The two phases of Bear Country are now complete, and visitors have greatly enjoyed meeting animals like Tundra and Banks, two brown bears that were orphaned as cubs and could not survive in the wild on their own.

We have twenty-nine participating species that are cooperatively managed with other Association of Zoos & Aquariums (AZA) member facilities to enhance the conservation of these animals in the wild. The Lake Superior Zoo was founded in 1923 by local businessman Bert E. Onsgard and started with just one animal. Today we've grown to be the home of more than 350 animals!
