


### Supervision in Minnesota is centered on local choice and allowing local solutions.

Minnesota has three probation delivery systems, each funded differently:

- Community Corrections Act (CCA)
   Services administered by counties.
- County Probation Officer (CPO)
   Services administered by a combination of county/state.
- Department of Corrections (DOC)
   Services administered entirely by the state via contract.

#### **Correctional Delivery Systems**

of July 2021



Counties supervise most probation cases in Minnesota.

11% CCA 71%

Counties = 82%

DOC 18%

**State= 18%** 

Minnesota relies heavily on supervision to keep communities safe.

Prison 13%

Supervision 87%

122,000 people were incarcerated, on probation or supervised release statewide in 2019.

# In 2020, Minnesota spent the lowest proportion of state general funds on corrections.



## Why Is The Way We Fund Supervision a Problem?

Hard to understand.


Puts DOC and Legislature in difficult position.

Legislators often don't understand they are not funding counties because the funding is presented as part of DOC's budget.

Increases for DOC staff do not pass through to counties.

#### Historic Collaboration by Minnesota's Supervision Experts

Council Membership: 15 people

The Delivery Systems Working Group met eight (8) times between September 2021 and January 2022.

The Council met four (4) times between January 2022 and February 2022.

The Council of State Governments
Justice Center held 244 meetings
with people across Minnesota
between August 1, 2021 - present to
ensure that the proposal is
responsive to the needs of
Minnesota.

#### Three Recommendations:

Create a Supervision
Standards
Committee made up
of key experts to
develop consistent
supervision levels
and guide the
permanent funding
formula into the
future.

Identify a permanent, transparent funding formula that is consistent for each county based on a perdiem model.

Add tribal governments to policy and finance changes.

Complete Workload Study through the temporary collaborative committee
