1.11 available for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, or June 30, 2025, respectively. "The first
1.12 year" is fiscal year 2024. "The second year" is fiscal year 2025. "The biennium" is fiscal
1.13 years 2024 and 2025.

7.13 **Sec. 19. APPROPRIATION AND BASE REDUCTIONS.**

7.14 (a) The commissioner of management and budget must reduce general fund appropriations
7.15 to the commissioner of corrections by \$165,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$368,000 in fiscal
7.16 year 2025. The commissioner must reduce the base for general fund appropriations to the
7.17 commissioner of corrections by \$460,000 in fiscal year 2026 and \$503,000 in fiscal year
7.18 2027.

7.19 (b) The commissioner of management and budget must reduce general fund appropriations
7.20 to the commissioner of health by \$260,000 in fiscal year 2025 for administration of the
7.21 medical cannabis program. The commissioner must reduce the base for general fund
7.22 appropriations to the commissioner of health by \$781,000 in fiscal year 2026 and each fiscal
7.23 year thereafter.

7.24 (c) The commissioner of management and budget must reduce state government special
7.25 revenue fund appropriations to the commissioner of health by \$1,141,000 in fiscal year
7.26 2025 for administration of the medical cannabis program. The commissioner must reduce
7.27 the base for state government special revenue fund appropriations to the commissioner of
7.28 health by \$3,424,000 in fiscal year 2026 and each fiscal year thereafter.

7.29 **Sec. 20. TRANSFERS.**

7.30 (a) \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2025 are transferred
7.31 from the general fund to the dual training account in the special revenue fund under
7.32 Minnesota Statutes, section 136A.246, subdivision 10, for grants to employers in the legal
7.33 cannabis industry. The base for this transfer is \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2026 and each fiscal

8.1 year thereafter. The commissioner may use up to six percent of the amount transferred for
8.2 administrative costs. The commissioner shall give priority to applications from employers
8.3 who are, or who are training employees who are, eligible to be social equity applicants
8.4 under Minnesota Statutes, section 342.17. After June 30, 2025, any unencumbered balance
8.5 from this transfer may be used for grants to any eligible employer under Minnesota Statutes,
8.6 section 136A.246.

8.7 (b) \$5,500,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$5,500,000 in fiscal year 2025 are transferred
8.8 from the general fund to the substance use treatment, recovery, and prevention grant account
8.9 established under Minnesota Statutes, section 342.72. The base for this transfer is \$5,500,000
8.10 in fiscal year 2026 and each fiscal year thereafter.

8.11 **Sec. 21. OFFICE OF CANNABIS MANAGEMENT; IMPLEMENTATION.**

8.12 (a) \$3,000,000 in fiscal year 2023 is appropriated from the general fund to the
8.13 commissioner of agriculture for the planning, research, analysis, and other efforts needed
8.14 to establish the Office of Cannabis Management and transition programs, authorities, and
8.15 responsibilities contained in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 342, to that office. This is a onetime
8.16 appropriation and is available until June 30, 2025.

8.17 (b) Upon the effective date of this act, the commissioner of agriculture may exercise all
8.18 authorities and responsibilities granted to the Office of Cannabis Management under
8.19 Minnesota Statutes, chapter 342, that are necessary to establish the Office of Cannabis
8.20 Management and transition programs, authorities, and responsibilities to that office.

8.21 (c) On or after January 1, 2024, and at such time the Office of Cannabis Management
8.22 is able to fulfill the powers and duties enumerated in Minnesota Statutes, section 342.02,
8.23 subdivision 2, the commissioner of agriculture may transfer all or some Minnesota Statutes,
8.24 chapter 342, programs, authorities, and responsibilities to the Office of Cannabis
8.25 Management. Upon such transfer, existing contracts, obligations, and funds managed by
8.26 the commissioner of agriculture that are necessary to administer the transferred programs,
8.27 authorities, or responsibilities shall be transferred to the Office of Cannabis Management.

8.28 (d) To the extent practicable, the commissioner of agriculture and the Office of Cannabis
8.29 Management must comply with Minnesota Statutes, chapter 16C. The commissioner of
8.30 administration may waive application of any provision of Minnesota Statutes, chapter 16C
8.31 on a case-by-case basis, if the commissioner of agriculture or the Office of Cannabis
8.32 Management demonstrates that full compliance with that chapter would be impractical given
8.33 the effective date or other deadlines established by this act. This exemption expires on July
8.34 1, 2025.

9.1 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

9.2 Sec. 22. **APPROPRIATION; DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY; BUREAU OF**
9.3 **CRIMINAL APPREHENSION .**

9.4 \$6,656,000 in fiscal year 2023 is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner
9.5 of public safety for the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension to identify and provide records
9.6 of convictions for certain offenses involving the possession of cannabis that may be eligible
9.7 for expungement and resentencing; for forensic science services including additional staff,
9.8 equipment, and supplies; and for investigation of diversion crimes. This is a onetime
9.9 appropriation and is available until June 30, 2025.

9.10 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment."
