

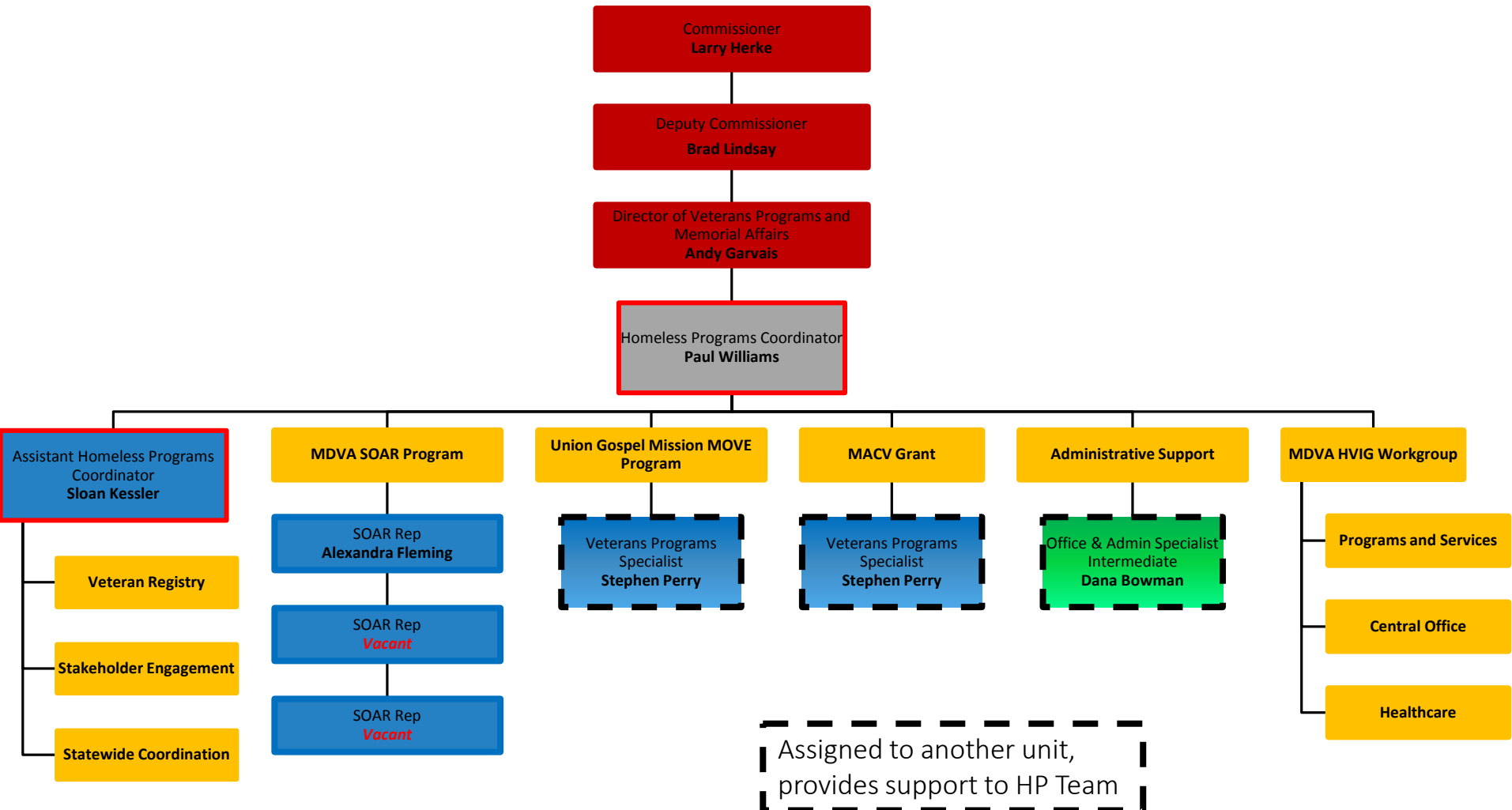

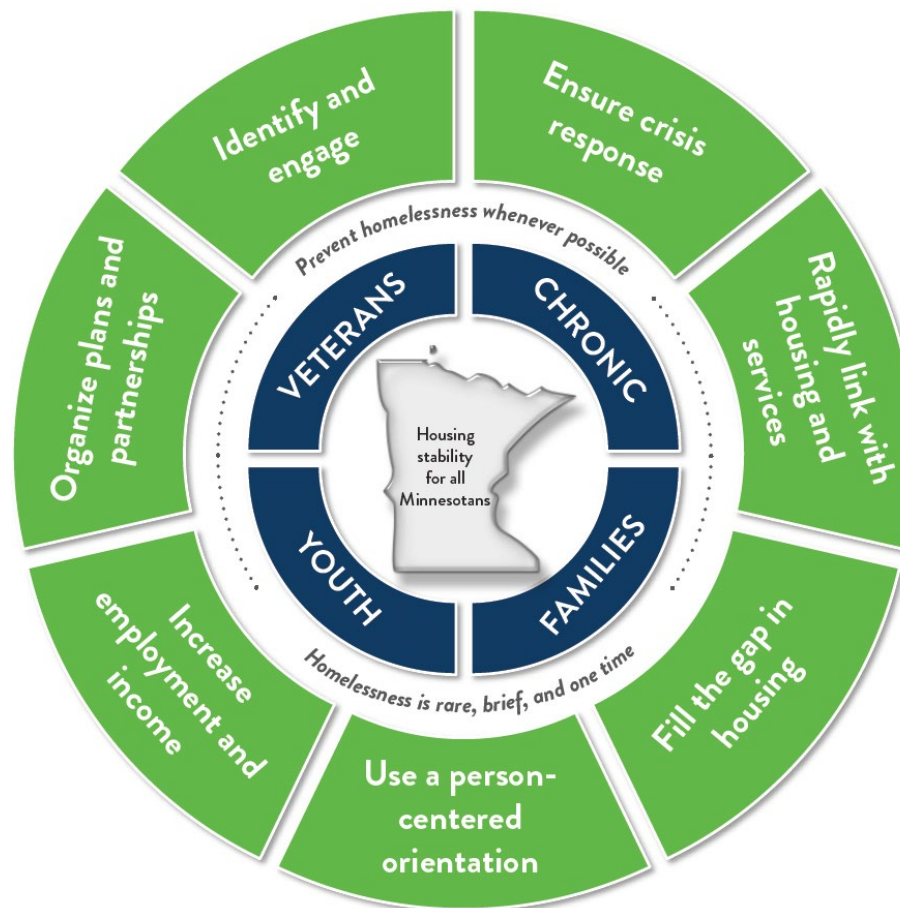


# Homeless Programs Org Structure

# Homeless Veteran Registry

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- Forming strong partnerships across the entire state with a myriad of different organizations and individuals
- Created and maintain a Homeless Veterans Registry (by name list)
- Prior to the Registry
  - Homeless Veterans were being identified by multiple agencies leading to an inability to accurately identify inflow
  - There wasn't a good way to track our success rate – at a community level
    - Unknown amount of overlap between Veterans being served by multiple providers
- Meetings are designed so that every Veteran on the Registry receives 2-3 minutes of discussion
- Ultimate plan of these meetings:  
To ensure that EVERY Veteran on the Registry has a community provider that is following up/assisting with a housing plan.

# Homeless Veteran Registry: Registry 2.0

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- Second version of the Homeless Veteran Registry
- Improvement to existing functionality to increase performance and improve user experience with the HVR “Landing Page” and Housing Team Meeting forms
- Implementation of client-side SharePoint development tool to support existing functionality within the Homeless Veteran Registry platform
- Implementation of business analytics tool to create an external facing dashboard of aggregated data
- We have started ramping up the project this week and working closely (Agile mindset) with MN.IT to complete the Registry 2.0 project
- We expect an April 2019 release for the Registry 2.0





# Stakeholder Engagement: Built For Zero.

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- Built For Zero is a national change effort working to help a core group of committed communities end Veteran and chronic homelessness.
- The Hennepin Team (including MDVA, VA, and MACV) are utilizing a new community coach who has experiencing ending homelessness in the Los Angeles area and is familiar with the complexities of homelessness in large metropolitan areas.
- Tracking progress against monthly goals
- Accelerating the spread of proven strategies

# Stakeholder Engagement: 1-On-1 with Continuums of Care

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- MDVA has been meeting with CoCs which have yet to declare and end to Veteran homelessness
  - Updating them on current Registry numbers within their CoC
  - Identifying barriers to ending Veteran homelessness
  - Strategizing solutions for overcoming barriers
- For CoCs that are close to reaching the federal benchmarks for declaring, MDVA works closely with these CoCs to prepare their submission of evidence to the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH)
  - Southeast CoC (20 counties)



# MDVA Veteran SOAR Program

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- Launched on March 31, 2016 with key partners (DHS and SSA)
- A Program designed to help MN Veterans who are homeless or at-risk and have a severe impairment apply for Social Security Disability benefits
- Why?
  - The path to recovery is challenging when basic needs are unmet
  - SSI/SSDI application process is complicated
  - There is a disconnect between the experience of homelessness and the disability application process
- SOAR Representatives help Veterans navigate application process
  - Forms
  - Dates and deadlines
  - Maintain contact



# MDVA Veteran SOAR Program

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## ➤ **Benefits to Veterans:**

- Sustained income: Veterans can receive Social Security Disability in conjunction with—or as an alternative to—VA disability benefits
- Health insurance: Veterans can use the Medicaid and Medicare health benefits that come with SSI/SSDI to supplement VA health services

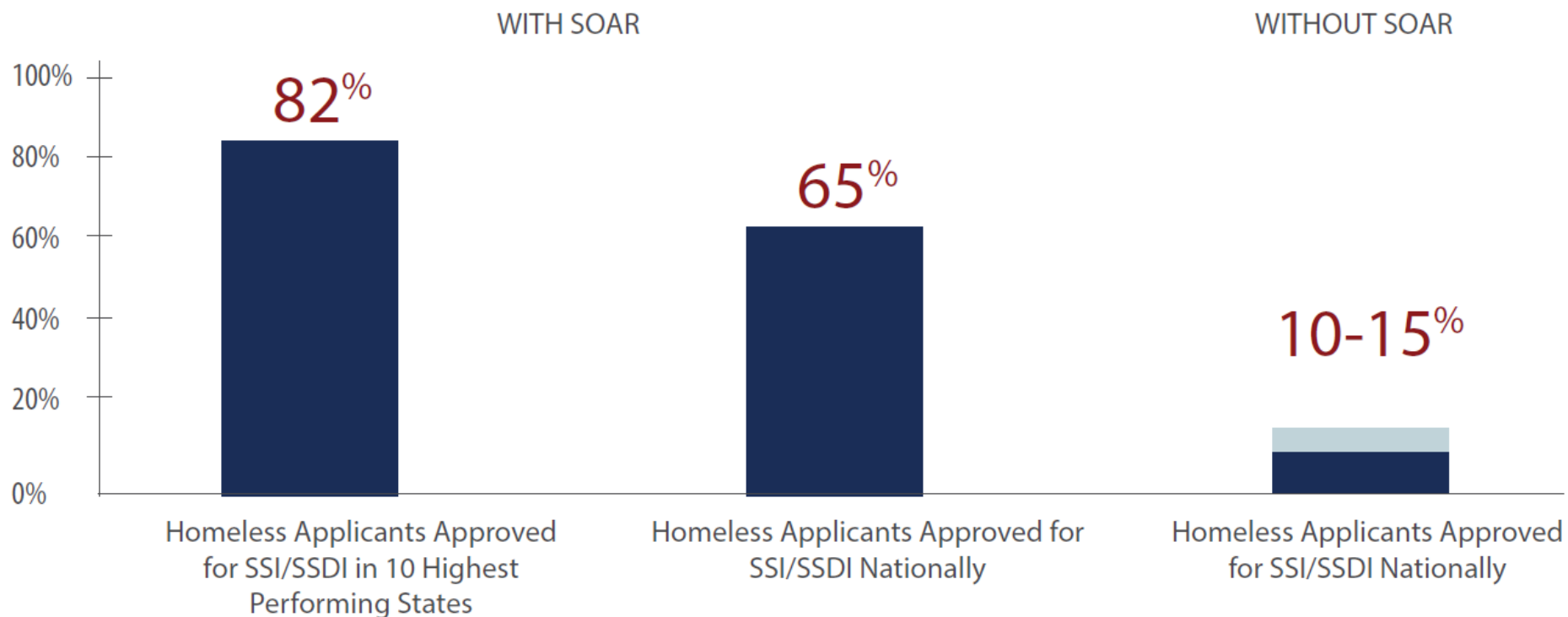
## ➤ **Benefits to State:**

- Reduced reliability on state funded assistance
- Economic impact in state and local communities
- Increases ability for individuals to remain or enter into community living

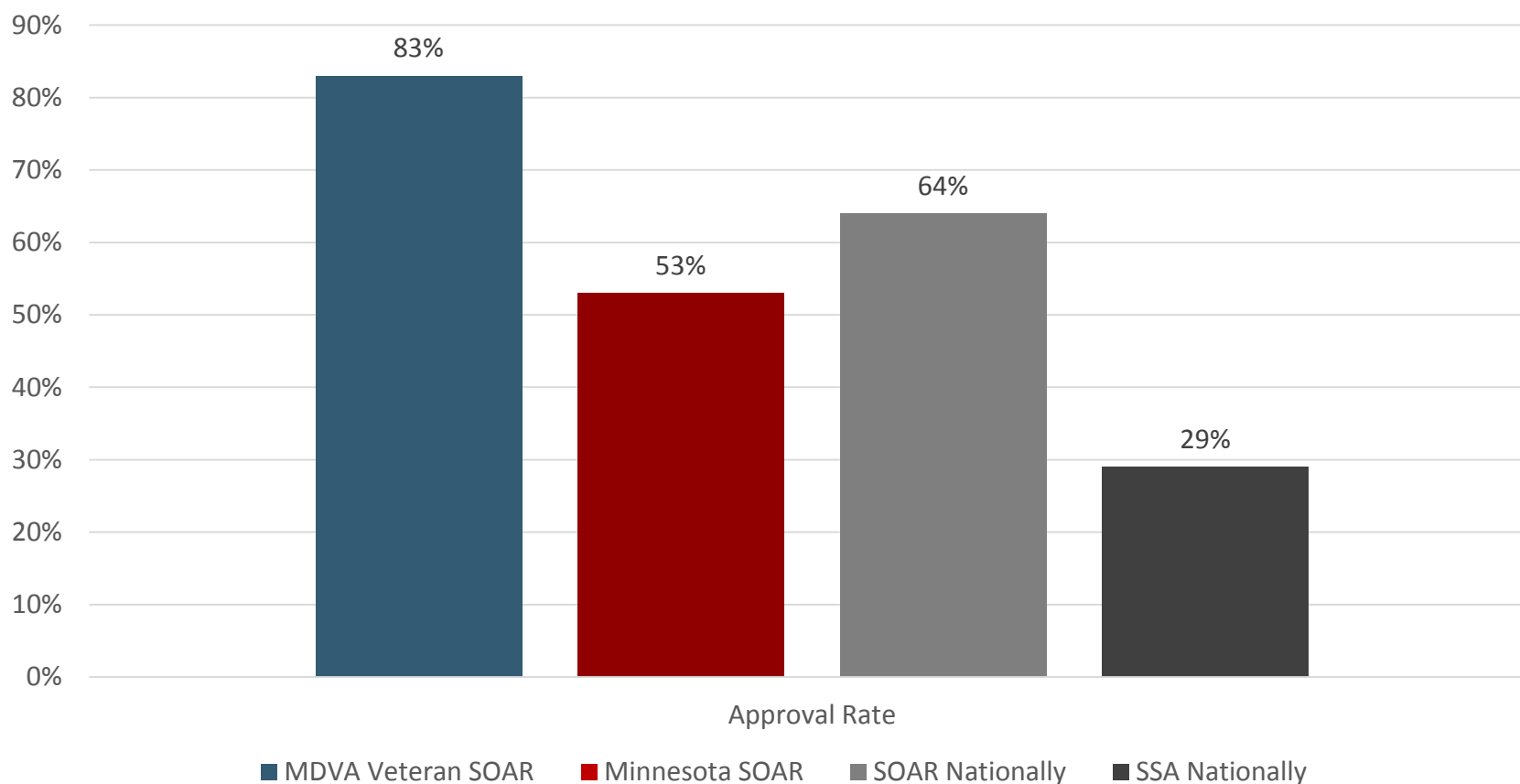

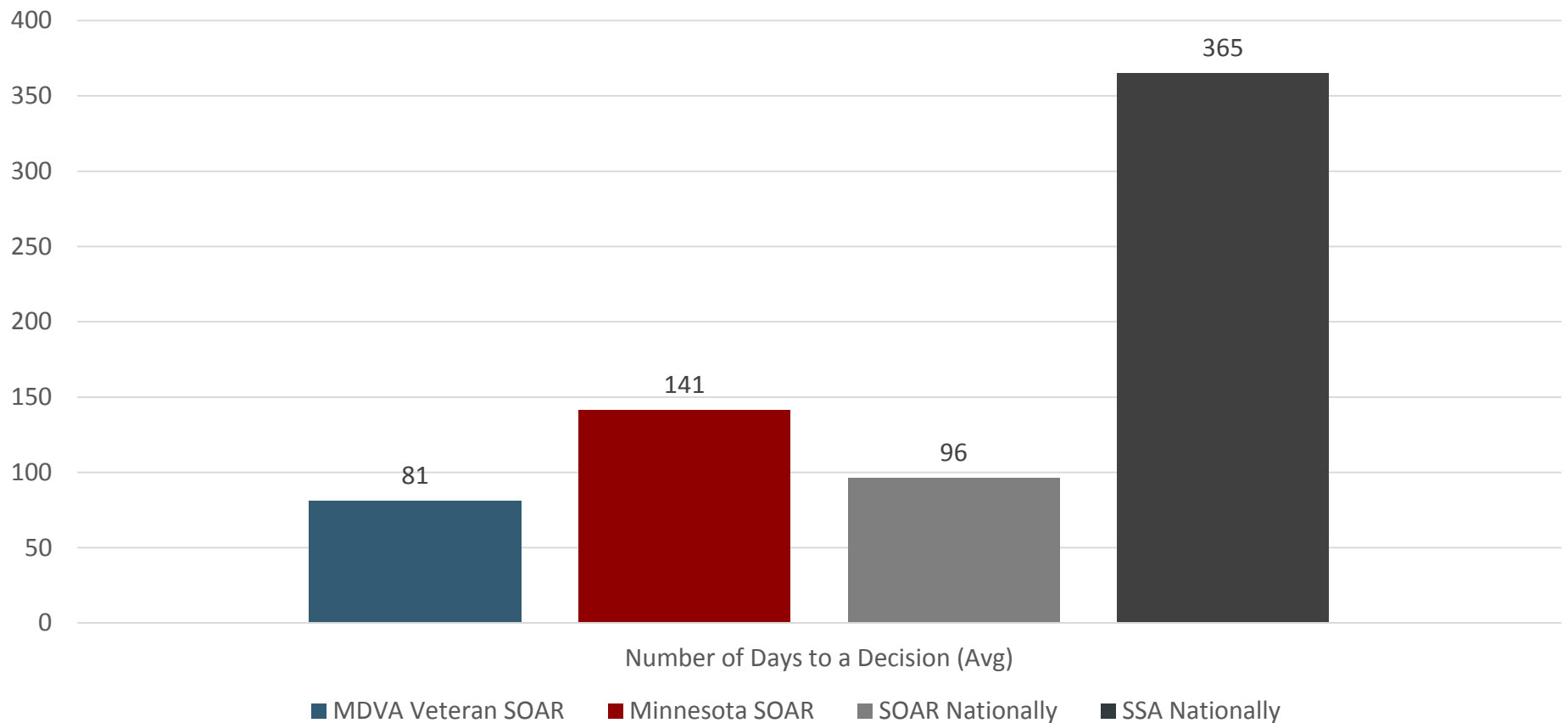
SOAR Initial Applications (FY17)

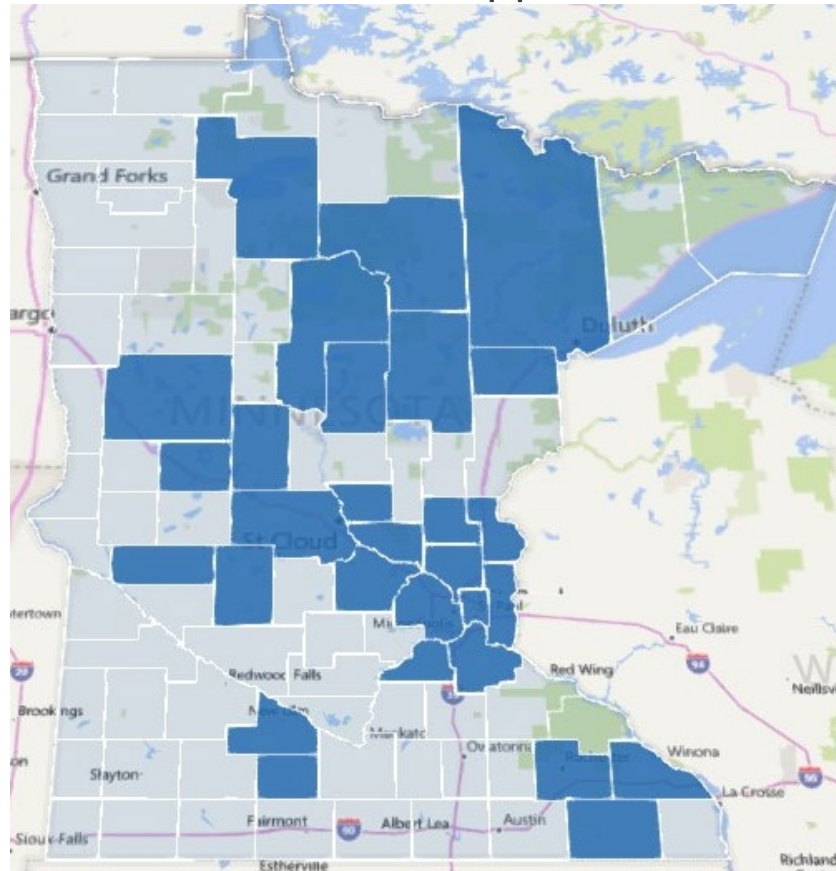
Average Number of Days to Initial Decision (FY17)

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Counties with MDVA SOAR Applications: 30 Counties

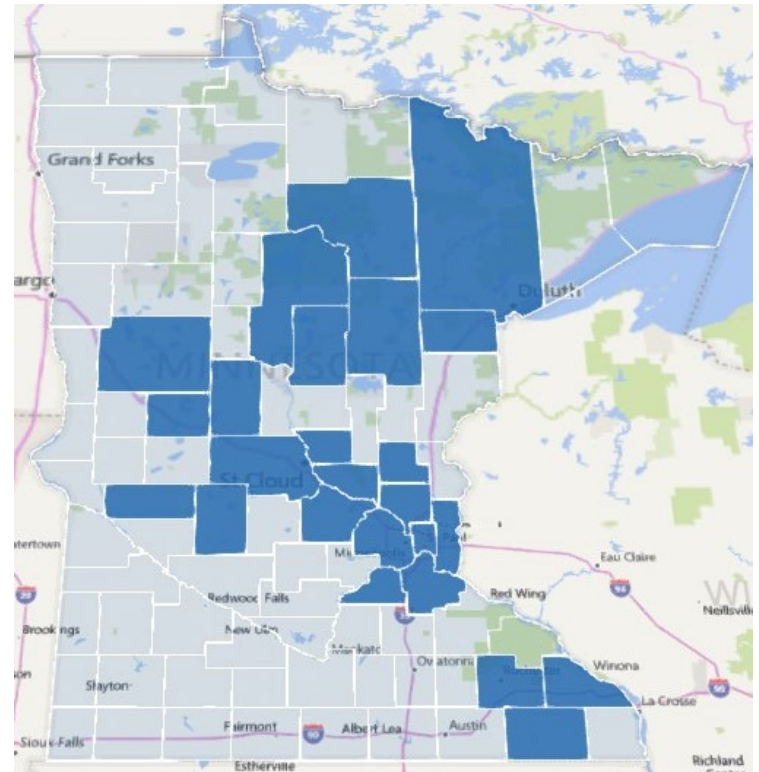
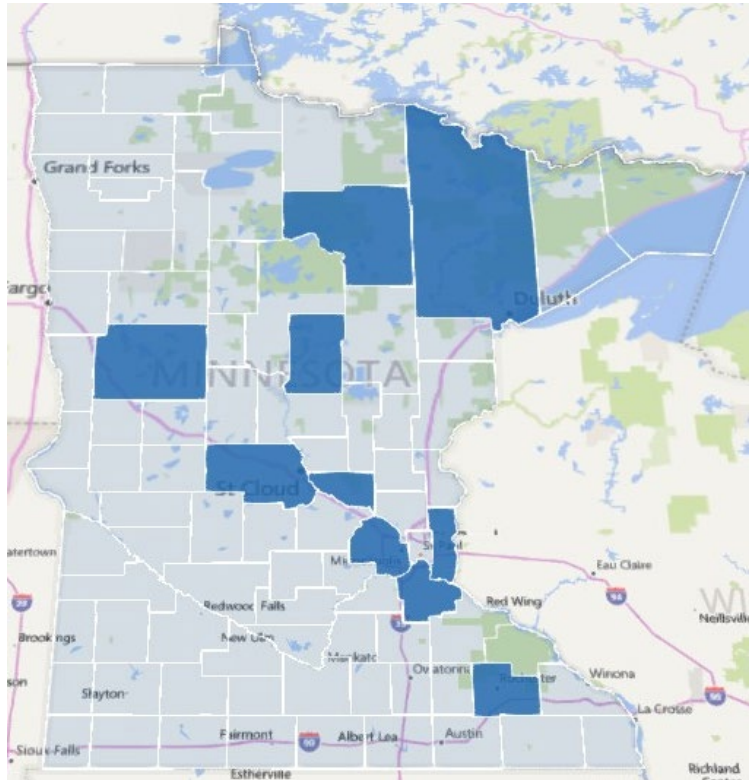

# Homeless Programs: Outcomes

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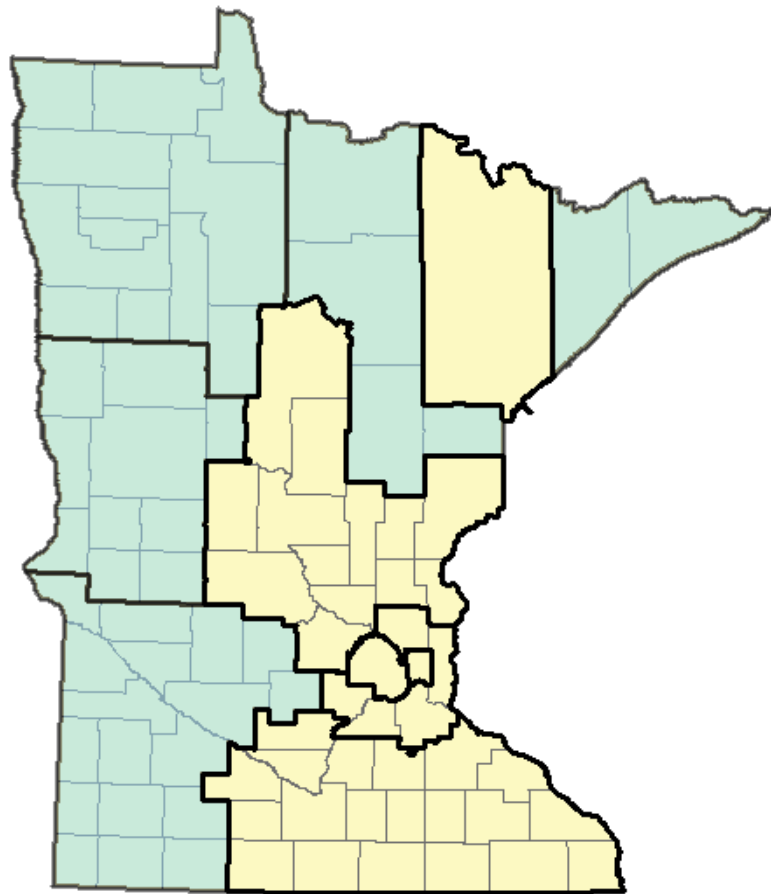
- As a state, we have stably housed over **1,668** previously homeless Veterans since the Registry kicked off in December 2014
- Since 2010, there has been a 53.3% reduction in homelessness among Veterans in Minnesota compared to a 48.9% reduction nationally (2010-2018 PIT Count Data).





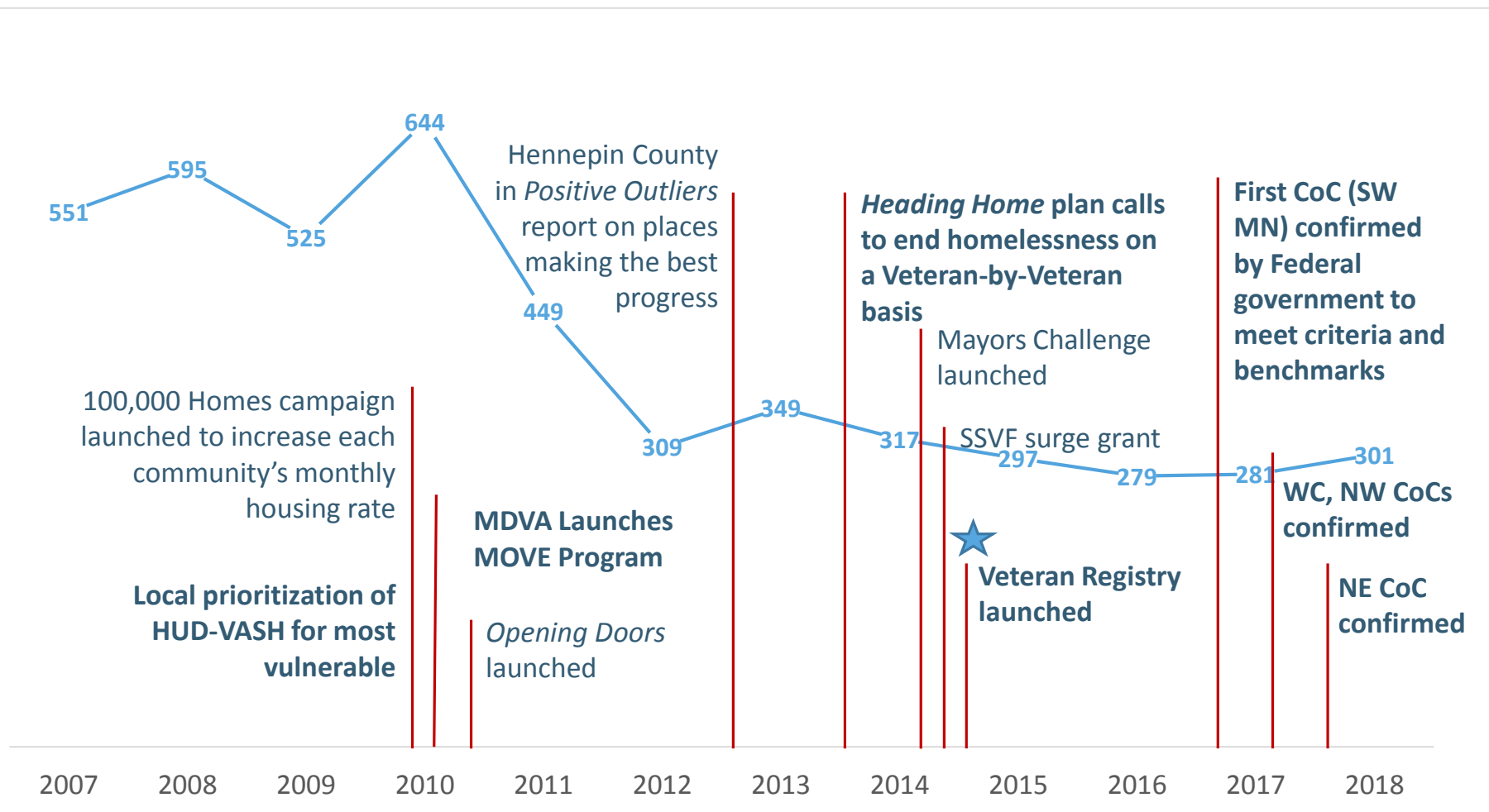

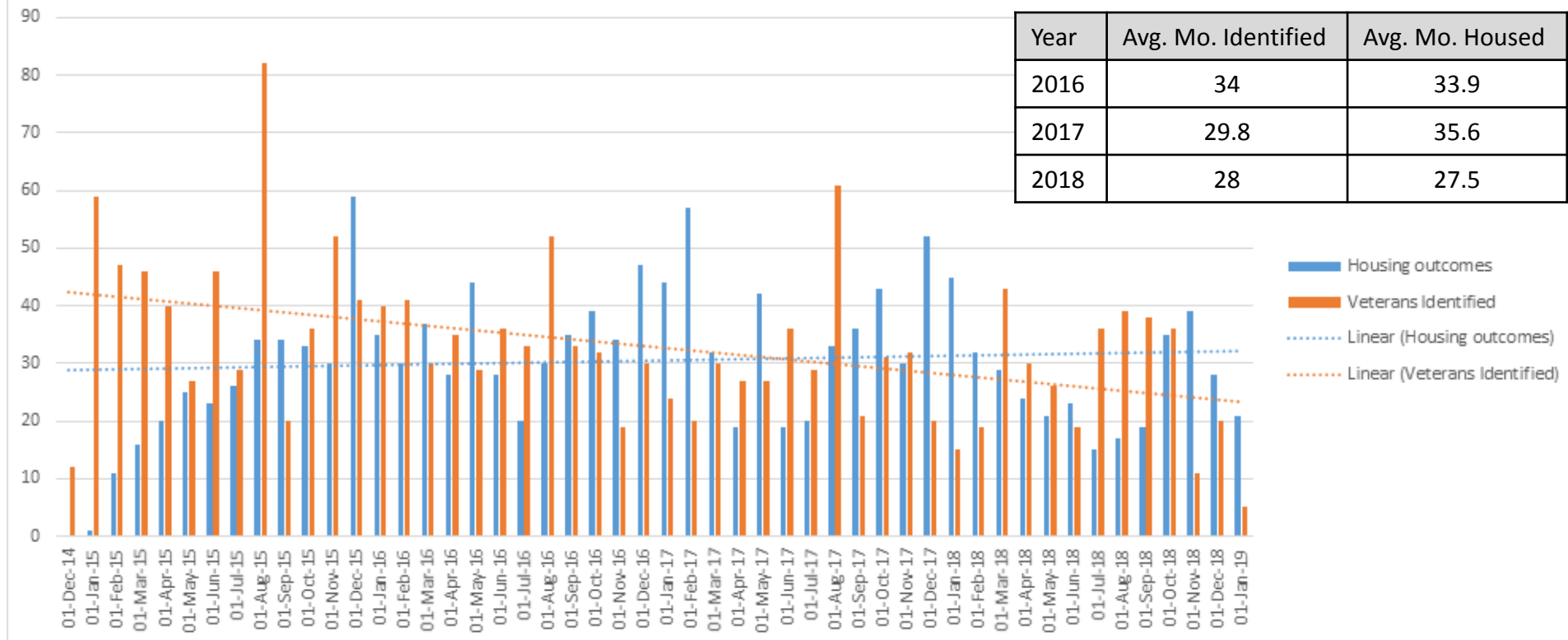
**NOTE:** The CoCs highlighted in GREEN have declared an end to Veteran Homelessness and have systems in place to assist Veterans experiencing homelessness so that an episode of homelessness is rare, brief, and non-recurring. Additionally, the NOT REVIEWED status includes those in Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, and Unsheltered/Outdoors.

# Top Barriers for Remaining Veterans

1. Availability of Housing Units:
  1. Rental vacancy rate
  2. Increasing rent amounts (sometimes over what subsidies can pay)
  3. Stricter screening criteria
  4. New developments not aligned with what the homeless population needs
2. High Barrier Veterans:
  1. Substance use disorders, mental health, criminal history, and poor rental history
  2. Case Manager/Street Outreach Worker high caseloads
  3. Supportive services are not seamless: Do we need “Safe Havens”?
3. Landlord Engagement/Support:
  1. 24/7 support, one phone number, one person
  2. Risk mitigation funds
  3. Need to engage better/more with landlords, property managers, developers, and local elected officials



# Legislative Opportunities

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1. **GOVERNMENT DATA PRACTICES ACT, Minn. Stat. § 13 (2018):** Classifying data regarding homeless individuals as an urgent and emergent issue related to housing as a subcategory of current government data practice law would greatly enhance our ability to ensure that every homeless individual is being identified. Additionally, it would reduce overlap in services and improve our confidence in data surrounding homeless individuals across the state. The United States Department of Veterans Affairs adopted a similar rule change in 2018—Routine Use 30—to allow information related to homelessness to be shared across agencies and partners resulting in increased coordination of homelessness response systems nationwide.
2. **Engage with Minnesota Housing and the State Director to Prevent and End Homelessness on opportunities for more affordable housing:** Minnesota needs more housing, especially at lower-income levels, in a market that is primarily private.
