1. Maintain the same amount of care authorized during the entire						
12-month eligibility period unless certain things change or the child

child care. The six month limit on Portability Pool is eliminated for

9. Allow parents to search for a job for up to 30 hours per week for

10. Create an expedited five business-day application process for						
families who are homeless. Proof of eligibility would be required

certify on the application and redetermination that their assets are						
not more than \$1 million. Currently there is no asset limit.

redetermination following when a child turns 13 years old, or a child
