## **RE: Forensic Interviewing HF2136 (Johnson)**

On behalf of the Council for Minnesotans of African Heritage (CMAH), we our writing to express our strong support for the continued use of forensic interviews in child protection and criminal justice systems. These interviews are essential for gathering accurate, unbiased information from children to assess allegations of abuse, and they are key to making informed decisions by the Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) of professionals across various sectors.

Properly trained forensic interviewers ensure that children can recall events in their own words, minimizing trauma and maximizing the accuracy of information. This approach reduces the need for redundant interviews and helps the MDT coordinate efforts more effectively. The use of forensic interviews is crucial in child protection, criminal investigations, medical assessments, and mental health support. These interviews directly impact a child's well-being, and their experience during the process can influence their future interactions with support systems.

CMAH fully supports forensic interviews as an integral part of the MDT approach and urges continued investment in the training and development of forensic interviewers to ensure that children's voices are heard accurately and respectfully.
