1.8	Subdivision 1. Definition. For purposes of this section, "carjacking" means taking a
1.9	motor vehicle from a person or in the presence of another while having knowledge of not
1.10	being entitled to the motor vehicle and using or threatening the imminent use of force against
1.11	any person to overcome the person's resistance or powers of resistance to, or to compel
1.12	acquiescence in, the taking of the motor vehicle.
1.13	Subd. 2. Use of information collected. (a) The head of a local law enforcement agency
1.14	or state law enforcement department that employs peace officers, as defined in section
1.15	626.84, subdivision 1, paragraph (c), must forward the following carjacking information
