Young children in Foster Care

- 6,009 infants through 5 year-olds in foster care in 2019
 - Children of color over-represented
 - Infants and toddlers most likely age group to be removed from their homes and placed in out-ofhome care
- These experiences can be traumatic
 - Research shows higher rates of developmental delay for children who have been reported to child protection
 - Cognitive development, social emotional health and physical health may be negatively affected
- Early childhood programs can be effective in getting high-risk children back on a healthy developmental track
 - Especially family focused intensive services like Early Childhood Special Education and Head Start

Current Status

- Information is not regularly gathered from counties or school districts, or reported at the state level, about foster children's participation in early childhood programs
- information that is available indicates generally low rates of participation
- Tracking rates can lead to improvement
- Improvements in the state's data capacity should make gathering and tracking this information easier
 - Early Childhood Longitudinal Data System

HF 910 (Kotyza-Witthhuhn)/ SF XXX (Coleman)

- Requires DHS to report on the the current rates of participation in early childhood education and care programs by young children in foster care using administrative data, and to develop a plan to increase their participation:
 - Number and rate of participation by program, race, ethnicity, age and county,
 - Identification of additional resources necessary to report this information,
 - Plan to increase participation must be developed in collaboration with affected families and communities, counties, schools, providers and others.
 - Interim progress report due January 15, 2022.
 - Final report with plan due June 30, 2022.
