The 9,000 square foot building will feature a reception area, classrooms, permanent and temporary exhibit space, a community gathering area and gallery space to showcase and expand the value of the sanctuary as a place for cultural healing, life-long learning and inspiration.

This gathering place, as part of the Great River Passage Initiative, will offer important and unique educational opportunities to learn about the indigenous Peoples of Minnesota, our shared histories, and current urban ecology. With dramatic views of the river and downtown, the area offers spectacular opportunities for hiking and biking a stunning network of Mississippi River Corridor trails.

LOWER PHALEN CREEK PROJECT PARTNERS WITH THE CITY OF SAINT PAUL

Lower Phalen Creek Project was founded in 1997 by a group of volunteers as a partnership between the East Side and Lowertown neighborhoods working in collaboration with the City of Saint Paul.

The plan for Wakáŋ Tipi Center builds on the efforts of the forward-looking Lower Phalen Creek Project volunteers who have collaborated with the City of Saint Paul for nearly two decades.

Their efforts have resulted in more than \$10 million in investment to reclaim the area by city, state, and federal agencies, as well as private donors. The City of Saint Paul maintains the Sanctuary as a city park and has partnered with LPCP through development and long-term lease agreements. LPCP will be responsible to raise \$8.6 million to build Wakán Tipi Center, plus a \$750,000 reserve fund for maintenance and operations, along with sole responsibility to develop and operate programs in the Center.
