Fortunately, HF-1355 addresses this by reducing penalties for possession of a small personal amount of non-flower THC products to a petty misdemeanor. The bill also removes possession of a small amount of marijuana from the definition of "crime of violence." This is a step in the right direction.

In addition, HF-1355 would improve police-community trust. When people are fearful of arrest and jail time because they have small amounts of marijuana products, they will not talk to police. Fear and distrust of police are what prevent people from sharing information with and reporting crimes to law enforcement.
