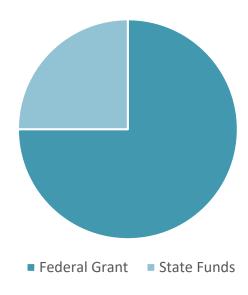


What Is A MFCU?

- Medicaid Fraud Control Unit housed in Minnesota AG's office.
 - All 50 States have MFCUs, most of which are in AGOs, as do DC, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.
- Law enforcement entity.
 - MFCUs investigate and prosecute their own criminal and civil cases.
 - Minnesota MFCU staffing includes:
 - 7 attorneys.
 - 17 investigators
 - Supervising Investigator (manager).
 - Lead Investigators.
 - Nurse Investigators.
 - Investigators.
 - 2 analysts.
 - 2 paralegals.
 - 4 legal support staff.

How Does A MFCU Operate?

- Partially funded by federal grant.
 - 75% of MFCU expenses funded through federal grant.
 Remaining 25% through State funds.
- Federal law sets specific performance standards for compliance with federal grant and federal law.
 - 42 CFR Part 1007.
 - Office of Inspector General frequently issues policy guidance to MFCUs on areas ranging from authority to prosecute to proposed plea agreements.



What Can a MFCU Do?

- Investigate and prosecute Medicaid provider fraud.
 - Original jurisdiction under State law. See Minn. Stat. § 256B.12
 - May also investigate and prosecute certain crimes arising out of same set of circumstances.
- Investigate and prosecute "patient abuse and neglect."
 - Crimes against people living in Medicaid funded facilities, regardless of whether the victim abused, neglected, or exploited received insurance through Minnesota medical assistance program.
 - Generally covered by neglect or abuse of vulnerable adult statutes and financial exploitation statutes, but may include others.
 - AG's office lacks original jurisdiction to prosecute these crimes, so the Minnesota MFCU requires referral from local county attorney.
- Assist other law enforcement and prosecutorial entities in the above cases.
 - Assisted federal law enforcement in cases brought by the USAO.
 - Will assist counties upon request.

What Can A MFCU Not Do?

- Investigations not covered under federal grant.
 - Recipient fraud, i.e., fraud in obtaining Medicaid benefits.
 - Other criminal offenses that do not arise out of same set of circumstances as permissible activities.
 - Not permissible: investigate contraband (drugs, guns) found on site while executing a premises warrant.
 - Permissible: investigate the concealing of criminal proceeds of money swindled from the Medicaid program by an enrolled provider.
- MFCUs are prohibited from involving themselves in actions of single state agencies (Minnesota DHS).
 - Cannot tell DHS to not suspend a particular provider's payments.
 - Cannot tell DHS to lift suspension or revoke administrative action.
 - Cannot tell DHS to take any administrative action against a provider.

What Does the MFCU Investigate?

Recent provider cases.

- Dentists.
- Physical therapists.
- Acupuncturists.
- Chiropractors.
- Mental health therapists.
- Nurses.
- Doctors.

- Home health care provider agencies and individuals.
 - Home and community based (waivered) services, home care nursing, adult rehabilitative mental health services, personal care assistant services.
- Non-Emergency medical transportation companies and individuals.
- Substance abuse treatment providers.
- EIDBI services.







How Does the MFCU Get Its Cases?

- Minnesota Department of Human Services.
- Managed Care Organizations (UCare, Blue Cross/Blue Shield, Medica, and others).
- Local, state, or federal law enforcement.
- Other state agencies.
- Tips from the public.

MFCU Investigators

1 Supervising Investigator

Performs people management of investigators and analysts, trains new hires, conducts pre-employment screening and 1st round of new applicant interviews for investigators, conducts trainings for investigators, leads outreach efforts with other organizations, assists with investigates complex fraud and abuse/neglect cases.

■ 1 Investigative Auditor

investigates complex fraud and abuse/neglect cases, reviews incoming referrals from DHS / MCO's, performs various statistical and grant-related tasks.

3 Lead Investigators

investigates complex fraud and abuse/neglect cases and trains new hires.

2 Nurse Investigators

leads investigations of abuse/neglect cases, assists with fraud cases, screens abuse/neglect referrals.

1 Lead Analyst

conducts complex data analysis to assist investigators with larger investigations, assists with pre-employment screening and 1st round of new applicant interviews for analysts.

10 Investigators

investigate billing fraud and abuse/neglect.

Investigative Staff Backgrounds:

- Banking / Financial.
- Accounting.
- Local / Federal Law Enforcement.
- Corrections / Probation / Parole.
- Nursing.
- Health care investigations.
- Private investigations.
- Military.

MFCU Budget

- Annual budget set and approved by US Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Inspector General.
- Federal government pays 75% of costs of MFCU costs, while State pay for 25%.
- Each MFCU unit size based on the size of its State Medicaid Budget.
 - For instance, in 2023, California had a Medicaid budget of \$156.6 billion and a MFCU staff of 256, while South Dakota had a Medicaid budget of \$1.275 billion and a MFCU staff of 5.
- Minnesota MFCU size presently at 32. Was initially set at this size when State Medicaid Budget was \$13 billion.
- Based on a Minnesota State Medicaid operating budget of approximately \$20 billion, Minnesota
 MFCU staff size expected to be 41.

Minnesota MFCU Staff Size

 Minnesota MFCU staff size has not increased at same rate as State Medicaid spending.

Minnesota MFCU Staff Size

 States with similar Medicaid budgets often have larger staffs than Minnesota MFCU.

Minnesota MFCU Results

- Despite staff size limitations, Minnesota MFCU regularly outpaces peer states in number of fraud convictions.
- Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Inspector General noted that from 2020 2022, Minnesota had the most provider fraud convictions when compared with similarly sized states (with staff sizes between 22 and 38).
- In most recent reporting years (2023 and 2024), Minnesota MFCU outpaced other States with larger budgets and staff sizes in fraud convictions.

Minnesota MFCU Budget Request

- Minnesota MFCU asking for staff to grow from 32 to 41, an increase of 9 people.
- Growth in line with what is expected of us by U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General.

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Minnesota MFCU Policy Change Request

- Amend Minn. Stat. § 609.466 to address current gaps in legislation.
 - Current statute only applies to fraudulent claims submitted to State agency (DHS), not to managed care organizations.
 - Revised statute would apply to fraudulent claims submitted to any payor.
 - Current statute is an attempt crime, not a completed theft crime, and only carries a single penalty provision, with a maximum penalty of 2.5 years in prison, and does not contain any aggregation or venue provisions.
 - Revised statute would align with other theft statute penalties, and would carry both aggregation and venue provisions to mirror other theft statutes.
 - Revised statute, designed by MFCU prosecutors to address issues raised in district courts, will close other loopholes that current statutes do not cover.

Minnesota MFCU Policy Change Request

- Amendments to Minn. Stat. § 256B.12 and 628.26, subd. (f) necessary based on recodification of Minn. Stat. § 609.466 to 609.467.
- Amendment to Minn. Stat. § 8.16 would provide that, when AGO is conducting a provider fraud investigation under Minn. Stat. § 256B.12, the AGO same authority to subpoena financial records as county attorneys do when they conduct welfare fraud investigations.
