At any hearing, interested persons shall be permitted to present their views on the plan and budget.~~

(d) The commission shall review each master plan to determine whether it meets the conditions of subdivision 6. If it does not, the commission shall return the plan with its comments to the district for revision and resubmittal.

56.24 (b) The conveyance must be in a form approved by the attorney general. The attorney  
56.25 general may make changes to the land description to correct errors and ensure accuracy.

56.26 (c) The land to be sold is located in St. Louis County and is described as:

56.27 Government Lot 2, EXCEPT the South 760 feet; AND EXCEPT that part of Government  
56.28 Lot 2, shown as Parcel 75 on Minnesota Department of Transportation Right of Way  
56.29 Plat No. 69-181, Section 18, Township 62 North, Range 20 West.

56.30 (d) The county has determined that the county's land management interests would best

57.2 (a) Notwithstanding the public sale and competitive bidding requirements of Minnesota  
57.3 Statutes, chapter 373, or other law to the contrary, St. Louis County may sell by private sale  
57.4 the county fee-owned lands described in paragraph (b).

57.5 (b) The lands to be sold are located in St. Louis County, Section 34, Township 51 North,  
57.6 Range 18 West, and are described as:

57.7 (1) Lots 1, 2, 3, 10, 11, and 12, Block B, including part of the vacated alley adjacent and  
57.8 including part of vacated 3rd Avenue adjacent, Brookston;

57.18 (a) Notwithstanding Minnesota Statutes, sections 92.45, 94.09, and 94.10, the  
57.19 commissioner of natural resources may convey by private sale the surplus land that is  
57.20 described in paragraph (c) to the city of Elgin for no consideration.

57.21 (b) The commissioner may make necessary changes to the legal description to correct  
57.22 errors and ensure accuracy.

57.23 (c) The land that may be conveyed is located in Wabasha County and is described as:

57.24 (1) OUTLOT A, OUTLOT B, and OUTLOT C of WHITEWATER WAY, according  
57.25 to the plat on file and of record in the Office of the County Recorder in and for Wabasha  
57.26 County, Minnesota; and

57.27 (2) that part of the West Half of the Northeast Quarter of Section 27, Township 108  
57.28 North, Range 12 West, Wabasha County, Minnesota, described as follows: beginning at a
