1.5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.6	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 275.065, subdivision 3, is amended to read:
1.7	Subd. 3. Notice of proposed property taxes. (a) The county auditor shall prepare and
1.8	the county treasurer shall deliver after November 10 and on or before November 24 each
1.9	year, by first class mail to each taxpayer at the address listed on the county's current year's
1.10	assessment roll, a notice of proposed property taxes. Upon written request by the taxpayer,
1.11	the treasurer may send the notice in electronic form or by electronic mail instead of on paper
1.12	or by ordinary mail.
1.13	(b) The commissioner of revenue shall prescribe the form of the notice.
1.14	(c) The notice must inform taxpayers that it contains the amount of property taxes each
1.15	taxing authority proposes to collect for taxes payable the following year. In the case of a
1.16	town, or in the case of the state general tax, the final tax amount will be its proposed tax.
1.17	The notice must clearly state for each city that has a population over 500, county, school
1.18	district, regional library authority established under section 134.201, metropolitan taxing
1.19	districts as defined in paragraph (i), and fire protection and emergency medical services
1.20	special taxing districts established under section 144F.01, the time and place of a meeting
1.21	for each taxing authority in which the budget and levy will be discussed and public input
1.22	allowed, prior to the final budget and levy determination. The taxing authorities must provide
1.23	the county auditor with the information to be included in the notice on or before the time it

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certifies its proposed levy under subdivision 1. The public must be allowed to speak at that 2.1 meeting, which must occur after November 24 and must not be held before 6:00 p.m. It 2.2 must provide a website address and a telephone number for the taxing authority that taxpayers 2.3 may call if they have questions related to the notice and an address where comments will 2.4 be received by mail, except that no notice required under this section shall be interpreted 2.5 as requiring the printing of a personal telephone number or address as the contact information 2.6 for a taxing authority. If a taxing authority does not maintain a website or public offices 2.7 where telephone calls can be received by the authority, the authority may inform the county 2.8 of the lack of a public website or telephone number and the county shall not list a website 2.9 or telephone number for that taxing authority. 2.10

2.11 (d) The notice must state for each parcel:

(1) the market value of the property as determined under section 273.11, and used for
computing property taxes payable in the following year and for taxes payable in the current
year as each appears in the records of the county assessor on November 1 of the current
year; and, in the case of residential property, whether the property is classified as homestead
or nonhomestead. The notice must clearly inform taxpayers of the years to which the market
values apply and that the values are final values;

(2) the items listed below, shown separately by county, city or town, and state general
tax, agricultural homestead credit under section 273.1384, school building bond agricultural
credit under section 273.1387, voter approved school levy, other local school levy, and the
sum of the special taxing districts, and as a total of all taxing authorities:

2.22 (i) the actual tax for taxes payable in the current year; and

2.23 (ii) the proposed tax amount.

If the county levy under clause (2) includes an amount for a lake improvement district as defined under sections 103B.501 to 103B.581, the amount attributable for that purpose must be separately stated from the remaining county levy amount.

In the case of a town or the state general tax, the final tax shall also be its proposed tax 2.27 unless the town changes its levy at a special town meeting under section 365.52. If a school 2.28 district has certified under section 126C.17, subdivision 9, that a referendum will be held 2.29 in the school district at the November general election, the county auditor must note next 2.30 to the school district's proposed amount that a referendum is pending and that, if approved 2.31 by the voters, the tax amount may be higher than shown on the notice. In the case of the 2.32 city of Minneapolis, the levy for Minneapolis Park and Recreation shall be listed separately 2.33 from the remaining amount of the city's levy. In the case of the city of St. Paul, the levy for 2.34

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the St. Paul Library Agency must be listed separately from the remaining amount of the

3.2 city's levy. In the case of Ramsey County, any amount levied under section 134.07 may be

3.3 listed separately from the remaining amount of the county's levy. In the case of a parcel

3.4 where tax increment or the fiscal disparities areawide tax under chapter 276A or 473F

3.5 applies, the proposed tax levy on the captured value or the proposed tax levy on the tax

3.6 capacity subject to the areawide tax must each be stated separately and not included in the

3.7 sum of the special taxing districts; and

3.8 (3) the increase or decrease between the total taxes payable in the current year and the3.9 total proposed taxes, expressed as a percentage.

3.10 For purposes of this section, the amount of the tax on homesteads qualifying under the 3.11 senior citizens' property tax deferral program under chapter 290B is the total amount of 3.12 property tax before subtraction of the deferred property tax amount.

3.13 (e) The notice must clearly state that the proposed or final taxes do not include the3.14 following:

- 3.15 (1) special assessments;
- 3.16 (2) levies approved by the voters after the date the proposed taxes are certified, including
 3.17 bond referenda and school district levy referenda;
- 3.18 (3) a levy limit increase approved by the voters by the first Tuesday after the first Monday
 3.19 in November of the levy year as provided under section 275.73;
- 3.20 (4) amounts necessary to pay cleanup or other costs due to a natural disaster occurring
 3.21 after the date the proposed taxes are certified;
- 3.22 (5) amounts necessary to pay tort judgments against the taxing authority that become3.23 final after the date the proposed taxes are certified; and

3.24 (6) the contamination tax imposed on properties which received market value reductions3.25 for contamination.

- (f) Except as provided in subdivision 7, failure of the county auditor to prepare or the
 county treasurer to deliver the notice as required in this section does not invalidate the
 proposed or final tax levy or the taxes payable pursuant to the tax levy.
- 3.29 (g) If the notice the taxpayer receives under this section lists the property as
 3.30 nonhomestead, and satisfactory documentation is provided to the county assessor by the
 3.31 applicable deadline, and the property qualifies for the homestead classification in that

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assessment year, the assessor shall reclassify the property to homestead for taxes payable 4.1 in the following year. 4.2 (h) In the case of class 4 residential property used as a residence for lease or rental 4.3 periods of 30 days or more, the taxpayer must either: 4.4 4.5 (1) mail or deliver a copy of the notice of proposed property taxes to each tenant, renter, or lessee; or 4.6 (2) post a copy of the notice in a conspicuous place on the premises of the property. 4.7 The notice must be mailed or posted by the taxpayer by November 27 or within three 4.8 days of receipt of the notice, whichever is later. A taxpayer may notify the county treasurer 4.9 of the address of the taxpayer, agent, caretaker, or manager of the premises to which the 4.10 notice must be mailed in order to fulfill the requirements of this paragraph. 4.11 (i) For purposes of this subdivision and subdivision 6, "metropolitan special taxing 4.12 districts" means the following taxing districts in the seven-county metropolitan area that 4.13 levy a property tax for any of the specified purposes listed below: 4.14 (1) Metropolitan Council under section 473.132, 473.167, 473.249, 473.325, 473.446, 4.15 473.521, 473.547, or 473.834; 4.16 (2) Metropolitan Airports Commission under section 473.667, 473.671, or 473.672; and 4.17 (3) Metropolitan Mosquito Control Commission under section 473.711. 4.18 For purposes of this section, any levies made by the regional rail authorities in the county 4.19 of Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, Ramsey, Scott, or Washington under chapter 398A 4.20 shall be included with the appropriate county's levy. 4.21 (j) The governing body of a county, city, or school district may, with the consent of the 4.22 county board, include supplemental information with the statement of proposed property 4.23 4.24 taxes about the impact of state aid increases or decreases on property tax increases or decreases and on the level of services provided in the affected jurisdiction. This supplemental 4.25 information may include information for the following year, the current year, and for as 4.26 many consecutive preceding years as deemed appropriate by the governing body of the 4.27 county, city, or school district. It may include only information regarding: 4.28 (1) the impact of inflation as measured by the implicit price deflator for state and local 4.29 government purchases; 4.30 (2) population growth and decline; 4.31

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(4) other financial factors that affect the level of property taxation and local services

5.11	The county auditor must prepare a separate statement supplemental information to be
5.12	delivered with the notice of proposed taxes described in subdivision 3. The statement
5.13	information must fit on one sheet of paper and contain for each parcel:
5.14	(1) for the county, eity or township, all home rule charter or statutory cities and school
5.15	district in which the parcel lies districts within the county, the certified levy for the current
5.16	taxes payable year, the proposed levy for taxes payable in the following year, and the increase
5.17	or decrease between these two amounts, expressed as a percentage; and each listed separately.
5.18	(2) summary budget information listed in paragraph (b).
5.19	(b) Summary budget information must contain budget data from the county, city, and
5.20	school district that proposes a property tax levy on the parcel for taxes payable the following
5.21	year. For the school district, the summary budget data must include the information provided
5.22	to the public under section 123B.10, subdivision 1, paragraph (b), for the current year and
5.23	prior year. For the county and city, the reported summary budget data must contain the same
5.24	information, in the same categories, and in the same format as provided to the Office of the

 7.16 category listed in paragraph (b), then the taxing authority must designate the amount as "0"

- 7.18 (d) The supplemental statement information provided under this subdivision must be
 7.19 sent in electronic form or by email if the taxpayer requests an electronic version of the notice
 7.20 of proposed property taxes under subdivision 3, paragraph (a).

Subd. 4. Costs. If the reasonable cost of the county auditor's services and the cost of
preparing and mailing the notice required in this section exceed the amount distributed to
the county by the commissioner of revenue to administer this section, the county may require
the taxing authority <u>must to</u> reimburse the county for the excess cost. The excess cost must
be apportioned between taxing jurisdictions as follows:

- 7.29 (1) one-third is allocated to the county;
- 7.30 (2) one-third is allocated to cities and towns within the county; and
- 7.31 (3) one-third is allocated to school districts within the county.

8.1	The amounts in clause (2) must be further apportioned among the cities and towns in
8.2	the proportion that the number of parcels in the city and town bears to the number of parcels
8.3	in all the cities and towns within the county. The amount in clause (3) must be further
8.4	apportioned among the school districts in the proportion that the number of parcels in the
8.5	school district bears to the number of parcels in all school districts within the county.
