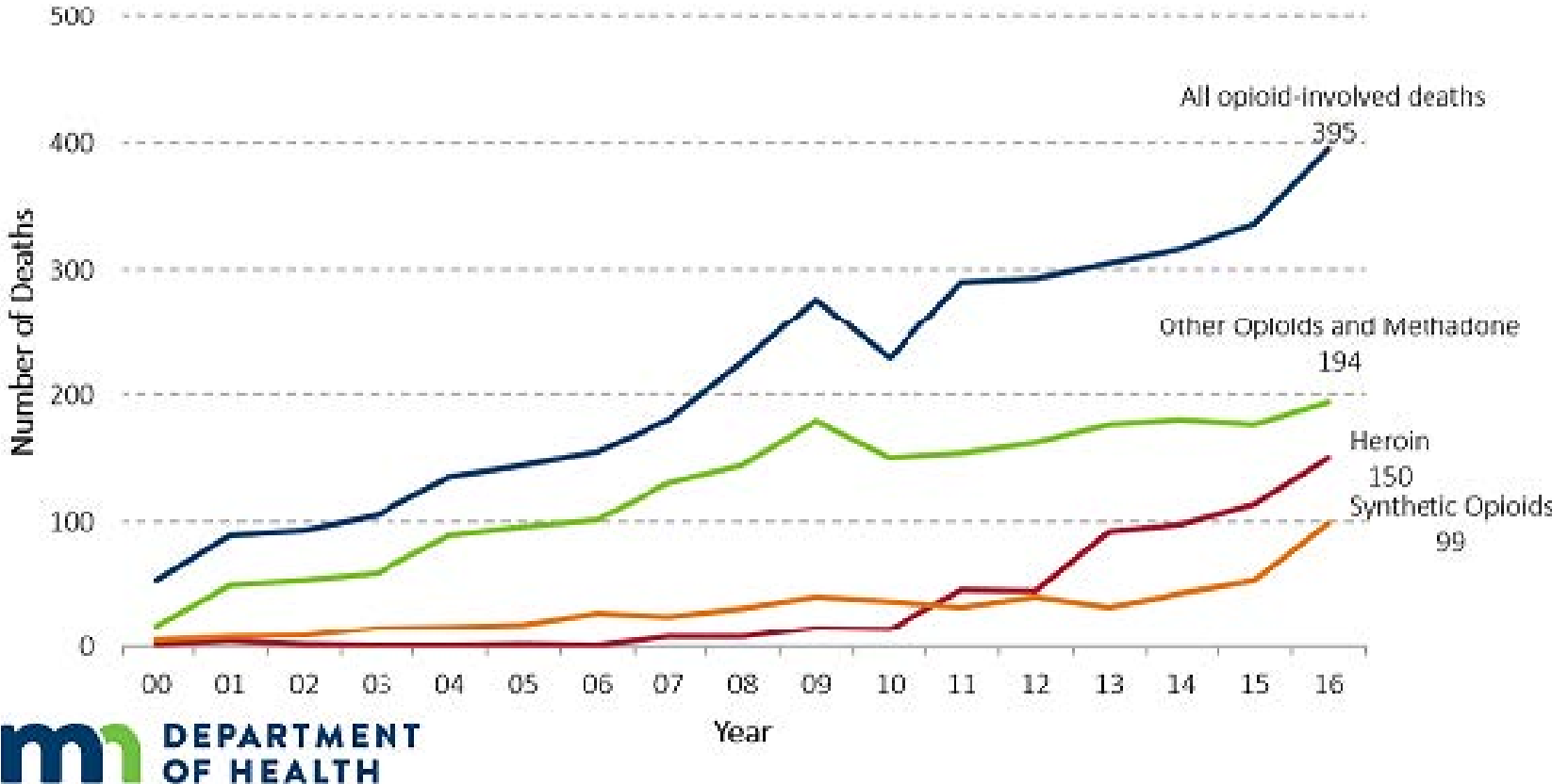
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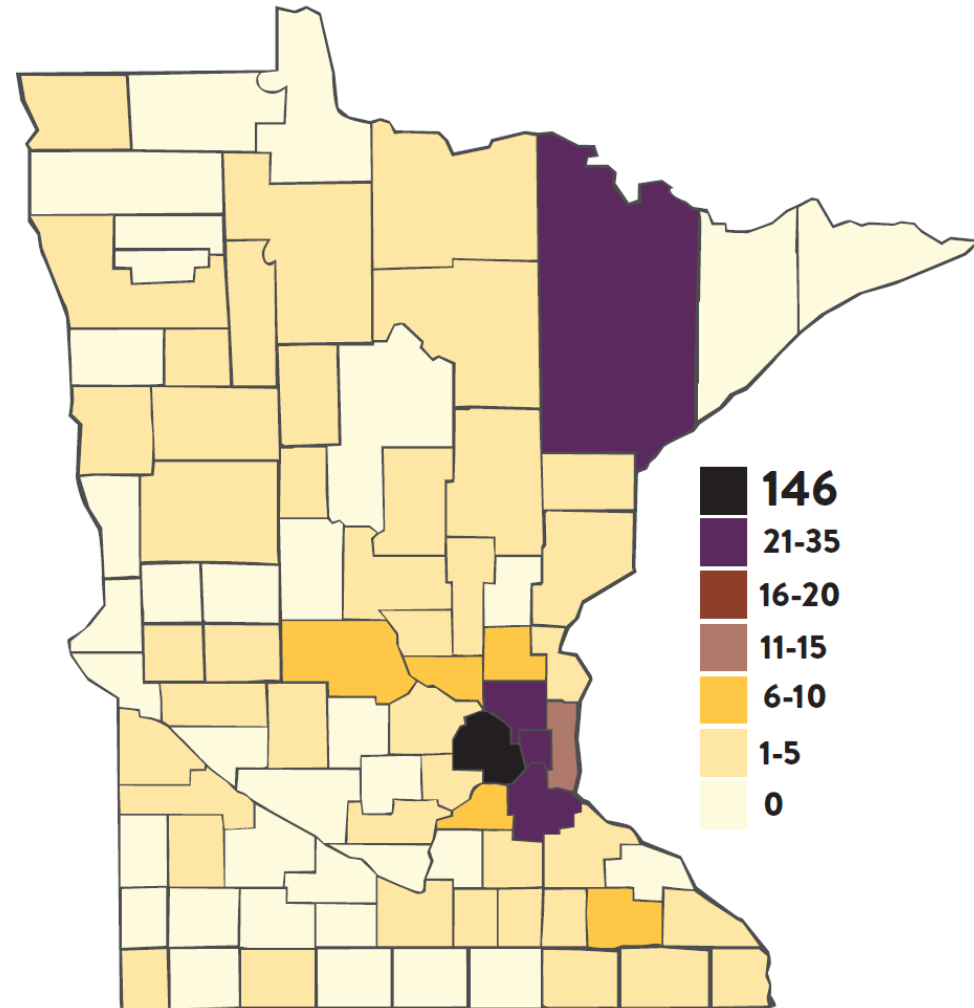

Opioid crisis

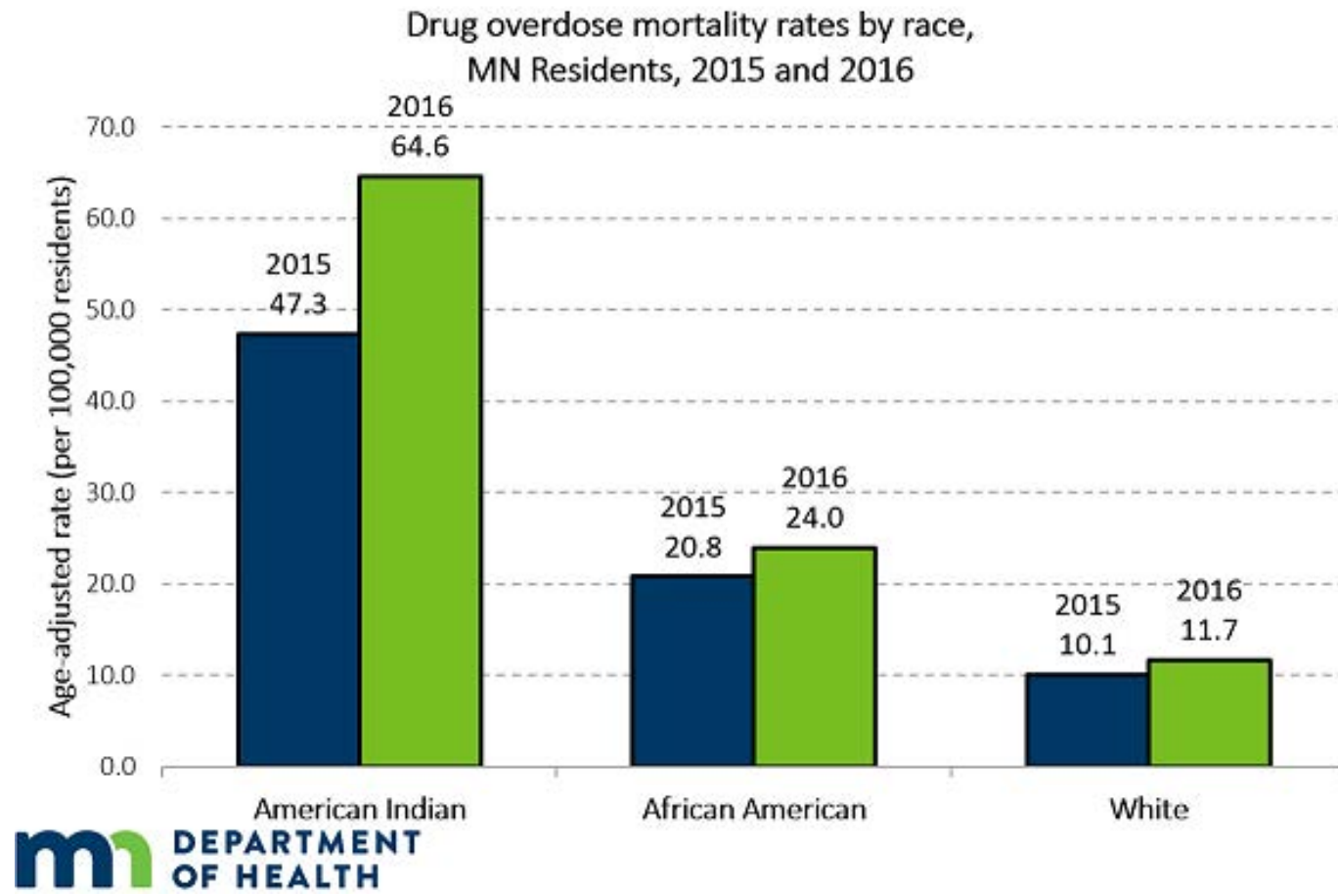
Opioid-involved deaths continue to increase in Minnesota, driver by heroin and other synthetic opioids (i.e. fentanyl, tramadol)

State Targeted Response to the Opioid Crisis (STR)	Medically Assisted Therapy (MAT) grant
Two year, \$10.6 Million grant	Three year, \$6 million grant
Increase access to treatment, reduce unmet treatment need and reduce opioid overdose related deaths.	Grants to the White Earth Nation, Red Lake Nation and Fairview Health Services

State Targeted Response to the Opioid Crisis grant

- Two-year, \$10.6 million “State Targeted Response to the Opioid Crisis” (STR) federal grant to:
 - Increase access to treatment
 - Reduce unmet treatment need
 - Reduce opioid overdose related deaths

STR: Moving fast to address the opioid crisis

- Federal RFP published December 16, 2016
- Applications due to SAMHSA February 17, 2017
- 27 sole source contracts, interagency agreements, and amendments funded by DHS
- RFP issued
 - 69 proposals received
 - 12 proposals funded

- Funds used for grants to tribes, counties and community agencies
- Supplement ongoing proven effective substance use disorder services, as well as offer new and innovative approaches
- Aimed at addressing the opioid crisis through prevention, increasing access to treatment and reducing opioid overdose related deaths
- Based on unmet need for opioid use disorder treatment and drug poisoning deaths

- \$1,299,846: Naloxone Distribution
- \$525,000: Integrated Care for High Risk Pregnancies (ICHiRP)
- \$745,400: Parent Child Assistance Program (PCAP)
- \$220,000: Mothers' recovery training

STR grants (continued)

- \$1,614,000: Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes (ECHO) Hub
- \$750,000: Office Based Opioid Treatment (OBOT)
- \$525,000: Peer recovery services
- \$382,800: Recently released from incarceration program

STR grants (continued)

- \$135,000: Access to treatment
- \$600,000: Detox
- \$530,075: Care Coordination
- \$300,000: Rule 25 Assessments
- \$2,190,537: Prevention
- \$625,000: Innovation grants

- Minnesota has been awarded a \$6 Million, 3-year federal grant to expand access to medication-assisted treatment in order to decrease the ongoing epidemic of opioid use and its terrible cost to individuals, families and communities

- MAT combines behavioral therapy and medications to treat substance use disorders
 - Medication-assisted treatment uses certain drugs to relieve the withdrawal symptoms and psychological cravings that cause chemical imbalances in the body
 - Medication-assisted treatment programs provide a safe and controlled level of medication to overcome opioid dependence
 - FDA has approved several different medications to treat opioid addiction and alcohol dependence, such as buprenorphine, naltrexone, and methadone

Increasing access to MAT

- The grant is used to fund two tribes and one health care provider to expand access to MAT:
 - White Earth \$609,392
 - Red Lake \$499,815
 - Fairview \$470,793

- \$6 billion for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services for drug abuse prevention, treatment, and recovery programs to address the opioid epidemic.
