What is Perpich

Thirty years ago Minnesota leaders made a bold decision to invest in arts education to impact student achievement, feed the state's economic engine and position Minnesota for global competition. This prompted the creation of the Minnesota Center for Arts Education (later named the Perpich Center for Arts Education). From its inception, the Perpich Center has offered consistent and essential leadership to rural, suburban and urban school districts on research-based, innovative models for the delivery of education in and through the arts.



The center is home to a public arts education library and a two-year, residential high school. Perpich experts also provide outreach with educational professional, curricular and standards development. All services are statewide. This conscious investment in arts education has had demonstrated impact toward the status Minnesota enjoys today as a national leader in education.





Perpich provides students and educators throughout Minnesota the opportunity to prepare for 21st century careers.

2016–17 Legislative Agenda

Perpich Center for Arts Education's services are more essential to the state than ever. We request that the Minnesota Legislature support the Governor's recommendation to add a 1.8% increase to our biennial base budget of \$13,546,000 and to add \$500,000 in FY16 and \$500,000 in FY17 for facility and instructional improvements. Additional support is requested for:

• Advancing business continuity and outreach work for rural school districts. Eighty-five percent of Minnesota school districts seek greater assistance from the Perpich Center. These funds incorporate expenses such as mandated compensation increases, fulfillment of the legislative mandate for district planning services, greater financial accessibility to the arts high school, direct services for rural school districts, mitigation of the achievement gap and quality arts education programs.

Recommendation: FY16 \$500,000; FY17 \$500,000.

• **Providing essential technology services** for improved infrastructure and equipment as identified by MN.IT several years ago. Unlike school districts, the agency cannot levy for technology monies. The current system is antiquated, does not address serious security issues, and prohibits innovative online classroom instruction.

Recommendation: FY16 \$649,000; FY17 \$431,000.


Making the case for our 2016-17 legislative request

The Perpich Center is a valuable asset to the state of Minnesota and to the nation.

- We are preparing Minnesota students for the future. Compelling research shows arts education improves student achievement, is one of the most effective means for mitigating the achievement gap, provides skills for the 21st century work with direct impact on economic development and prepares students for global competition.
- We are equipping Minnesota schools to increase their effectiveness as educators of Minnesota citizens. In 2010, we launched a ground-breaking program with 40 teachers and nine rural school districts in west central Minnesota (also now in southeastern and northeastern Minnesota), focused on collaborative arts integration. External evaluators found that students in arts integrated lessons are 4.4 times more likely to be highly thoughtful and highly engaged than in regular classroom instruction.
- We are national leaders in preparing students for postsecondary education. In 2011, The College Board presented Perpich Center with its first ever award for "Excellence and Innovation in the Arts." Now offered annually, this award honors the demonstrated improved college entrance test scores of students who have arts education as part of the school curriculum.
- We are committed to student success. The arts high school is consistent in reaching 100% graduation with 85% of graduates planning to seek college admissions. We effectively prepare students for life-long, fulfilling careers.
- We are a model for international educational leaders. Leaders from China, Brazil, Germany, France, Saudi Arabia, and Japan have visited Perpich Center to learn about arts education as part of their quest to improve achievement or prepare students for careers in the creative economy.
- We support educators throughout the state and stand ready to meet the demand for more. In 2013 we provided professional development services for 1,700 teachers in 258 school districts, connecting more than 340 teaching artists or arts organizations to educators. Eighty-five percent of school districts in Minnesota are requesting muchneeded resources from Perpich to: improve arts education in their schools, improve the training and performance of their teachers and raise the achievement of thousands of Minnesota students.
- We are a nationally recognized arts education institution. The Perpich Center's reputation for innovation resulted in Minnesota being selected by the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities to participate in the Turnaround Arts initiative, a national program targeting student achievement.
- We have research-based, ground-tested methods for reducing the achievement gap and can share them through teacher training. Our programs in outreach and program support allow the state to directly address the pernicious effects of the achievement gap by training teachers in cultural competence and the use of arts education to motivate and engage students
