
Transforming Lives



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
Ecotone Impact Value Map

This prospectus outlines the social value created by Better Futures Minnesota. The goal of this document is to communicate the cost-benefit ratio of this organization's programming that goes above and beyond traditional financial returns.



THE SOCIAL PROBLEM

One in four Minnesotans have a criminal record. The existence of such a record, regardless of its age, relevance, or accuracy, prevents individuals from accessing the fundamental aspects of a productive life: employment, housing, credit, and education. The widespread exclusion of individuals with records undermines the notion of rehabilitation; drains local economies; generates unprecedented recidivism rates; and disproportionately impacts nonwhite communities.

THE IMPACT OF THIS ORGANIZATION

Better Futures Minnesota

The mission of Better Futures Minnesota (BFM) is to fuel and guide its workers' desires to turn their lives around toward better health and success. In 2006, a team



of prominent public leaders conceived and launched an endeavor to tackle a seemingly intractable problem: significant numbers of adults with multiple-barriers, overwhelmingly African American men, locked out of the community and locked into costly, debilitating cycles of homelessness, incarceration, and chronic illness. They envisioned a better future for this population, and began The NetWork for Better Futures (now BFM) in 2007.



The Focus of This Organization's Social Impact

BFM's Integrated-Care Model is designed to break the cycle of incarceration, homelessness, chronic illness, and unemployment by responding immediately to participants' two most basic needs: safe, decent, affordable housing, and a job. Once these basic needs are met, the value and impact of other support services are amplified. Over time, the focus on employment, housing, and seamless access to essential support services promotes healing, recovery, and fundamental changes in behavior, and ultimately increased success both personally and professionally. The model's four fundamentals: jobs, housing, health, and life coaching are anchored by meaningful relationships, and a vibrant community. This community offers an alternative culture and allows men with multiple barriers to forge new attitudes and behaviors.
