My son was an eloper and he could run fast and climb out of structures starting at 7 months old. By three he was faster than I was and he'd just get it in his head to go somewhere and take off. He had no fear. I tried taking him to playgrounds by myself so he could burn off energy, but he would run and no one would help me capture him.

I have disabilities myself, so I could not run after him. I just had to hope someone would catch him as we passed and I yelled, "please grab him" or I'd have to wait for him to decide to come back and hope he didn't run out into the street. Even when he went with his dad with no physical disabilities, it was difficult to keep him from running off and getting into roadways or ponds/lakes.

It was so stressful, that we'd have to go with a leash on (which doesn't really let him climb the big structures or play) or we'd have to go with another person who was capable of running after him (which was rare) or we'd have to go to a playground that was inside and contained within doors and pay fees to let him play (and he missed out on the outdoors).

Additionally, due to my own physical disabilities, I couldn't play with him unless we happened to be at a playground that was more inclusive and allowed me to walk up ramp ways. In California, I was able to go to a playground that was fenced in and it was awesome. That was truly inclusive for people like my son.
