<p><b>HF499 - Marquart bill as amended in Hs Public Safety Committee</b></p> <p><u>\$3,000,000 in fiscal year 2023 is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of public safety for the director of the Homeland Security and Emergency Management Division (HSEM) to award grants in equal amounts to emergency management departments in the 87 counties, 11 federally recognized tribes, and four cities of the first class for planning and preparedness activities, including capital purchases.</u></p> <p><u>This amount is added to the base appropriation for this purpose. Local emergency management departments must make a request to HSEM for these grants. Current local funding for emergency management and preparedness activities may not be supplanted by these additional state funds. This amount is added to the base.</u></p> <p><u>(b) By March 15, 2024, the commissioner of public safety must submit a report on the grant awards to the chairs and ranking minority members of the legislative committees with jurisdiction over emergency management and preparedness activities. At a minimum, the report must summarize grantee activities and identify grant recipients.</u></p>	<p><b>House Omnibus Public Safety Bill Local Government Emergency Management</b></p> <p>\$1,500,000 in fiscal year 2023 for grants in equal amounts to the emergency management organizations of the 87 counties, 11 federally recognized Tribes, and four cities of the first class for planning and preparedness activities, including capital purchases.</p> <p>Local emergency management organizations must make a request to the Homeland Security and Emergency Management Division for these grants. Current local funding for emergency management and preparedness activities may not be supplanted by these additional state funds.</p> <p><b>The commissioner may use up to one percent of the appropriation received under this paragraph to pay costs incurred</b> by the department in administering the local government emergency management grant program.</p> <p><b>By March 15, 2023, the commissioner of public safety must submit a report on the grant awards</b> to the chairs and ranking minority members of the legislative committees with jurisdiction over emergency management and preparedness activities. At a minimum, the report must identify grant recipients, 2.34 summarize grantee activities, <b>and recommend whether or not to continue the grant program in future years.</b></p>	<p><b>Senate Omnibus Judiciary Bill Local Government Emergency Management</b></p> <p>\$3,000,000 is to award grants in equal amounts to the emergency management organizations of the 87 counties, 11 federally recognized tribes, and four cities of the first class for reimbursement of planning and preparedness activities, including capital purchases, <b>that are eligible under federal emergency preparedness grant guidelines. Local emergency management organizations must make a request to HSEM for these grants.</b></p> <p>Current local funding for emergency management and preparedness activities may not be supplanted by these additional state funds. Of this amount, <b>up to one percent may be used for the department's administrative costs. This appropriation does not lapse and is available until expended. Unspent money may be redistributed to eligible local emergency management organizations.</b></p> <p><b>By February 15 of each odd-numbered year, the commissioner shall submit a report on the grant awards</b> to the chairs and ranking minority members of the legislative committees with jurisdiction over emergency management and preparedness activities. At a minimum, the report must identify grant recipients <b>and give detailed information on how the grantees used the money received.</b></p>

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
