Issue 1: Complexity of Cases

 Elder and vulnerable adult abuse present complex social and legal problems that are not easily solved by our justice systems or social service systems alone.

Prevalence of Elder Abuse

•1,000,000 – 2,000,000 adults in later life in U.S. are victims of abuse.¹

• 1 in 10 persons over the age 60 are victims of elder abuse.²

Prevalence of Elder Abuse

Victims of elder financial abuse in U.S. lose close to \$3 Billion each year.¹

•For every 1 case that is reported to authorities, 23 cases go unreported.²

Poly-victimization


• "Poly-victimization" refers to different forms of abuse occurring at the same time.

Between 10% and 40% of older adults experience polyvictimization.¹





Potential Human Services Policy Interventions

- Investments that will help APS with interventions
 - Housing supports
 - Cash assistance
 - Caregiver education and support
 - Home and community based services especially elderly waiver and the alternative care program

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 Investments in practices that promote the balance of autonomy and safety, such as supported decision making

Issue 2: Funding APS While Investing in Other Services

 Current funding sources and levels for APS can lead to disparate outcomes and services

 Need more funding to APS while recognizing it is not the only response to maltreatment

Invest in and support other services and programs



Disparate and Limited Results

- Even the most well-funded APS system will not address every case:
 - Victim may not be found to be "vulnerable"
 - APS investigation may end with a finding of "inconclusive"
 - The induvial for whom APS is trying to provide services needs much more sustained service than APS is designed to provide



Responses to Elder Abuse

- The Elder Justice Roadmap¹ tells us that as a best practice to address elder abuse, you must include:
 - Direct Service
 - Policy
 - Research
 - Education

Response in Time of COVID-19

- 19% increase in calls for help in 2020
- Increased isolation and concerns related to cause/effect of maltreatment
- Increased barriers for help for already vulnerable population
- Housing issues perpetrators living in homes, and maltreatment or isolation concerns in long term care facilities

 Investments in research to understand best practices regarding prevention and intervention

 Investments in programs that help reduce social isolation and other risk factors of maltreatment

• Investments in programs to help those advocates who help older adults and address the needs of perpetrators

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
