

### **COVID MN Fund Details**

#### **COVID MN Fund - \$200 million**

- Allocated to date \$125.6 million
- Spent/Encumbered to date \$99.6 million
- Remaining Unspent \$100.3 million (\$12.5 million of the amount allocated for PPE remains unspent)

#### Allocations include:

- Ventilators and Bi-Pap machines \$13.7 million
- Personal Protective Equipment and Medical Supplies \$60.5 million
- Testing contracts with U of M and Mayo \$36 million
- Operating support for COVID response at DOC \$2.2 million
- Preparation of Community Alternate Care Site in Roseville \$1.8 million
- Animal Carcass Disposal \$10.95 million

Legislative reports issued on April 15 and April 30. Any money in the fund that remains unobligated on May 11, 2020, cancels to the general fund.

## Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF)

### **Total allocation for Minnesota - \$2.187 billion**

State of Minnesota received - \$1.87 billion

Hennepin and Ramsey County received - \$317 million

- Minnesota can determine how much will be passed through to other local units of government. The CARES Act language suggested up to 45% may go to locals
- If we pass the full 45% to locals that would leave \$1.2 billion at the state level and provide an additional \$667 million for locals

The funds can be used for response to the COVID pandemic for broad purposes, including:

- Medical expenses
- Public health expenses
- Payroll expenses (due to COVID),
- Expenses of actions to facilitate compliance with COVID related public health measures
- Expenses associated with the provision of economic support in connection with the COVID-19 public health emergency

### **FEMA**

- FEMA provides funding for COVID-19 response through the Disaster Relief Fund (DRF) to eligible applicants:
  - State government
  - Local governments
  - Tribes
  - Private non-profits
- Examples of eligible expenditures (not exhaustive):
  - Management and response to immediate threats to public health and safety (i.e., SEOC)
  - Emergency medical care, supplies, and equipment
  - Transport of supplies and persons
  - Medical sheltering (if pre-approved by FEMA)

- Funds are provided on a reimbursement basis. The state must identify a funding source to cash flow initial expenditures. The DRF will reimburse 75% of eligible costs.
- Under current law, the Disaster
   Assistance Contingency Account (DACA)
   funds the 25% nonfederal share for the state and local governments
  - The current \$30 million DACA balance is expected to cover natural disasters (storms, flooding) for the next 12-18 months.

## Organizing COVID-19 Work

### Response

Prepare for the surge of COVID-19 patients

### Recovery

Develop the strategies to recover from the impacts of COVID-19

### Resources

Work with the legislature, the federal government, and the private sector to identify funds

## Response

- We have work groups working around the clock on how we respond to COVID-19:
  - 1. Health Care Surge: Partnering with hospitals to assess needs, build out beds in hospitals and at other sites, and support the workforce.
  - 2. Supplies: Commissioner Roberts-Davis and her team are working to buy the ventilators and supplies we need, in partnership with the private sector.
  - 3. Testing: Implementing the historic agreement with Mayo/U of MN to expand testing, contact tracing and use other strategies to track the virus.
  - **4. Education & Childcare:** Manage distance learning and provide care for the kids of workers in critical sectors.

## Recovery

- We are also working on long-term planning and recovery:
  - 1. At Risk Populations: Work with partners on how we can support those most vulnerable to COVID-19.
  - **2. Food:** Ensure the people of Minnesota, especially those most in need, have food to eat.
  - 3. Economic Security/Safe Reopening: Plan for how we can go back to work while maintaining social distance, and with the federal government, provide support to people and businesses to help weather the COVID-19 storm.
    - **a. Social Distancing:** Examining and developing tools and recommendations for how to social distance effectively in the workplace and beyond.
  - 4. Community Resiliency: Work in partnership with Tribal Nations and communities of color to support these communities who have been disproportionately impacted by COVID-19.

### Resources

- Working with the legislature and federal government, manage the state and federal funds available to respond to and recover from COVID-19.
- Ensure that funds are available quickly to buy the supplies that we need.
- Manage the funds transparently, in partnership with the legislature.
