

NONPROFIT INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT PROGRAM RESULTS

The Nonprofit Infrastructure Grant Program (NIGP) supports the missions of small, culturally led organizations by strengthening their infrastructure. Building the capacity of small organizations that focus on historically underserved cultural communities helps position them to have greater impact in their community and increases their ability to secure and manage the requirements of public funding in the future. Due to the success and high demand for support during the first three NIGP rounds, we are requesting funds to continue this work.

GRANTEE FINDINGS

Over the first 3 rounds, funds have supported 70 organizations (27% of the 391 that applied) that connect ethnic minority populations, who are often isolated and marginalized, to needed services. Their services provide a social safety net and drive employment, community, and economic development.

- **83% developed financial and administrative systems for tracking financial health**
- **54% invested in hardware and software for operational efficiencies**
- **40% invested in their board development**
- **32% began or formalized partnerships to expand their services & outreach**
- **49% leveraged funds to raise new revenue and create fundraising tracking & management systems**
- **153 staff or consultants (full or part-time) were hired to implement/manage new infrastructure**
- **94% likely to apply for state or other publicly funded grants in the future**




NIGP PROGRAM OVERVIEW

A total of \$3,500,000 has been appropriated to Propel Nonprofits over the 3 funding rounds for a six-year period from July 2017 to June 2023. Each grant ranged from \$8,000 to \$50,000.
