1.10	(2) a licensed adult foster care or child foster care setting of up to five people; and
1.11	(3) community living settings as defined in section 256B.49, subdivision 23, where
1.12	individuals with disabilities may reside in all of the units in a building of four or fewer
1.13	units, and no more than the greater of four or 25 percent of the units in a multifamily
1.14	building of more than four units, unless required by the Housing Opportunities for Persons
1.15	with AIDS Program.
1.16	(b) The settings in paragraph (a) must not:
1.17	(1) be located in a building that is a publicly or privately operated facility that

2.14	(a) At the discretion of the organization, a community living setting may apply to the

2.17	waiver under sections 256B.092 or 256B.49 may only reside in all of the units in a
2.18	building of four or fewer units, and no more than the greater of four or 25 percent of

2.20	paragraph (b)(3) that a setting cannot be a housing complex designed expressly around an

2.32	services under a home and community-based waiver in choosing the setting from among
2.33	other options; and
2.34	(4) includes a quality assurance plan affirming that the organization requesting

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3.1	(i) supports or develops scattered site alternatives to the setting for which the
3.2	exception is requested;
3.3	(ii) supports the transition of individuals receiving services under a home and
3.4	community-based waiver to the most integrated setting appropriate to the individual's
3.5	needs;
3.6	(iii) has a history of meeting recognized quality standards for the population it serves
3.7	or is targeting, or that it will meet recognized quality standards;
3.8	(iv) provides and facilitates for tenant receiving services under a home and
3.9	community-based waiver unlimited access to the community, including opportunities to
3.10	interact with nonstaff people without disabilities, appropriate to the individual's needs; and
3.11	(v) supports a safe and healthy environment for all individuals living in the setting.
3.12	(c) In assessing whether to grant the applicant's exception request, the commissioner

3.14	(1) verify that all of the assertions in the application are accurate and that the
