We understand you wanted the LCC to provide feedback regarding possible legislation suggested by Mr. Rick Heller that would require all recipients of legacy funding to comply with Minn. Stat. § 16E.03, Subdivision 9 related to web content accessibility.

#### State Accessibility Standards

The state accessibility standards ("standards") as referenced by Minn. Stat. § 16E.03, Subdivision 9 were put in place to ensure executive branch state agency websites, other technology applications, and planned hardware and software procurement are accessible. The state standards are based upon the federal standards. The federal standards are complex, incorporating the national industry developed standards of Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.0 and Section 508 Standards set by the US Access Board. Finally, the standards are continually changing as MnIT's chief information officer is statutorily required to review and incorporate any revisions to the national industry developed standards into the state standard.

#### **Legacy Funding Recipients**

Legacy funds are distributed to a variety of recipients ranging from large state agencies to small non-profit organizations, tribal governments and individuals. Currently, there are more than 16,000 funded projects reported to the legacy website maintained by the Legislative Coordinating Commission. The recipients of funding for approximately 11,000 of those reported projects are non-profit organizations or Individuals.

While state agencies and some of the larger non-profit organizations that receive legacy funding may have the financial and administrative resources to comply with the state standards, it is likely that the smaller entities and individuals that receive legacy funding may not. Enacting this requirement could result in a significant burden for many recipients, particularly those that receive smaller amounts of funding, and may deter them from seeking legacy funding.

It is my understanding that you visited Diane Henry-Wangensteen on Monday, December 10, 2012, for an update on the concern you raised earlier this year regarding the inability of "Web Anywhere" to distinguish stricken words on bills posted to the Minnesota Legislature's website and to read PDFs posted to the web site. Please be assured that Ms. Henry-Wangensteen passed along your concerns both times in a timely manner, and that the Revisor's office is working on improvements.

During this 2012 interim, the Minnesota Legislature's website has undergone a major redesign. Because the Revisor's office has so many pages of material and just one web programmer, we are actually still in the process of rewriting the web pages that display bills and other legislative documents at this time. When this work is done in late December, we will test the accessibility of the new HTML and PDF pages with screen readers including "Web Anywhere." Because there are a number of commercially-available screen readers, it may be difficult to program our pages to interface with all them accurately, but we will give the task our best effort.

The Minnesota Legislature and the Office of the Revisor of Statutes are committed to ongoing improvement of the accessibility of our website. Improved accessibility is one of the goals for this 2012 redesign, and was also a goal in 2008 when the Revisor's office recoded CSS style sheets to improve accessibility, and the Legislative Reference Library extended those changes to the remainder of the legislative website. In 2009, the Commission of Deaf, Deaf Blind and Hard of Hearing Minnesotans gave the Minnesota Legislative Networking Group its Website Access Award for this work.

Just as there are numerous ways to learn there should be a similar variety of accepted teaching methods.

As you probably know, legislative deadlines have passed and it is extremely unlikely that any bills to address universal design or the disparity between state and federal education laws can move forward this biennium. However, that does not mean your efforts are in vain. I encourage you to build upon the work you have already done and to reach out to other individuals and groups to address the situation. Your own suggestion of finding labor unions, prison officials, and teachers at all levels to back your proposals will help to make your case in 2011.

We point out that the Legacy website maintained by the LCC has information on all projects that receive funding from the Legacy amendment and the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund. The Lessard-Sams Outdoor Heritage Council maintains a website that shows how Outdoor Heritage Funds have been used, as does the LCCMR for their projects. Many state agencies also maintain webpages that show how the legacy funds they have received have been spent. These legislative and state agency websites comply with accessibility standards.

#### Regulation

if this language were enacted it is unclear how this mandate would be enforced. We are unclear how compliance with the standards would be monitored by MniT. We are also unclear what enforcement authority MniT has with respect to non-state organizations. We suggest contacting MniT, or that a fiscal note be requested so that the costs of monitoring and possible enforcement could be developed.

#### Conclusion

While it is in the best interest of all organizations with websites to ensure their websites are accessible, it would likely be challenging and burdensome for many of the recipients of legacy funding to meet the state's accessibility standards. Additionally, the process and cost for monitoring and enforcing compliance would likely impact MnIT staff and fiscal resources. Finally, access to information on legacy funded projects is readily available in an accessible format on the Legacy website, as well as many other websites.

Dear Mr. Heller:

I thank you for your correspondence received on March 6, 2015.

You express your concern about the accessibility of certain records and proceedings at the Legislature. Specifically, you have concerns about the fact that the Legislature is exempt from the requirements of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minn. Stat. ch. 13. In addition, you have concerns about the fact that the Legislature's electronic records are not subject to the data accessibility requirements of Minn. Stat. § 16E.03. You believe that the exemption of the Legislature from these statutory requirements affects the transparency of Minnesota government.

It must be difficult for you to face barriers when you seek information that you believe should be more readily accessible.

You are correct that electronic data and records from the Legislature are not subject to the accessibility standards required of state agencies under Minn. Stat. § 16E.03, subd. 9. Similarly, the Legislature is not governed by the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, but rather has its own rules governing data access. Statutory amendments would be necessary in order for these requirements to apply to the Legislature. Because the issues you raise require legislative changes, I recommend that you share your concerns with your state legislators as follows:

### Rep. Thissen releases Legislative Reform Package to make Minnesota's government more open and accessible to the public

Proposal seeks to improve Minnesota's "D- rating" for openness and transparency

SAINT PAUL, MINN – 2015 was not a banner year for transparency in Minnesota's government. Minnesota received a D- grade for openness and transparency in state government from a report conducted by the Center for Public Integrity, a national non-profit watchdog organization. Among other reasons, the report highlighted backroom negotiations and the chaotic conclusion of the 2015 session as areas where Minnesota's government comes up short in terms of its openness to the public.

Today, State Representative Paul Thissen announced a legislative reform package that includes both statutory and procedural recommendations to make the legislature more open and transparent to the public. The recommendations include longer public notices before final actions on bills and changes to make it easier for the public to follow legislation and provide input. In addition, the proposal seeks a statutory change to stop the "revolving door" of legislators who become lobbyists and increased reporting related to per diem and other public expenditures.

"Minnesotans expect and deserve a government that puts them first, but too many people are disconnecting from a political process that they see as disproportionately benefiting the wealthy and well-connected," said Thissen. "Minnesotans I've heard from are frustrated by a lack of transparency and sense that special interests are pulling strings behind the scenes. We owe it to those Minnesotans and all of our constituents to make our legislature more transparent and more open to the public - even if it causes discomfort for us as legislators."

Thissen's package includes several changes to rules and procedures designed to improve the ability of legislators to craft sound public policy and to allow the public to participate in the process. Those changes include:

24 hour public notice before final vote: Require conference committee reports be published 24 hours prior to a vote taking place before each House and require House votes on concurrences from the Senate to be 24 hours prior to a vote taking place.

Increased transparency for conference committees: Require public notification of a conference committee adoption vote 12 hours prior to adoption vote. Also, require conference committees to provide an opportunity for public testimony.

No more passing bills "in dark of night": Amend House rules to forbid the ability to suspend the rules for the purpose of allowing the House to meet past midnight prior to the last two weeks of legislative session.

Increased transparency and public participation in setting joint budget targets: Require that once joint targets are adopted, the LCPFP shall hold a hearing and vote to approve target - a binding vote for both bodies. In addition, an opportunity for public testimony must be provided for. In addition, amend House Rules to require adoption of joint targets no later than 14 days prior to adjournment. And, if the fourteen day requirement is not met, require approval of the entire House for joint targets.

Move constitutional language on "single subject rule" to House Rules: Require in the House Rules that no bill before the House shall embrace more than one subject (except for major finance bills).

Limit omnibus budget bills to budget related material: Amend House Rules so that Omnibus Budget Bills only contain budget related material.

"We must never repeat the mockery of legislative process that occurred last session when the House jammed through a \$100 million spending bill that no one – either legislators or the public – had a chance to read," said Thissen. "These rule changes may present challenges to legislators, but we need to think about our constituents, who right now face too many hurdles to follow legislation at the legislature that may have a significant impact on their lives."

Thissen's proposal would also include measures to ensure legislators are meeting a higher standard of transparency and disclosure with the public. Those changes include:

Stop "Revolving Door": Require a 1-year "Revolving Door" statutory change, banning former legislators, judges as well as cabinet-level executive branch members from becoming lobbyists for the formal legislative session immediately following the date of departure from public service.

Data Practices Study: Currently, the Minnesota House is exempt from the Data Practice Act. That should change. The Legislative Commission on Data Practices should study and report back to the legislature before the 2017 legislative session with a proposal to implement provisions of the Data Practices Act in the Minnesota House and a proposal to cover the costs of such changes.

Increased transparency related to per diem and other public expenditures: Establish House policy to publish all information related to per diem, mileage, housing stipend, committee budgets, etc. on a rolling monthly basis.

"We need to build greater trust with the public that legislators are conducting their work on behalf of the people," said Thissen. "These provisions take steps in the right direction."

Thissen said legislation that requires statutory changes would be introduced the first week of session. He encourages the House Republican Majority to engage on a debate on House Rules around provisions that would require rule changes.



For several years, the Legislative Coordinating Commission has received funding from the Telecommunications Access Minnesota Fund through the Department of Commerce. \$100, 000 of this is used to pay for captioning of legislative webcasts of floor sessions and committee hearings each fiscal year. We request that this funding continue.

In each of the last four years, the LCC has received an additional \$50,000 per year to support a small grant program for state agencies to make their web based services more accessible. Working with an advisory committee, our office has provided 32 grants to 13 agencies for this purpose.

While we have worked well with agencies to implement this program, we believe it would be more appropriate for a state agency to manage this effort. MnIT, the Council on Disabilities, the Commission of Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing Minnesotans, the DHS Division of Deaf and Hard of Hearing, or the Department of Administration might all be possible managers for this grant program.

We would be glad to assist whatever agency assumes this responsibility.
