- (6) a plan describing the proposed investment of the proceeds of the qualified equity investment, including the types of qualified active low-income community businesses in which the applicant expects to invest. Applicants are not required to identify qualified

(7) a nonrefundable application fee of \$5,000. This fee must be paid to the department and is required for each application submitted; and

(8) the refundable performance fee required by section 116X.08.

Within 30 days after receipt of a completed application containing the information in subdivision 1, including the payment of the application fee and the refundable performance fee, the department shall grant or deny the application in full or in part. If the department denies any part of the application, it shall inform the qualified community development entity of the grounds for the denial. If the qualified community development entity provides any additional information required by the department or otherwise completes its application within 15 days of the notice of denial, the application is considered completed as of the original date of submission. If the qualified community development entity fails to provide the information or complete its application within the 15-day period, the application remains denied and must be resubmitted in full with a new submission date.
