WHAT IS CIVIL LEGAL SERVICES?

Civil Legal Services ("CLS") – or "legal aid" – is free legal help to people with low incomes who have civil (non-criminal) legal problems.

Civil Legal Services is more than the definition above. It is about dignity and basic human needs.


It is about justice for all, not just those who can afford it.

THE NEED FOR CIVIL LEGAL SERVICES



Due to lack of resources, CLS is forced to turn away <u>over half</u> of the eligible people seeking service.

In Minnesota, there is one private attorney for every 432 potential paying clients, compared to one legal aid attorney for every 5,773 low-income individuals.



*At or below 125% of Federal Poverty Guidelines (\$32,188 annual income for a family of 4)

*A civil legal issue (Focus on basic needs: safety, shelter, health, and sustenance)

> *Legal merit *Availablity of other resources

CLS provides access to the justice system for Black, Indigenous, and People of Color; people with disabilities; the elderly; the LGBTQ community; and veterans. These populations have disproportionate numbers of people with low incomes who qualify for CLS services.

DEMOGRAPHICS

Diversity, equity, and inclusion are core values of CLS, central to our cause of equal justice for all.

112,433 Minnesotans served


In 2019, 60% of clients served by CLS were non-white (27% Black, 17% Hispanic, 5% Asian, 4% Native American, and 7% Other/Declined to Report).

CIVIL LEGAL SERVICES PANDEMIC RESPONSE




CLS quickly adjusted to the pandemic in the following ways:



CLS offices moved to a remote environment and continued to provide critical legal services to communities statewide.



CLS programs provided the technology and resources needed for staff to work remotely to safely provide services.





Although CLS programs adapted quickly and continued providing services, it became evident that the pandemic caused disproportionate harm to the client communities we serve.

LEGAL KIOSKS




To address the digital divide, the Minnesota Legal Services
Coalition requested CARES Act funds to give communities
access to civil justice by creating a statewide network of legal
kiosks to be stationed in a variety of court, agency, non-profit,
and other community locations.

These community-based legal kiosks will help Minnesotans who face technology access and transportation barriers to have a healthy and safe experience interacting with civil legal aid experts, as well as the administrative and court systems in which their cases will be proceeding.

To date, there is at least one Legal Kiosk placed in 68 of the 87 counties in Minnesota.
