\$1 Million: Dynamic Experiences & Access

St. Paul

- Additions to Super Awesome Adventures, combining physical play with imagination and storytelling
- A new experience in Imaginopolis, designed to spark creative thinking
- Enhanced toddler experiences to better serve families with young learners
- Special summer programming in partnership with artists and other community partners

Rochester

- Changing exhibits to provide hands-on learning experiences for children and families
- Community partnerships to enhance experiences
- Scholarship memberships to ensure access for lowincome families

\$300,000: Engaging Communities in Playful Learning

Statewide Initiative

The museum will bring playful learning experiences and supportive resources to a geographically diverse set of communities across the state.

- Collaborate with select communities to shape engagement
- Host community events with parents, educators, pediatricians and local leaders to highlight benefits of play in early childhood development
- Provide resources for lasting support for playful learning

\$200.000: New STEM Exhibit in Rochester

Science, Technology, Engineering & Math (STEM) Experiences

Funds to build a new permanent exhibit promoting STEM learning for early childhood. This exhibit will center around skills such as creative and critical thinking that are critical to developing early STEM skills.


