Alzheimer's is the most expensive disease in America and there is currently no means to slow, stop or prevent this disease. Alzheimer's takes a significant toll on individuals, families and on our state budget. The State of Minnesota and our communities must be prepared to address Alzheimer's. - Ensure quality training for direct care workers
- Provide strong caregiver supports
- Improve long-term care financing
- Ensure adequate residential services, licensing and regulation
