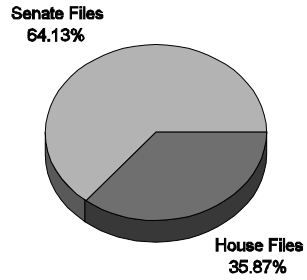

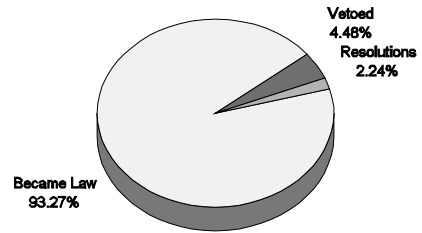

Bills to Governor

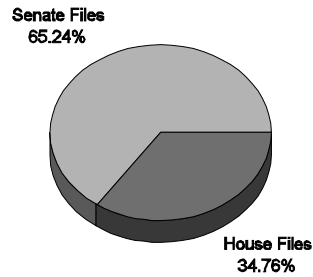


Disposition of Bills

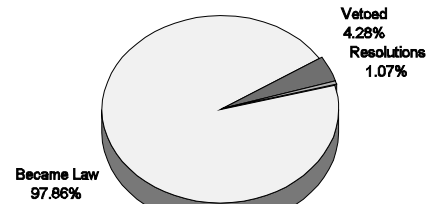
