Co-Chairs and Members of the Environment and Natural Resources Policy and Finance Committee,

The Environment & Natural Resources Trust Fund benefits current citizens and future generations by providing long-term, consistent, and stable funding for projects to protect, conserve, and enhance Minnesota's "air, water, land, fish, wildlife, and other natural resources." Minnesota voters overwhelmingly endorsed this strategy when they voted to continue sending a portion of the state lottery proceeds to the Environment & Natural Resources Trust Fund (ENRTF) with 77% approval in 2024. Since 1991 ENRTF has provided over \$1.1 billion to 1,700+ projects benefiting every county in the state.

Our organizations are proud to support the Environment & Natural Resources Trust Fund Appropriations Bill, HF3426, which continues this special Minnesota tradition of environmental stewardship.

This bill contains the recommendations of the Legislative-Citizen Commission on Minnesota Resources (LCCMR), a body of 17 members comprised of citizens and legislators who spend significant time reviewing proposals from across the state to inform the legislature on the best way to direct ENRTF dollars toward cleaner water, healthier forests and prairies, world-class hiking and biking trails, cutting-edge natural resources research institutions, opportunities for enrichment and environmental education programming, and abundant fish and wildlife.

In addition to advancing the recommendations of the LCCMR, we urge the committee to include the annual appropriation from the ENRTF to the Community Grant program. This program created by the legislature in 2023 and operated by the Department of Natural Resources serves as a new tool to increase the ability to "expand the number and diversity of recipients who benefit from the environment and natural resources trust fund, especially in communities that have been adversely affected by pollution and environmental degradation" (Minn. Statutes 116X.03).

Tying together both the LCCMR recommendations and the fiscal year 2027 appropriation to this program was agreed to among the co-chairs of the House Environment and Natural Resources Policy and Finance Committee; the Chair of the Senate Environment, Climate and Legacy Committee; the co-chairs of the House Ways & Means Committee and the Chair of the Senate Finance Committee during the 2025 Special Legislative Session. As the DNR is now poised to launch this program after extensive preparation and planning, we - and the millions of Minnesotans who voted to establish it - look forward to having next year's funding available on schedule to meet the program goals.

The Environment & Natural Resources Trust Fund helps entities from all over Minnesota to protect, conserve, preserve, and enhance Minnesota's natural resources, including small towns to large urban cities, counties and watershed districts, Minnesota colleges and universities, non-profits, federal and state agencies, and more.

Thank you for your support of HF3426 and continued support of the Community Grants appropriation.

Minnesota House Environment and Natural Resources Finance and Policy Committee,

Dear Co-Chair Fischer, Co- Chair Heintzeman and Committee members,

I am writing on behalf of Land Stewardship Project's (LSP's) 4,500 member households made up of farmers, rural residents, and supporters in strong support of HF 3426. Specifically, section 39.26-40.4 which would expand the incredibly popular and effective Olmsted County Soil Health program to other counties within Southeast Minnesota.

A top priority for LSP is reducing the high levels of nitrates causing groundwater contamination at levels that put more than 9,000 residents in MN's Karst region under significant threat to human health. In April 2023, LSP and our [allies petitioned the EPA](#) to address unsafe levels of nitrate contamination resulting in EPA's issuing a request that state agencies address nitrates in Southeast Minnesota now. The problem is clear. It is time for the state to act boldly and invest accordingly.

At the root of the nitrate pollution problem are cropland acres dominated by corn which is the primary crop that utilizes synthetic nitrogen fertilizers. According to MPCA, areas of the state where nitrate pollution is high, like southeastern Minnesota, commercial application of fertilizer on cropland contributes more than 70% of the nitrate pollution. Small and mid-sized farms and rural communities around the state cannot thrive, or even survive, in an environment where the over-application of manure and fertilizers threatens human and ecosystem health. This is why the Olmsted County Soil Health program is an effective program incentivizing a third crop rotation of small grains, haying and grazing and cover crops which all have great water quality benefits and build soil health. This program pays for results which is a critical difference from other soil health programs, for instance, farmers can receive an additional payment for when they allow their cover crops to grow to a certain height, or if they plant directly into that cover crop.

We strongly urge the committee to support this funding and expand this critical program.
