappers, drop pops, each consisting of not more than 25/100 grains of explosive mixture; toy pistols, toy guns, in which paper caps containing 25/100 grains or less of explosive compound are used; and toy pistol caps that contain less than 20/100 grains of explosive mixture; and

(6) "sparkling devices" means ground-based or handheld devices that produce a shower of sparks that are listed in APA 87-1, sections 3.1.1 and 3.5. The term includes fountains, torches, wheels, ground spinners, flutter sparklers, toy smoke devices, and sparklers.

(b) Nothing in sections 624.20 to 624.25 authorizes the possession or use of novelties, sparkling devices, or aerial and audible devices on public property or the purchase of these items by persons younger than 18 years of age. A person selling novelties, sparkling devices, or aerial and audible devices shall verify the age of a purchaser by photographic identification.

~~(d)~~ (c) A local unit of government may impose an annual license fee for the retail sale of ~~items authorized under paragraph (e)~~ novelties and aerial and audible devices. The annual license fee of each retail seller that is in the business of selling only ~~the items authorized under paragraph (e)~~ novelties or aerial and audible devices, or both, may not exceed \$350 for a single retail location, and the annual license of each other retail seller may not exceed \$100. A local unit of government may assess a fee, not to exceed \$100, to a licensee for each additional retail location that the licensee operates. A license application must be made before June 1 of each year and must require, at a minimum, the location of each retail location the licensee intends to operate. The local fire marshal shall, within seven days after the receipt of an application for a license, either issue the license or notify the applicant of the denial of the license. A licensee must display the license issued pursuant to this paragraph at each point of sale operated by the licensee. A license issued under this paragraph expires May 31 of the year following the year of issuance. A local unit of government may not:

(1) impose any fee or charge, other than the fee authorized by this paragraph, on the wholesale or retail sale of ~~items authorized under paragraph (e)~~ novelties and aerial and audible devices;

(2) prohibit or restrict the sale or display of ~~items for~~ sparkling devices, novelties, or aerial and audible devices from any permanent or temporary ~~retail sale authorized under paragraph (e)~~ structure that ~~comply~~ complies with National Fire Protection Association Standard 1124 (~~2003~~ 2006 edition); or

(3) impose on a retail seller any financial guarantee requirements, including bonding or insurance provisions, containing restrictions or conditions not imposed on the same basis on all other business licensees; or

(4) enact any ordinance, rule, or regulation that prohibits, limits, or restricts the wholesale or retail sale of sparkling devices or novelties.

(d) This section does not preempt a town or home rule charter or statutory city from enacting and enforcing ordinances under the city charter or chapter 365, 368, 412, or 462, that regulate the conditions of sale or use for aerial and audible devices and display fireworks.

(e) For the purposes of regulating the conditions of sale or use for aerial and audible devices, display fireworks, sparkling devices, and novelties, a county has the same authority and power granted to a statutory city by paragraph (d) and chapter 412. If a home rule charter or statutory city or town has enacted an ordinance, rule, or regulation under paragraph (d), that ordinance, rule, or regulation prevails within the city or town.

(f) Aerial and audible devices may only be sold in the state from June 1 to July 10 of any year.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective June 1, 2016."

"ARTICLE 1  
IRON ORE MINING

Section 1. **IRON ORE MINING AND RELATED INDUSTRY EXTENDED UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS PROGRAM.**

Subdivision 1. **Availability of extended benefits.** Extended unemployment benefits are available from the Minnesota unemployment insurance trust fund to an applicant who was laid off due to lack of work after March 1, 2015, from:

(1) an iron ore mining industry employer; or

(2) an employer providing goods or services to an iron ore mining industry employer if the applicant was laid off due to the cessation or substantial reduction in operations of an iron ore mining industry employer.

**Subd. 2. Eligibility requirements.** An applicant is eligible to receive extended unemployment benefits under this section for any week through the week ending June 25, 2017, if:

(1) the applicant established a benefit account under Minnesota Statutes, section 268.07, with a majority of the wage credits from an iron ore mining industry employer or an employer providing goods or services to iron ore mining industry employers, and has exhausted the maximum amount of regular unemployment benefits available on that benefit account; and

(2) the applicant meets the same requirements that an applicant for regular unemployment benefits must meet under Minnesota Statutes, section 268.069, subdivision 1.

**Subd. 3. Weekly and maximum amount of extended unemployment benefits.** (a) The weekly benefit amount of extended unemployment benefits is the same as the weekly benefit amount of regular unemployment benefits on the benefit account established in subdivision 2, clause (1).

(b) The maximum amount of extended unemployment benefits available to an applicant under this section is an amount equal to 26 weeks of payment at the applicant's weekly extended unemployment benefit amount.

(c) If an applicant qualifies for a new regular benefit account that meets the requirements of subdivision 4, paragraph (b), before the applicant has been paid extended unemployment benefits, and that new regular benefit account meets the requirements of subdivision 2, clause (1), the applicant's weekly extended unemployment benefit amount is equal to the weekly unemployment benefit amount on the applicant's new regular benefit account.

**Subd. 4. Qualifying for a new regular benefit account.** (a) If after exhausting the maximum amount of regular unemployment benefits available as a result of the layoff under subdivision 1, an applicant qualifies for the new regular benefit account under Minnesota Statutes, section 268.07, the applicant must apply for and establish that new regular benefit account.

(b) If the applicant's weekly benefit amount under the new regular benefit account is equal to or higher than the applicant's weekly extended unemployment benefit amount, the applicant must request unemployment benefits under the new regular benefit account. An applicant is ineligible for extended unemployment benefits under this section until the applicant has exhausted the maximum amount of unemployment benefits available on the new regular benefit account.

(c) If the applicant's weekly unemployment benefit amount on the new regular benefit account is less than the applicant's weekly benefit amount of extended unemployment benefits, the applicant must request extended unemployment benefits. An applicant is ineligible for new regular unemployment benefits until the applicant has exhausted the maximum amount of extended unemployment benefits available under this section.

**Subd. 5. Charging of benefits.** Extended unemployment benefits paid under this section may not be used to compute the future unemployment tax rate of a taxpaying employer nor charged to the reimbursing account of government or nonprofit employers.

**Subd. 6. Eligibility for federal Trade Readjustment Allowance benefits.** An applicant who has applied and been determined eligible for federal Trade Readjustment Allowance benefits is not eligible for extended unemployment benefits under this section.

Subd. 7. **Legislative findings.** (a) The legislature finds that the state greatly benefits from the diversification of the state's mineral economy through long-term support of mineral exploration, evaluation, environmental research, development, production, and commercialization.

(b) The legislature further finds that maintaining and supporting a trained and skillful mining workforce is critical to the long-term health and viability of the state's mineral economy.

(c) The legislature finds that the best way to maintain a trained and skillful mining workforce in the state is to make all reasonable efforts to facilitate the continued operation of existing mines and the addition of new mines whenever feasible.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective retroactively from August 31, 2015."

Page 3, delete article 2 and insert:

"ARTICLE 2  
UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 268.051, is amended by adding a subdivision to read:

Subd. 2a. **Unemployment insurance tax limits.** (a) If the balance in the trust fund on December 31 of any calendar year is four percent or more above the amount equal to an average high cost multiple of 1.0, future unemployment taxes payable must be reduced by all amounts above 1.0. The amount of tax reduction for any taxpaying employer is the same percentage of the total amount above 1.0 as the percentage of taxes paid by the employer during the calendar year is of the total amount of taxes that were paid by all nonmaximum experience rated employers during the year.

(b) For purposes of this subdivision, "average high cost multiple" has the meaning given in Code of Federal Regulations, title 20, section 606.3, as amended through the effective date of this section. An amount equal to an average high cost multiple of 1.0 is a federal measure of adequate reserves in relation to the state's current economy. The commissioner must calculate and publish, as soon as possible following December 31 of any calendar year, the trust fund balance on December 31 along with the amount an average high cost multiple of 1.0 equals. Actual wages paid must be used in the calculation and estimates may not be used.

(c) This subdivision does not apply to employers that were at the maximum experience rating for the year, nor to high experience rating industry employers under subdivision 5, paragraph (b). Computations under paragraph (a) are not subject to the rounding requirement of section 268.034. The refund provisions of section 268.057, subdivision 7, do not apply.

(d) The unemployment tax reduction under this subdivision applies to taxes paid between March 1 and December 15 of the year following the December 31 computation under paragraph (a).

(e) The amount equal to the average high cost multiple of 1.0 on December 31, 2012, must be used for the calculation under paragraph (a) but only for the calculation made on December 31, 2015. Notwithstanding paragraph (d), the tax reduction resulting from the application of this paragraph applies to unemployment taxes paid between July 1, 2016, and June 30, 2017.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective retroactively from December 31, 2015."

## ARTICLE 2 UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 268.051, is amended by adding a subdivision to read:

Subd. 2a. **Unemployment insurance tax limits.** (a) If the balance in the trust fund on December 31 of any calendar year is four percent or more above the amount equal to an average high cost multiple of 1.0, future unemployment taxes payable must be reduced by all amounts above 1.0. The amount of tax reduction for any taxpaying employer is the same percentage of the total amount above 1.0 as the percentage of taxes paid by the employer during the calendar year is of the total amount of taxes that were paid by all nonmaximum experience rated employers during the year.

(b) For purposes of this subdivision, "average high cost multiple" has the meaning given in Code of Federal Regulations, title 20, section 606.3, as amended through the effective date of this section. An amount equal to an average high cost multiple of 1.0 is a federal measure of adequate reserves in relation to the state's current economy. The commissioner must calculate and publish, as soon as possible following December 31 of any calendar year, the trust fund balance on December 31 along with the amount an average high cost multiple of 1.0 equals. Actual wages paid must be used in the calculation and estimates may not be used.

(c) This subdivision does not apply to employers that were at the maximum experience rating for the year, nor to high experience rating industry employers under subdivision 5, paragraph (b). Computations under paragraph (a) are not subject to the rounding requirement of section 268.034. The refund provisions of section 268.057, subdivision 7, do not apply.

(d) The unemployment tax reduction under this subdivision applies to taxes paid between March 1 and December 15 of the year following the December 31 computation under paragraph (a).

(e) The amount equal to the average high cost multiple of 1.0 on December 31, 2012, must be used for the calculation under paragraph (a) but only for the calculation made on December 31, 2015. Notwithstanding paragraph (d), the tax reduction resulting from the application of this paragraph applies to unemployment taxes paid between July 1, 2016, and June 30, 2017.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective retroactively from December 31, 2015."
