<u>Maya's Law</u>

When child welfare agencies receive a report of maltreatment, they are responsible for assessing and investigating it. As part of this process, children are asked about what might have happened.

Unfortunately, Minnesota is the only state that does not grant children the right to be interviewed separately from their guardians when reporting abuse.

If passed, child welfare agencies would be required to:

Increase safeguards for children by ensuring interviews through family assessment take place outside the presence of the alleged abuser

> Provide protection from self-incrimination and intimidation for children when making a report of abuse against a caretaker
