I am the executive director at the Minnesota Online High School and strongly urge you to include HF2016 in your omnibus bill.

Minnesota Online High School, also known as MNOHS serves a very diverse population of students enrolled in grades 9-12. Most of these students have or are suffering from school anxiety or mental health issues as such as anxiety and PTSD among other social factors that do not allow them to attend a bricks and mortar high school full time.

MNOHS serves this diverse group of students by providing them with a rich, standards based virtual curriculum along with many relational supports. We employ school counselors and social workers to provide students with basic needs, academic supports, and coping mechanisms to succeed academically. Our school social worker specifically provides check-in appointments and counseling for students who may be thinking of self-harm in many ways. Our social worker has assisted students who are suicidal in gaining access to mental health facilities and assisted families in navigating these difficult times. This is not something we like to talk about as an educational community but something we must acknowledge in many ways. As an online high school, we also take cyber security and keeping our students safe online very seriously.

Safe Schools Revenue (safety aid), which currently excludes charter school students, is a fund available to address the unique safety needs of students and staff. The uses include: (1) School security enhancements, (2) Staff and student safety measures, (3) Suicide prevention, (4) Violence and crime prevention tools, (5) Police liaison services, (6) Drug abuse prevention programs, (7) Gang resistance education training, (8) Improving school climate, (9) cost of licensed counselor, social worker, nurse, psychologist, chemical dependency services, and (10) Cyber Security Measures.

As a school leader I do everything possible to create a safe, positive, and welcoming environment, which is a prerequisite for learning. This funding is essential for ensuring our



ability to provide safe environments without having to access funds that should be used in the classroom.

In my school, these funds could increase the time our one social worker can spend with students in need at a critical time in their high school lives as well as keeping students safe online. Our charter school students deserve this safety aid as well as any other public-school entity.

We serve a diverse population with about 22% students of color, 10% free and reduced, and 17% of students receiving special education services.

Our public charter Upper School serves Kindergarten through 8th grade students, tuition free, making an authentic Montessori pedagogy accessible to all. We are proud to be a different point-of-view in education; driven by the motivation of students. We present challenging academics while valuing social skills as much as reading and mathematics.

Our facility and nearly seven-acre campus were specifically designed as a Montessori learning environment, meeting the developmental needs of students and inspiring them to learn both in the classroom and during free play. Utilizing Montessori principles, teachers often work in small groups, or one-on-one with children, providing an individualized approach to each student's growth. My name is Brett Wedlund, and I am the Executive Director at Nova Classical Academy and I strongly urge you to include HF2016 in your omnibus bill.

Nova Classical Academy is a public charter school in St. Paul serving more than 1,000 K–12 students. Nova consistently ranks among the top five schools in Minnesota for reading and math proficiency, and in 2023, we were the only school in the state recognized as an Exemplary Achievement Gap Closing School. We are also a National Blue Ribbon Award recipient. Despite consistently being one of the top-performing public schools in the state academically, we are also one of the lowest-funded public schools in the state. During the 2023–2024 school year, our per-pupil funding was ranked 500th out of 511 traditional school districts and chartered public schools in the state.

Safe Schools Revenue (safety aid)—which currently excludes charter school students—is a fund available to address the unique safety needs of students and staff. The uses include:

- 1. School security enhancements
- 2. Staff and student safety measures
- 3. Suicide prevention
- 4. Violence and crime prevention tools
- 5. Police liaison services
- 6. Drug abuse prevention programs
- 7. Gang resistance education training
- 8. Improving school climate
- 9. Costs of licensed counselors, social workers, nurses, psychologists, and chemical dependency services
- 10. Cybersecurity measures

At Nova Classical Academy, we want to do everything possible to create a safe, positive, and welcoming environment—which is a prerequisite for learning. However, our ability to do this has been restricted by an inequitable funding formula, as well as Safe Schools grants that prohibit funds from being used

on facilities schools do not own—essentially eliminating this option for charter schools to make their schools more secure. Because of this, the funding provided by **HF2016** is essential for ensuring our ability to provide safe environments without needing to divert funds that should be used in the classroom. At Nova, top priorities for these Safe Schools funds would include:

- Redesigning our entryway to require visitors to access the school office upon arrival, rather than being given direct access to our lunchroom and main hallway. This is something many, if not most, traditional districts have already provided for using Safe Schools grants or levies.
- Reducing our school counselor-to-student ratio, which currently exceeds 500:1.

While I disagree with it, I do understand how our political system has led to inequitable funding structures for charter schools. What I cannot comprehend, however, is how our state has determined that school safety aid is important for some—but not all—public school students. All public school students deserve funding dedicated to providing them with a safe and secure learning environment. This must be fixed. For this reason, I thank you for hearing HF2016 and urge you to expand Safe Schools Revenue to charter schools by including HF2016 in the House Education Finance Omnibus Bill.

My name is Dr. Joan Arbisi Little and I am the Director of Special Projects and former Executive Director at Career Pathways Public Charter School in St. Paul.

I am writing to urge you to include HF2016 in your omnibus bill.

At Career Pathways we serve students in grades 6 to 12 who seek a personalized program that focuses on college and career readiness. We utilize experiential and blended learning because we know students excel when they have hands on experience and a flexible learning environment. Our students choose our school because they did not find success in traditional school settings. They often enroll with records that show failing grades and poor attendance due to disruptions in their school and / or home lives. Over 80% of our students live in poverty and 30% speak another language at home.

Our students and staff come from a wide variety of backgrounds. Over the 10 years that we have been open we have helped students rebuild their academic records, discover their gifts and talents, and helped them develop skills and confidence so they can graduate and contribute to the community. Over the last two years four of our graduates have returned to work on our staff as paraprofessionals to support our special education students. When students enroll at Career Pathways they see people who look like them that open their eyes to new opportunities as they find their own unique path to success.

As a school administrator I do everything possible to create a safe, positive, and welcoming environment that fosters learning. We use Abraham Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs to create an environment that increases effectiveness for all students. But we must meet foundational needs first by ensuring a safe and healthy environment that builds a connection to school. Currently we use funds that should be used for learning to ensure the staff are trained to act wisely in a crisis and keep the building secure.

Safe Schools Revenue currently excludes charter school students. The purpose of the fund is to address the unique safety needs of students and staff. The uses include: (1) School security enhancements, (2) Staff and student safety measures, (3) Suicide prevention, (4) Violence and crime prevention tools, (5) Police liaison services, (6) Drug abuse prevention programs, (7) Gang resistance education training, (8)

Improving school climate, (9) cost of licensed counselor, social worker, nurse, psychologist, chemical dependency services, and (10) Cyber Security Measures. Charter public schools need this support too.

Safe Schools Revenue, or Safety Aid, would ensure our ability to provide a safe environment without having to access funds that should be used for curriculum and materials.

In our school, these funds could buy additional security cameras, send new staff to crisis prevention training, hire a school nurse, and increase security for our technology filters that block phishing and other outside activities.

My name is Shannon Peterson. I am the Executive Director of Lakes International Language Academy (LILA).

Please include HF2016 in your omnibus bill.

At LILA we serve over 1400 PK - 12 students. While over 60% are from the area in and around Forest Lake, we attract about 500 additional students from beyond the immediate area. Our footprint includes 22 geographic school districts and our parents pay their taxes in 47 different house districts.

Our school welcomes all. We focus on language acquisition, with grades K - 5 being full immersion. We are also an authorized IB World School, offering International Baccalaureate programming to students in all grade levels.

Safe Schools Revenue (safety aid), which currently excludes charter school students, is a fund available to address the unique safety needs of students and staff. The uses include: (1) School security enhancements, (2) Staff and student safety measures, (3) Suicide prevention, (4) Violence and crime prevention tools, (5) Police liaison services, (6) Drug abuse prevention programs, (7) Gang resistance education training, (8) Improving school climate, (9) cost of a licensed counselor, social worker, nurse, psychologist, chemical dependency services, and (10) Cyber Security Measures.

As a school leader, I do everything possible to create a safe, positive, and welcoming environment, a prerequisite for learning. This funding is essential for ensuring our ability to provide safe environments without having to access funds that should be used in the classroom.

At LILA, additional Safety Aid funding—approximately \$50,000—could provide critical support for our students through hiring a part-time social worker or psychologist. The need for these services continues to grow, particularly as we welcome back an increasing number of students returning from



mental health or chemical dependency treatment programs. Despite receiving only 70% of district schools' funding, our dedicated staff work tirelessly to ensure these students experience a smooth reintegration. Additionally, we recognize the importance of addressing attendance challenges; however, without adequate resources, it becomes increasingly difficult to expand these efforts without further straining our staff. For example, our high school counselor already commits significant unpaid time during the summer to complete student scheduling, a task that has proven impossible for her to manage while students are present in the building. Providing charter schools equitable access to Safety Aid would allow us to better meet our students' needs and foster a safer, more supportive learning environment.

I thank you for hearing HF2016 and urge you to expand Safety Aid Revenue to charter schools by including HF2016 in the House Education Finance Omnibus bill.

My name is Tammy Rackliffe and I am the Head of Schools at Duluth Edison Charter Schools.

I strongly urge you to include HF2016 in your omnibus bill.

Duluth Edison Charter Schools comprises two schools within the district, North Star Academy and Raleigh Academy. We are PreK- 8th grade schools serving 770 students in the Duluth area. We serve a diverse population with about 32% students of color, 54% free and reduced and 28% of students receiving special education services. Raleigh Academy is a small community school located in the heart of the West Duluth Community. North Star Academy is centrally located in Duluth on 270 acres of designated School Forest, serving students in grades K-8. We focus on outdoor education, a robust specialist program including art, music, community service learning, and second language options, in addition to a strong core of targeted instruction in reading, math, social studies, and science. We emphasize play-based and project-based learning, small class sizes, and a schoolwide focus on core values, community-building, and Restorative Practices.

Safe Schools Revenue (safety aid), which currently excludes charter school students, is a fund available to address the unique safety needs of students and staff. While this has been effective it is not enough.

In my school, these funds would be used to provide additional support to our students through an additional school counselor and a restorative practitioner. These positions are crucial to provide immediate support for students who are feeling anxious, suicidal, or unstable. They are able to quickly intervene when a student is in crisis.

We thank you for hearing HF2016 and urge you to expand Safety Aid Revenue to charter schools by including HF2016 in the House Education Finance Omnibus bill.
