INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF HOUSE BILLS

The following House Files were introduced:

Dippel introduced:

H. F. No. 3319, A bill for an act relating to employment; requiring a job accommodation request form for an employee with a known disability; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 363A.08, subdivision 6.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Workforce, Labor, and Economic Development Finance and Policy.

Feist introduced:

H. F. No. 3320, A bill for an act relating to transportation and tourism; establishing statewide moratorium on new billboards; declaring existing billboards nonconforming uses; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 462.357, subdivision 1c; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 173.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Transportation Finance and Policy.

Liebling and Scott introduced:

H. F. No. 3321, A bill for an act relating to legislative enactments; correcting miscellaneous oversights, inconsistencies, ambiguities, unintended results, and technical errors; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 17.354.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration.
