Within 14 At least three days before election day voting equipment is used, the official 10.23 in charge of elections shall have the voting system tested to ascertain that the system will 10.24 correctly mark ballots using all methods supported by the system, including through assistive 10.25 technology, and count the votes cast for all candidates and on all questions. Public notice 10.26 of the time and place of the test must be given at least two days in advance by publication 10.27 once in official newspapers. The test must be observed by at least two election judges, who 10.28 are not of the same major political party, and must be open to representatives of the political 10.29 10.30 parties, candidates, the press, and the public. The test must be conducted by (1) processing a preaudited group of ballots punched or marked to record a predetermined number of valid 10.31

votes for each candidate and on each question, and must include for each office one or more 11.1 ballot cards which have votes in excess of the number allowed by law in order to test the 11.2 ability of the voting system tabulator and electronic ballot marker to reject those votes; and 11.3 (2) processing an additional test deck of ballots marked using the electronic ballot marker 11.4 for the precinct, including ballots marked using the electronic ballot display, audio ballot 11.5 reader, and any assistive voting technology used with the electronic ballot marker. If any 11.6 error is detected, the cause must be ascertained and corrected and an errorless count must 11.7 11.8 be made before the voting system may be used in the election. After the completion of the 11.9 test, the programs used and ballot cards must be sealed, retained, and disposed of as provided for paper ballots. 11.10
