Dear Representative Lee,

I write today to ask you to support the funding of Playwrights' Center's second phase bonding request. After over 50 years of sustaining, developing and advocating for playwrights and their work, we have outgrown our facility in Minneapolis, and are now approaching the largest transformational moment in our history – a move to the Creative Enterprise Zone in St. Paul.

As a playwright myself, this moment is particularly meaningful, because it not only signals an exciting turning point in the life of this one-of-a-kind organization, but it is a pronouncement to playwrights everywhere that we matter, that our stories matter, that there is immeasurable value in narrative.

Almost nine years ago I received a call from Jeremy Cohen, the Center's Producing Artistic Director. I had applied for a fellowship at Playwrights' Center, not really knowing what it was and not really thinking that I had any chance of receiving it. But my cell phone rang and when I picked up Jeremy said "we want you." And let me tell you, playwrights don't hear those words very often.

On the strength of those words, I moved here, thinking I'd give Minnesota nine months – the length of the fellowship – and then hightail it back to New York City. But I never left. Playwrights' Center changed my life. Literally. I have a career because of the people there. I am a better writer and a better human being because of the people there.

And there are thousands of similar stories: of artists who are, or have been, supported by Playwrights' Center. It is a game-changing organization. Its intensely personal approach to artistic development – putting playwrights at the center of the process – is quietly (or not so quietly) changing America's theatrical landscape, deepening and diversifying our stages one playwright and one play at a time. In the past year alone, 78% of playwrights the Center engaged with most deeply were female playwrights, playwrights of color, and Indigenous playwrights.

Our new building will dramatically expand our ability to serve playwrights and theaters across the country. It will help us do what we do – better. A creative revolution is happening from right here in the Twin Cities. I hope that you, and the State of Minnesota, will join us in making it possible.

Representative Lee,

I write in support of HF812 authored by Representative Kaohly Her. The Twin Cities are home to the second largest number of theaters in the United States. Our theaters provide a great opportunity for our communities to view plays, and for artists to produce art. The Twin Cities, is unique compared to other theater towns. The Minnesota spirit of community and collaboration is evident in our theater community. The Playwrights Center can probably list amongst their list of core writers who they've supported and nurtured a large list of Twin Cities theater companies where their playwrights have had works performed. But the support goes beyond that.

At Theater Mu, we count the Playwrights Center among one of our closest theater partners. As a theater without our own physical performance space, we rely on our partnerships with theaters such as the Playwrights Center to be able to present our work. This season, the Playwrights Center not only hosted a workshop reading of our Lao play, Kung Fu Zombies Saga but they also committed funds to help us pay our artists to develop the play in advance of the world premiere on our mainstage this summer. A new center for the Playwright Center to St. Paul puts them right in our backyard, making collaboration even easier for us and our artists.

In 2015 a survey by the Dramatists Guild of America reported that just 12% of works produced by regional theaters between 2011 and 2014 were authored by playwrights of color. In the last couple of years with the health pandemic and racial unrest resulting unrest, including the rise in anti-Asian hate (the Center for the Study of Hate and Extremism revealed that the anti-Asian hate crimes increased 339% in 2021) has many theaters, including Theater Mu examine what kinds of plays we are producing.

The current social climate highlights the need for more stories from all of our communities to be written and told. The Playwrights Center is an important home for storytellers. Many of Theater Mu's Asian American playwrights have had the support of the Playwrights Center.

On behalf of Theater Mu and our artistic community, I hope that you will consider supporting this bond request.



Playwrights Getting Produced in the U.S. by Race



Playwrights' Center Breakout**



Playwrights Getting Produced in the U.S. by Gender


