Sec. 7. <u>APPROPRIATION</u>; INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT AND JOBS ACT MATCHING FUNDS MANAGEMENT.

(a) \$30,000,000 in fiscal year 2022 is appropriated from the general fund to the
commissioner of management and budget to provide state matching funds to support
applications for federal competitive grant programs under Public Law 117-58, the
Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA).

- (b) The funds appropriated under this section may be used to support applications filed by state agencies as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 3.3005, subdivision 1, for competitive grant programs under IIJA with notices of funding opportunity that open to applications between May 23, 2022, and March 15, 2023. This is a onetime appropriation and is available until June 30, 2024, unless transferred to a state agency under paragraph (f).
- (c) A state agency submitting a competitive grant application with a state matching funds requirement may submit a request for an allocation of funds under this section to the commissioner of management and budget no later than 15 days prior to either the closing date of the notice of funding opportunity application period or the anticipated application submission date, whichever is earlier. A request for allocation shall include information about the notice of funding opportunity, the total amount of the proposed expenditure, the purpose of the proposed expenditure, the time period of the proposed expenditure, and any additional information the commissioner of management and budget determines necessary to properly document the proposed expenditure.
- (d) The commissioner of management and budget may allocate funds under this section for an application submitted under paragraph (c). For the purposes of federal review and evaluation criteria, allocated funds are appropriated and committed to the uses outlined in the agency's grant application. Once allocated, funds under this section are unavailable for reallocation to other application match requirements unless the agency receives formal notice that its application is no longer under consideration or the agency withdraws its application. Agencies shall promptly notify the commissioner of management and budget of relevant changes to the application status of grants using funds under this section.
- (e) After the commissioner of management and budget allocates funds to a grant application under this section, the commissioner must submit a notification to the Legislative Advisory Commission, established under Minnesota Statutes, section 3.30, three days prior to either the closing date of the notice of funding opportunity application period or the anticipated application submission date, whichever is earlier.
