

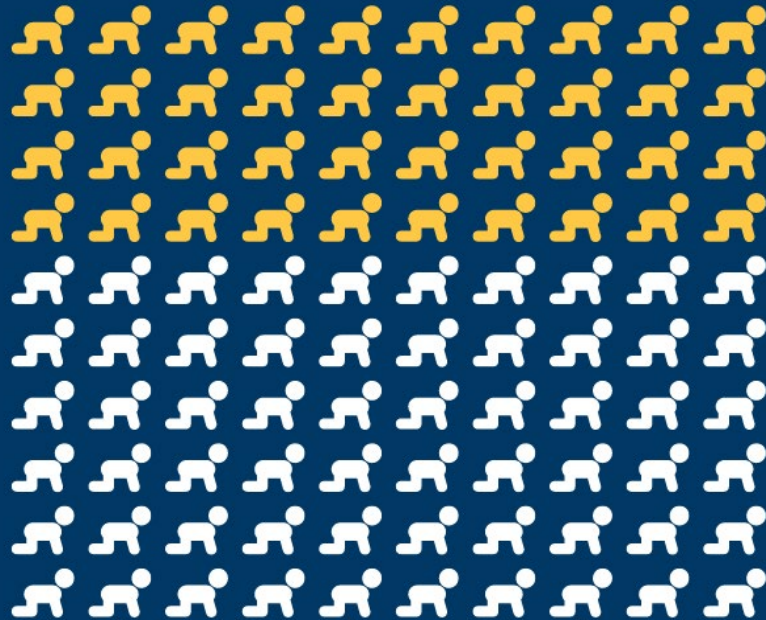

40% of births in Minnesota.

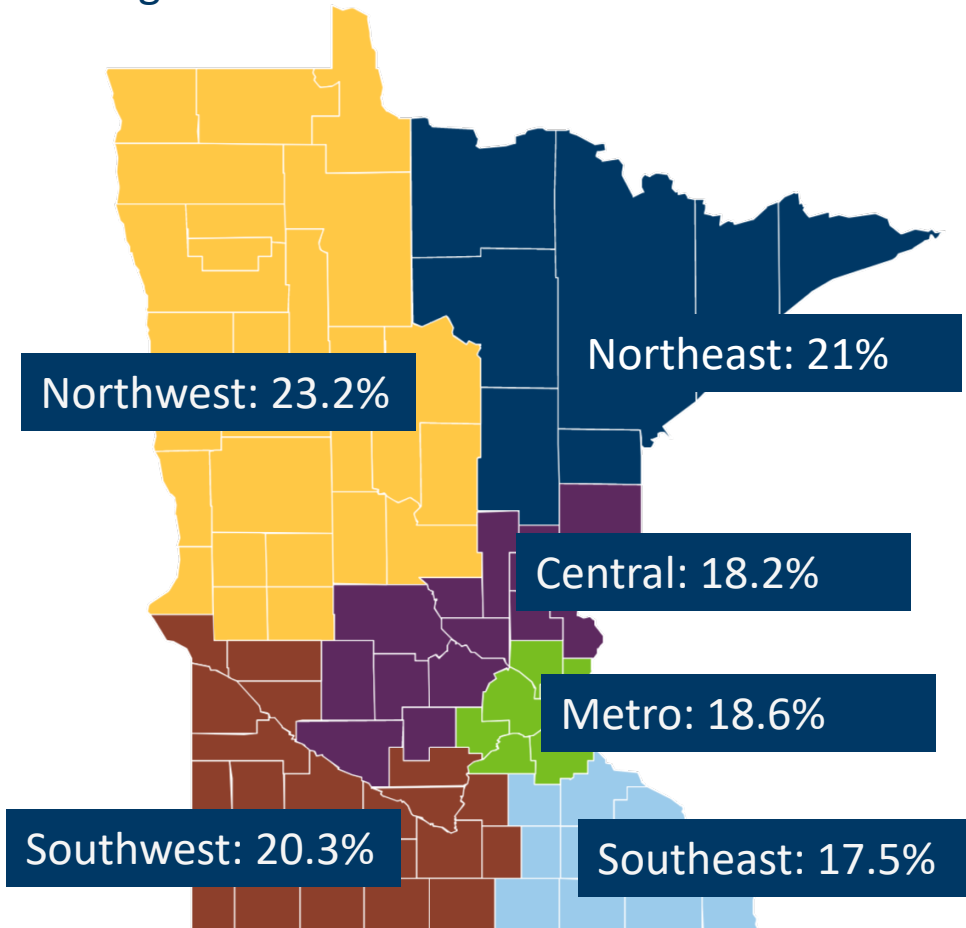


Medical Assistance covers health care for
44.3% of Minnesota children.

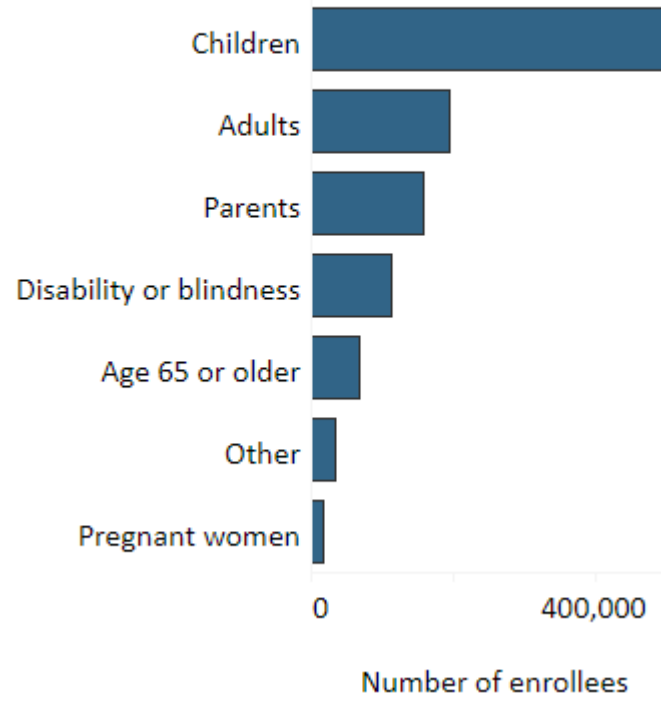

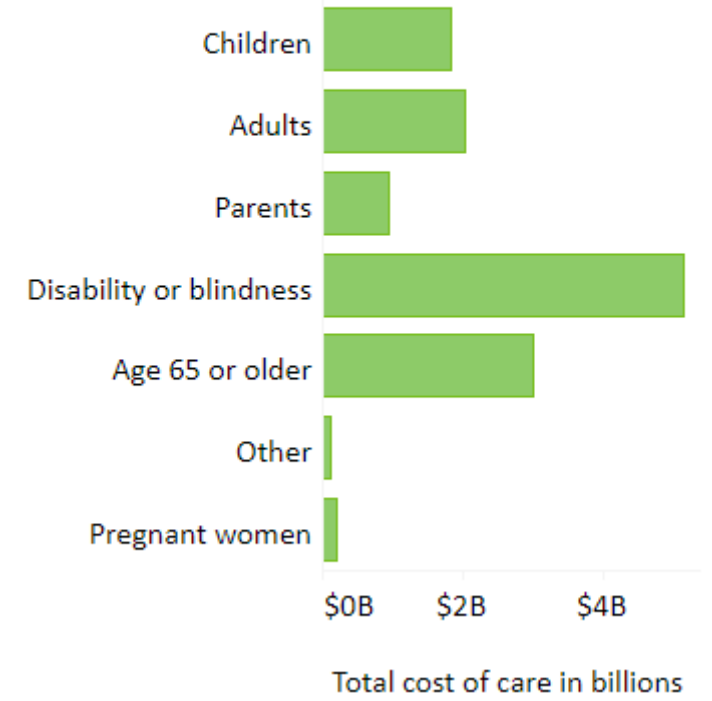
Percentage of the population within the region enrolled in Medical Assistance



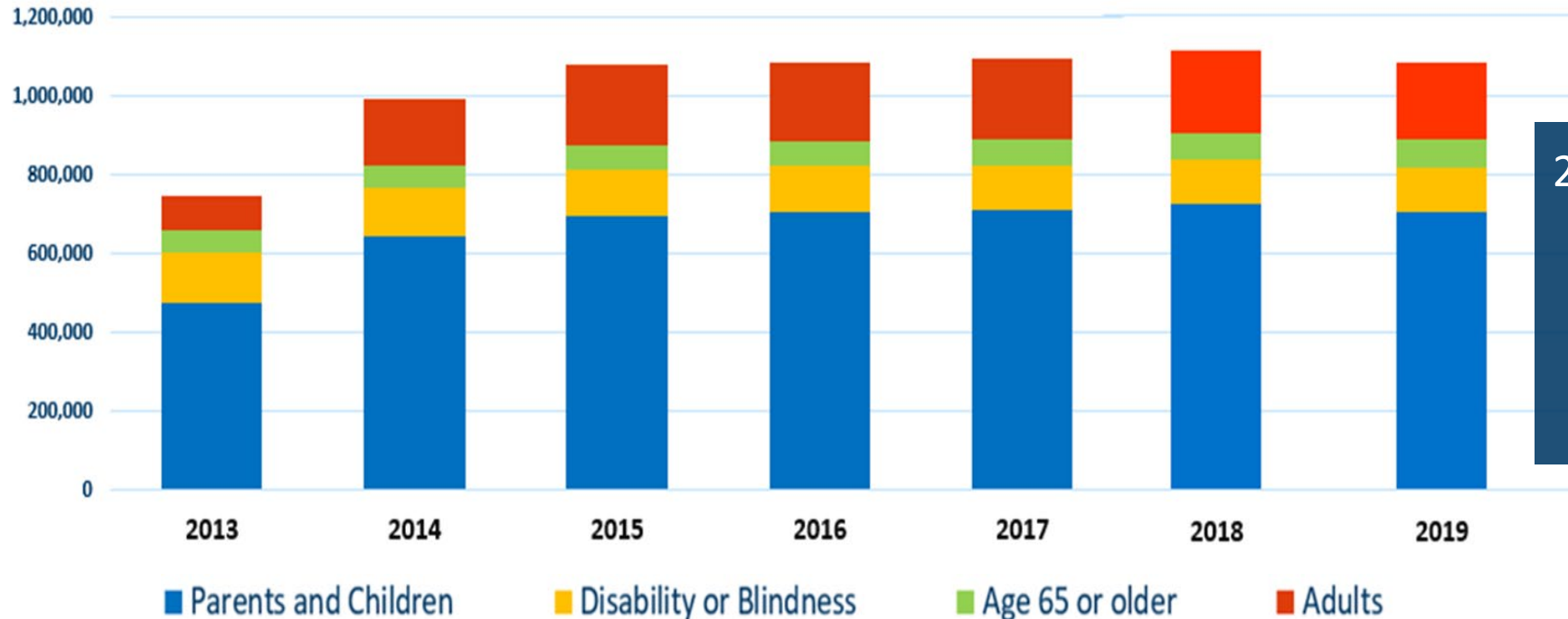
Statewide enrollment by eligibility type

Average monthly enrollment: 2013-2020

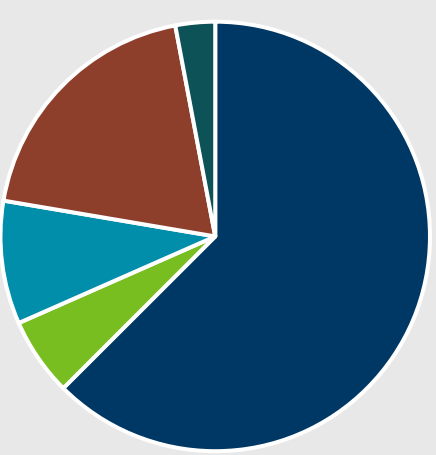

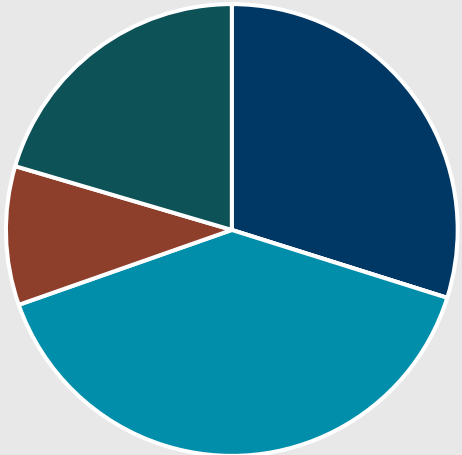

How do Minnesotans get health coverage?

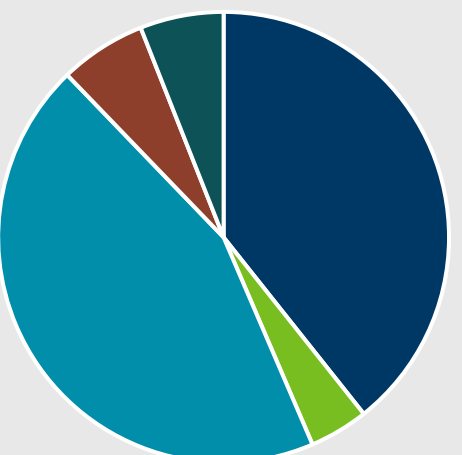

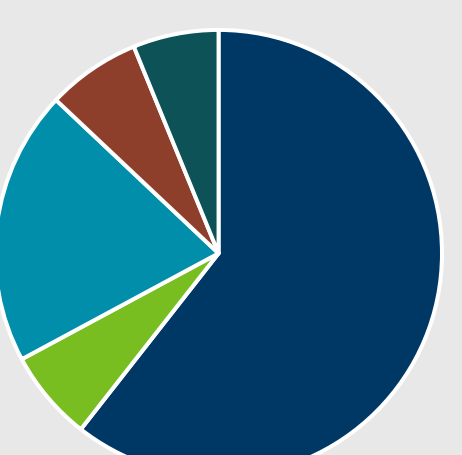

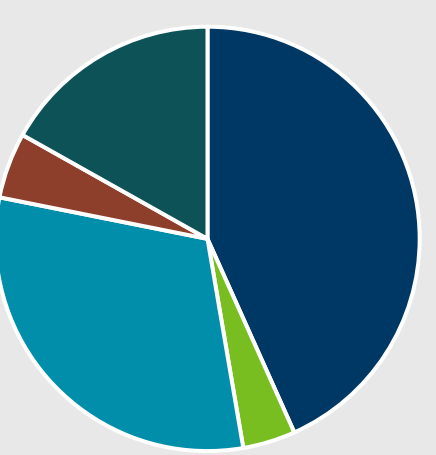

Medicaid is the source of health care coverage for:

- 44% of Black/African American Minnesotans
- 39% of American Indian/Alaskan Native Minnesotans
- 31% of Latinx Minnesotans
- 20% of Asian Minnesotans
- 9% White Minnesotans
- 24% of “Other” Minnesotans

How do Minnesotans get health coverage?

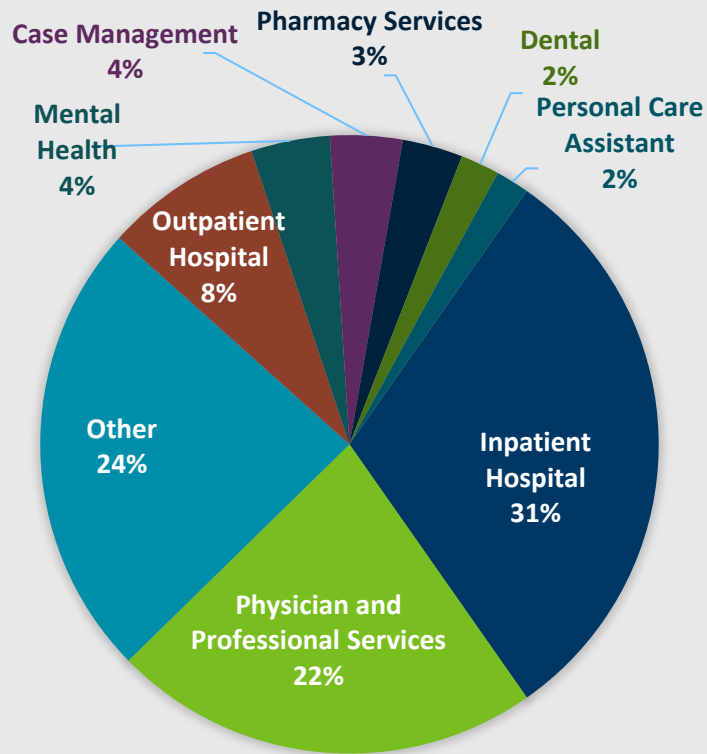
Medicaid is the source of health care coverage in Minnesota for:

- 64% of Black/African American children
- 54% of American Indian/Alaskan Native children
- 52% of Latinx children
- 31% of Asian children
- 17% of White children
- 28% of “Other” children



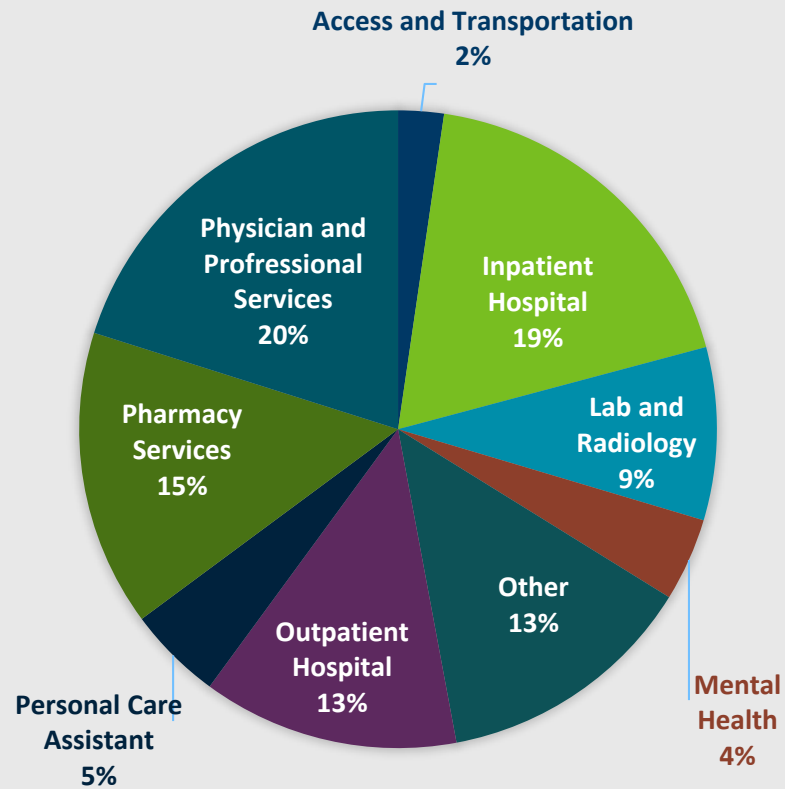
Medical Assistance spending in calendar year 2019

Children 0-5 years old



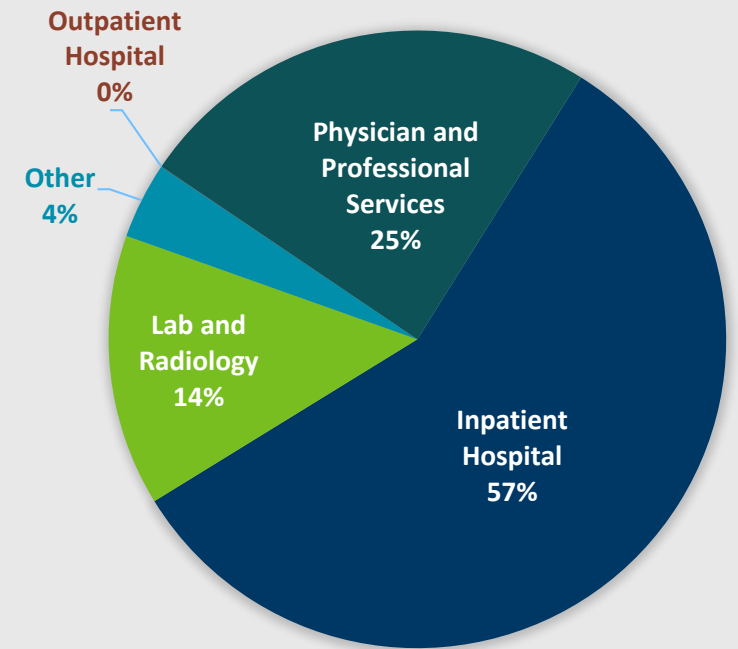
Total spending: ~\$746million

Medical Assistance eligibility factors: pregnant women

- A woman who is pregnant or within the postpartum period (two months following the month pregnancy ends) may be eligible for Medical Assistance
- Income must be at or below 278 percent of federal poverty guidelines (FPG)
 - \$3,993 monthly for a household of two or \$47,927 annually
 - Eligibility continues until the end of the postpartum period, irrespective of any income changes.
- Must meet all other Medical Assistance eligibility requirements (e.g., a resident of Minnesota)
- There is no asset test.



Medical Assistance eligibility factors: infants and children

- Newborns: Children born to mothers enrolled in Medical Assistance at the time of their birth have automatic eligibility through their first year of life as long as a Minnesota resident.
- Infants: Children through the month of their second birthday
 - Household income at or below 283 percent FPG (\$4,065 monthly for a family of two or \$48,789 annually)
- Children ages 2 through 18
 - Household income at or below 275 percent FPG (\$3,950 monthly for a family of two or \$47,410 annually)
- Children ages 19 and 20
 - Household Income at or below 133 percent FPG (\$1,910 monthly for a family of two or \$22,929 annually)



Medical Assistance eligibility factors for TEFRA

A child must:

- Be under age 19 with a disability certified by either the Social Security Administration or the DHS State Medical Review Team (SMRT)
- Meet statutory level-of-care requirements as determined by SMRT
- Live with at least one biological or adoptive parent
- Meet nonfinancial Medical Assistance eligibility requirements (e.g., Minnesota residency)



Enrollment process

- Application may be made online via the MNsure website at www.mnsure.org or with a paper application and returned to the county, tribal agency or DHS by mail, fax or in person
- Application help is available from county or tribal agencies, DHS, the MNsure Contact Center, a navigator, or broker
- Once eligibility is determined, applicants receive a notice of the eligibility result
- If eligible, new members receive a welcome packet and Minnesota Health Care Programs ID card and select a managed care plan

Child and Teen Checkups

Doula

Covered services: up to seven sessions of childbirth education and support services, which include emotional and physical support provided before, during and after childbirth.



Community Health Workers



Trained health educators who have completed a specific curriculum



Provide diagnosis-related education, such as:

- Chronic disease management
- Diabetes prevention
- Oral health care

Dental services

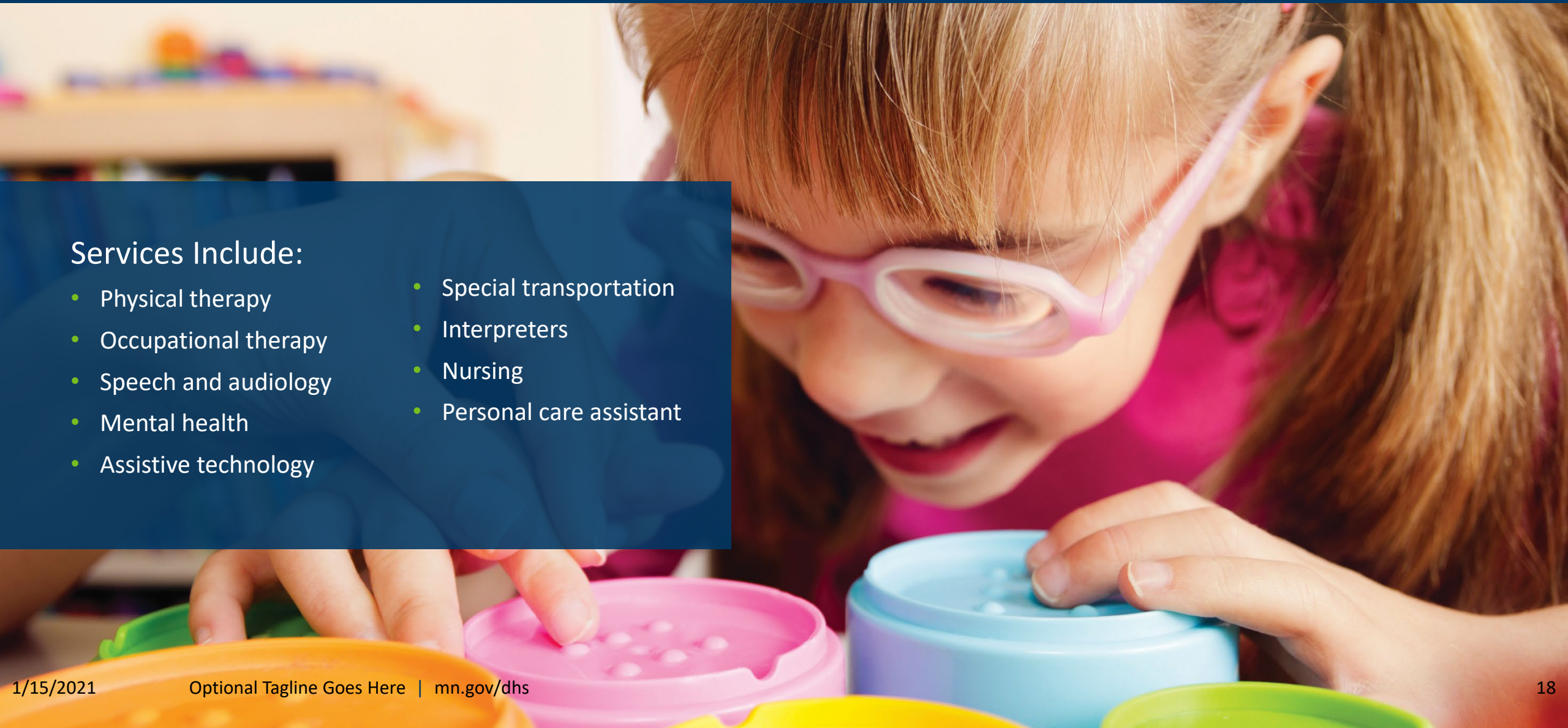
- Medical Assistance covers comprehensive dental benefits for children
- In 2016 and 2017, less than 40 percent of kids on Medical Assistance received any dental service

Services Include:

- Physical therapy
- Occupational therapy
- Speech and audiology
- Mental health
- Assistive technology
- Special transportation
- Interpreters
- Nursing
- Personal care assistant
