2.5 for the borrower's own personal, family, or household purpose. A consumer small loan is
2.6 a short-term, unsecured loan to be repaid in a single installment. The cash advance of a
2.7 consumer small loan is equal to or less than \$350. A consumer small loan includes an
2.8 indebtedness evidenced by but not limited to a promissory note or agreement to defer the
2.9 presentation of a personal check for a fee.

2.10 (b) "Consumer small loan lender" is a financial institution as defined in section 47.59
2.11 or a business entity registered with the commissioner and engaged in the business of making
2.12 consumer small loans.

2.13 (c) "Annual percentage rate" means a measure of the cost of credit, expressed as a yearly
2.14 rate, that relates the amount and timing of value received by the consumer to the amount
2.15 and timing of payments made. Annual percentage interest rate includes all interest, finance
2.16 charges, and fees. The annual percentage rate shall be determined in accordance with either
