

- 1-in-5 community forest trees are ash
 Up to 60% ash in some communities
- EAB kill rate over 99%

 - Treat and remove ash
 - Plant diverse replacement trees
 - Educate residents
 - Help homeowners

Emerald Ash Borer Community Forest Response Tree Planting - \$300,000 LCCMR

Preparing for EAB in Community Forests - GF

- \$700,000 GF, through June 30, 2020
- 50 submissions
- \$3,374,000 requested
- 13 communities awarded funds
- \$600,108 matching funds
- Estimated outcomes: 1,027 trees removed & 1,311 trees planted

EAB Community Forest Response Tree Planting - LCCMR

- \$300,000 LCCMR, through June 30, 2022
- 25 submissions
- \$625,435 requested
- 12 communities awarded funds
- \$183,000 matching funds
- Estimated Outcome: 2,014 trees planted
