Disability services have been cut

The disability community has endured deep cuts to their programs and services in recent history, including hundreds of millions of dollars in cuts since 2002. These cuts have left an unstable system of supports for individuals with disabilities, and have also been ineffective in solving rising health and human services costs as they pass greater costs on to other budget areas.

Legislative Principles



Elimination of programs & services does not eliminate needs

The needs of vulnerable Minnesotans have become more acute during the economic crisis. Continued reductions to vital services such as rehabilitation therapies will result in costs being passed on to Minnesota taxpayers in many other areas of the state budget, all at a much higher rate. For example, cutting Personal Care Assistant services will lead to more expensive institutional care.
