1.4 APPROPRIATIONS

1.5 Section 1. APPROPRIATIONS.

1.6 The sums shown in the columns marked "Appropriations" are appropriated to the agencies
1.7 and for the purposes specified in this article and are added to or, if shown in parentheses,
1.8 are subtracted from the appropriations in Laws 2025, chapter 35, article 1, Laws 2025,
1.9 chapter 39, article 1, and Laws 2025, First Special Session chapter 8, article 1. The
1.10 appropriations are from the general fund, or another named fund, and are available for the
1.11 fiscal years indicated for each purpose. The figures "2026" and "2027" used in this article
1.12 mean that the appropriations listed under them are available for the fiscal year ending June
1.13 30, 2026, or June 30, 2027, respectively. "The first year" is fiscal year 2026. "The second
1.14 year" is fiscal year 2027. "The biennium" is fiscal years 2026 and 2027.

1.21 \$394,000 in the second year is to implement
1.22 safety and security measures. The base for this
1.23 appropriation is \$365,000 beginning in fiscal
1.24 year 2028.

3.1 to perform screening of individuals entering
 3.2 the State Capitol building.

3.3 **Subd. 4. Capitol Security Enhancements** -0- 4,454,000

3.4 This appropriation is for security
 3.5 enhancements on the Capitol complex,
 3.6 including but not limited to staffing,
 3.7 equipment, and operations. Of this amount,
 3.8 \$1,431,000 is for staffing and equipping costs
 3.9 of additional State Patrol personnel.

3.10 **Subd. 5. Base Adjustment**

3.11 The base for Capitol security is increased by
 3.12 \$5,416,000 in fiscal year 2028 and \$4,349,000
 3.13 in fiscal year 2029.

4.1 **ARTICLE 2**4.2 **CAPITOL SECURITY POLICY**

4.3 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 3.1985, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

4.4 Subdivision 1. **Definition.** As used in this section, "member expenses" means:

4.5 (1) compensation to members of the legislature, to include salary; payroll taxes; leadership
4.6 pay; employer-paid benefits or contributions offered through the state employee group
4.7 insurance program or the Minnesota State Retirement System; and any fees related to items
4.8 identified in this clause; and

4.9 (2) per diem and mileage costs associated with the conduct of legislative business by
4.10 members of the legislature, and housing, security, and communication costs for members,
4.11 as authorized by the house of representatives Committee on Rules and Legislative
4.12 Administration or the senate Committee on Rules and Administration.

4.13 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 299E.01, subdivision 2, is amended to read:

4.14 Subd. 2. **Responsibilities.** (a) The division is responsible and must utilize state employees
4.15 for security and public information services in state-owned buildings and state leased-to-own
4.16 buildings in the Capitol Area, as described in section 15B.02. It must provide personnel as
4.17 are required by the circumstances to ~~insure~~ ensure the orderly conduct of state business and
4.18 the convenience of the public. Until July 1, 2026, it must provide emergency assistance and
4.19 security escorts at any location within the Capitol Area, as described in section 15B.02,
4.20 when requested by a state constitutional officer.

4.21 (b) As part of the division permanent staff, the director must establish the position of
4.22 emergency manager that includes, at a minimum, the following duties:

4.23 (1) oversight of the consolidation, development, and maintenance of plans and procedures
4.24 that provide continuity of security operations;

4.25 (2) the development and implementation of tenant training that addresses threats and
4.26 emergency procedures; and

4.27 (3) the development and implementation of threat and emergency exercises.

4.28 (c) The director must provide a minimum of one state trooper assigned to the Capitol
4.29 complex at all times. The director and any state troopers assigned to the Capitol complex
4.30 must have current training in, or recent experience conducting, criminal investigations that
4.31 include identifying witnesses and report writing.

5.1 (d) The director, in consultation with the advisory committee under section 299E.04,
5.2 shall, at least annually, hold a meeting or meetings to discuss, among other issues, Capitol
5.3 complex security, emergency planning, public safety, and public access to the Capitol
5.4 complex. The meetings must include, at a minimum:

5.5 (1) Capitol complex tenants and state employees;

5.6 (2) nongovernmental entities, such as lobbyists, vendors, and the media; and

5.7 (3) the public and public advocacy groups.

5.8 (e) The division is the lead agency responsible for investigating alleged criminal offenses
5.9 that occur in state-owned buildings and state leased-to-own buildings, or on grounds
5.10 surrounding these buildings, within the Capitol Area. Another law enforcement agency may
5.11 assume responsibility for a criminal investigation under this paragraph if the director and
5.12 the chief law enforcement officer for the other agency agree, in writing, to transfer
5.13 responsibility for the investigation.

5.14 **Sec. 3. [299E.015] CAPITOL COMPLEX SECURITY; REPORTS.**

5.15 Subdivision 1. **Public report.** By January 15 of each year, the commissioner of public
5.16 safety must provide a public report on Capitol security. The report must be posted on the
5.17 department's public facing website. The public report must contain sufficient information
5.18 to support a public conversation on Capitol security while maintaining the integrity of the
5.19 state's security posture. The public report may include summary data, as defined in section
5.20 13.02, subdivision 19, and may consist of the executive summary of the report under
5.21 subdivision 2. The report must not contain descriptions of identified security vulnerabilities,
5.22 public and controlled access systems and pathways, staffing patterns, architectural constraints,
5.23 camera, alarm, and records technology systems, and other information the disclosure of
5.24 which would be likely to jeopardize the security of the Capitol buildings and the individuals
5.25 who work in and visit those spaces.

5.26 Subd. 2. **Not public report.** (a) By January 15 of each year, the commissioner of public
5.27 safety must report to the Advisory Committee on Capitol Area Security, the senate majority
5.28 leader, the senate minority leader, the speaker of the house, and the minority leader of the
5.29 house of representatives or, if there is no minority leader, the leader of the caucus that is
5.30 not represented by the speaker of the house on Capitol security. At a minimum, the report
5.31 must:

5.32 (1) describe how money appropriated for Capitol security was used in the previous year;

5.33 (2) detail any security incidents that occurred in the previous year;

- 6.1 (3) summarize the status of security staffing, use of technology, training, and other
6.2 security procedures;
- 6.3 (4) describe any identified security vulnerabilities and propose steps to eliminate or
6.4 mitigate those vulnerabilities; and
- 6.5 (5) make recommendations for changes in security policy and levels of funding.
- 6.6 (b) The report prepared under this section is security information as defined in section
6.7 13.37, subdivision 1, paragraph (a)."
- 6.8 Amend the title accordingly
