1.4 **UNCLAIMED PROPERTY; GENERAL**

1.5 Section 1. **[345A.101] DEFINITIONS.**

1.6 (1) For the purposes of this chapter, the terms defined in this section have the meanings  
1.7 given them.

1.8 (2) "Administrator" means the commissioner of commerce.

1.9 (3) "Administrator's agent" means a person with which the administrator contracts to  
1.10 conduct an examination under this chapter on behalf of the administrator. The term includes  
1.11 an independent contractor of the person and each individual participating in the examination  
1.12 on behalf of the person or contractor.

1.13 (4) "Affiliated group of merchants" means two or more affiliated merchants or other  
1.14 persons that are related by common ownership or common corporate control and that share  
1.15 the same name, mark, or logo. Affiliated group of merchants also applies to two or more  
1.16 merchants or other persons that agree among themselves, by contract or otherwise, to redeem  
1.17 cards, codes, or other devices bearing the same name, mark, or logo, other than the mark,  
1.18 logo, or brand of a payment network, for the purchase of goods or services solely at such  
1.19 merchants or persons. However, merchants or other persons are not considered affiliated  
1.20 merely because they agree to accept a card that bears the mark, logo, or brand of a payment  
1.21 network.

1.22 (5) "Apparent owner" means a person whose name appears on the records of a holder  
1.23 as the owner of property held, issued, or owing by the holder.

2.1 (6) "Business association" means a corporation, joint stock company, investment  
2.2 company, other than an investment company registered under the Investment Company Act  
2.3 of 1940, as amended, United States Code, title 15, sections 80a-1 to 80a-64, partnership,  
2.4 unincorporated association, joint venture, limited liability company, business trust, trust  
2.5 company, land bank, safe deposit company, safekeeping depository, financial organization,  
2.6 insurance company, federally chartered entity, utility, sole proprietorship, or other business  
2.7 entity, whether or not for profit.

2.8 (7) "District court" means Ramsey County District Court.

2.9 (8) "Domicile" means:

2.10 (A) for a corporation, the state of its incorporation;

2.11 (B) for a business association whose formation requires a filing with a state, other than  
2.12 a corporation, the state of its filing;

2.13 (C) for a federally chartered entity or an investment company registered under the  
2.14 Investment Company Act of 1940, as amended, United States Code, title 15, sections 80a-1  
2.15 to 80a-64, the state of its home office; and

2.16 (D) for any other holder, the state of its principal place of business.

2.17 (9) "Electronic" means relating to technology having electrical, digital, magnetic, wireless,  
2.18 optical, electromagnetic, or similar capabilities.

2.19 (10) "E-mail" means a communication by electronic means which is automatically  
2.20 retained and stored and may be readily accessed or retrieved.

2.21 (11) "Financial organization" means a savings and loan association, building and loan  
2.22 association, savings bank, industrial bank, bank, banking organization, or credit union.

2.23 (12) "Game-related digital content" means digital content that exists only in an electronic  
2.24 game or electronic-game platform. The term:

2.25 (A) includes:

2.26 i. game-play currency such as a virtual wallet, even if denominated in United States  
2.27 currency; and

2.28 ii. the following if for use or redemption only within the game or platform or another  
2.29 electronic game or electronic-game platform:

2.30 1. points sometimes referred to as gems, tokens, gold, and similar names; and

2.31 2. digital codes; and

3.1 (B) does not include an item that the issuer:

3.2 i. permits to be redeemed for use outside a game or platform for:

3.3 ii. money; or

3.4 iii. goods or services that have more than minimal value; or

3.5 iv. otherwise monetizes for use outside a game or platform.

3.6 (13) "Gift card" means:

3.7 (A) a stored-value card:

3.8 i. issued on a prepaid basis for a specified amount;

3.9 ii. the value of which does not expire;

3.10 iii. that is not subject to a dormancy, inactivity, or service fee;

3.11 iv. that may be decreased in value only by redemption for merchandise, goods, or services

3.12 upon presentation at a single merchant or an affiliated group of merchants;

3.13 v. that, unless required by law, may not be redeemed for or converted into money or

3.14 otherwise monetized by the issuer; and

3.15 (B) includes a prepaid commercial mobile radio service, as defined in Code of Federal

3.16 Regulations, title 47, section 20.3, as amended.

3.17 (14) "Holder" means a person obligated to hold for the account of, or to deliver or pay

3.18 to, the owner, property subject to this chapter.

3.19 (15) "Insurance company" means an association, corporation, or fraternal or

3.20 mutual-benefit organization, whether or not for profit, engaged in the business of providing

3.21 life endowments, annuities, or insurance, including accident, burial, casualty, credit-life,

3.22 contract-performance, dental, disability, fidelity, fire, health, hospitalization, illness, life,

3.23 malpractice, marine, mortgage, surety, wage-protection, and worker-compensation insurance.

3.24 (16) "Loyalty card" means a record given without direct monetary consideration under

3.25 an award, reward, benefit, loyalty, incentive, rebate, or promotional program which may

3.26 be used or redeemed only to obtain goods or services or a discount on goods or services.

3.27 Loyalty card does not include a record that may be redeemed for money or otherwise

3.28 monetized by the issuer.

3.29 (17) "Mineral" means gas, oil, coal, oil shale, other gaseous liquid or solid hydrocarbon,

3.30 cement material, sand and gravel, road material, building stone, chemical raw material,

3.31 gemstone, fissionable and nonfissionable ores, colloidal and other clay, steam and other

4.1 geothermal resources, and any other substance defined as a mineral by law of this state other  
4.2 than this chapter.

4.3 (18) "Mineral proceeds" means an amount payable for extraction, production, or sale of  
4.4 minerals, or, on the abandonment of the amount, an amount that becomes payable after  
4.5 abandonment. Mineral proceeds includes an amount payable:

4.6 (A) for the acquisition and retention of a mineral lease, including a bonus, royalty,  
4.7 compensatory royalty, shut-in royalty, minimum royalty, and delay rental;

4.8 (B) for the extraction, production, or sale of minerals, including a net revenue interest,  
4.9 royalty, overriding royalty, extraction payment, and production payment; and

4.10 (C) under an agreement or option, including a joint-operating agreement, unit agreement,  
4.11 pooling agreement, and farm-out agreement.

4.12 (19) "Money order" means a payment order for a specified amount of money. Money  
4.13 order includes an express money order and a personal money order on which the remitter  
4.14 is the purchaser.

4.15 (20) "Municipal bond" means a bond or evidence of indebtedness issued by a municipality  
4.16 or other political subdivision of a state.

4.17 (21) "Net card value" means the original purchase price or original issued value of a  
4.18 stored-value card, plus amounts added to the original price or value, minus amounts used  
4.19 and any service charge, fee, or dormancy charge permitted by law.

4.20 (22) "Nonfreely transferable security" means a security that cannot be delivered to the  
4.21 administrator by the Depository Trust Clearing Corporation or similar custodian of securities  
4.22 providing post-trade clearing and settlement services to financial markets or cannot be  
4.23 delivered because there is no agent to effect transfer. Nonfreely transferable security includes  
4.24 a worthless security.

4.25 (23) "Owner" means a person that has a legal, beneficial, or equitable interest in property  
4.26 subject to this chapter or the person's legal representative when acting on behalf of the  
4.27 owner. Owner includes:

4.28 (A) a depositor, for a deposit;

4.29 (B) a beneficiary, for a trust other than a deposit in trust;

4.30 (C) a creditor, claimant, or payee, for other property; and

4.31 (D) the lawful bearer of a record that may be used to obtain money, a reward, or a thing  
4.32 of value.

5.1 (24) "Payroll card" means a record that evidences a payroll card account as defined in  
5.2 Regulation E, Code of Federal Regulations, title 12, part 1005, as amended.

5.3 (25) "Person" means an individual, estate, business association, public corporation,  
5.4 government or governmental subdivision, agency, instrumentality, or other legal entity  
5.5 whether or not for profit.

5.6 (26) "Property" means tangible property described in section 345A.205 or a fixed and  
5.7 certain interest in intangible property held, issued, or owed in the course of a holder's business  
5.8 or by a government, governmental subdivision, agency, or instrumentality. Property:

5.9 (A) includes all income from or increments to the property;

5.10 (B) includes property referred to as or evidenced by:

5.11 i. money, virtual currency, interest, dividend, check, draft, deposit, or payroll card;

5.12 ii. a credit balance, customer's overpayment, stored-value card, security deposit, refund,  
5.13 credit memorandum, unpaid wage, unused ticket for which the issuer has an obligation to  
5.14 provide a refund, mineral proceeds, or unidentified remittance;

5.15 iii. a security except for:

5.16 1. a worthless security; or

5.17 2. a security that is subject to a lien, legal hold, or restriction evidenced on the records  
5.18 of the holder or imposed by operation of law, if the lien, legal hold, or restriction restricts  
5.19 the holder's or owner's ability to receive, transfer, sell, or otherwise negotiate the security;

5.20 iv. a bond, debenture, note, or other evidence of indebtedness;

5.21 v. money deposited to redeem a security, make a distribution, or pay a dividend;

5.22 vi. an amount due and payable under an annuity contract or insurance policy; and

5.23 vii. an amount distributable from a trust or custodial fund established under a plan to  
5.24 provide health, welfare, pension, vacation, severance, retirement, death, stock purchase,  
5.25 profit-sharing, employee savings, supplemental unemployment insurance, or a similar  
5.26 benefit; and

5.27 (C) does not include:

5.28 i. property held in a plan described in section 529A of the Internal Revenue Code, as  
5.29 amended, United States Code, title 26, section 529A;

5.30 ii. game-related digital content;

6.1 iii. a loyalty card;

6.2 iv. a gift card; or

6.3 v. money held or owing by a public pension fund enumerated in section 356.20,  
6.4 subdivision 2, or 356.30, subdivision 3; or covered by sections 69.77 or 69.771 to 69.776,  
6.5 if the plan governing the public pension fund includes a provision governing the disposition  
6.6 of unclaimed amounts of money.

6.7 (27) "Putative holder" means a person believed by the administrator to be a holder, until  
6.8 the person pays or delivers to the administrator property subject to this chapter or the  
6.9 administrator or a court makes a final determination that the person is or is not a holder.

6.10 (28) "Record" means information that is inscribed on a tangible medium or that is stored  
6.11 in an electronic or other medium and is retrievable in perceivable form. "Records of the  
6.12 holder" includes records maintained by a third party that has contracted with the holder.

6.13 (29) "Security" means:

6.14 (A) a security as defined in article 8 of the Uniform Commercial Code, section 336.8-102;

6.15 (B) a security entitlement as defined in article 8 of the Uniform Commercial Code,  
6.16 section 336.8-102, including a customer security account held by a registered broker-dealer,  
6.17 to the extent the financial assets held in the security account are not:

6.18 i. registered on the books of the issuer in the name of the person for which the  
6.19 broker-dealer holds the assets;

6.20 ii. payable to the order of the person; or

6.21 iii. specifically endorsed to the person; or

6.22 (C) an equity interest in a business association not included in subparagraph (A) or (B).

6.23 (30) "State" means a state of the United States, the District of Columbia, the  
6.24 Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, or any territory or insular  
6.25 possession subject to the jurisdiction of the United States.

6.26 (31) "Stored-value card" means a record evidencing a promise made for consideration  
6.27 by the seller or issuer of the record that goods, services, or money will be provided to the  
6.28 owner of the record to the value or amount shown in the record. Stored-value card:

6.29 (A) includes:

7.1 i. a record that contains or consists of a microprocessor chip, magnetic strip, or other  
 7.2 means for the storage of information, which is prefunded and whose value or amount is  
 7.3 decreased on each use and increased by payment of additional consideration; and

7.4 ii. a payroll card; and

7.5 (B) does not include a loyalty card, gift card, or game-related digital content.

7.6 (32) "Utility" means a person that owns or operates for public use a plant, equipment,  
 7.7 real property, franchise, or license for the following public services:

7.8 (A) transmission of communications or information;

7.9 (B) production, storage, transmission, sale, delivery, or furnishing of electricity, water,  
 7.10 steam, or gas; or

7.11 (C) provision of sewage or septic services, or trash, garbage, or recycling disposal.

7.12 (33) "Virtual currency" means a digital representation of value used as a medium of  
 7.13 exchange, unit of account, or store of value, which does not have legal tender status  
 7.14 recognized by the United States. Virtual currency does not include:

7.15 (A) the software or protocols governing the transfer of the digital representation of value;

7.16 (B) game-related digital content; or

7.17 (C) a loyalty card or gift card.

7.18 (34) "Worthless security" means a security whose cost of liquidation and delivery to the  
 7.19 administrator would exceed the value of the security on the date a report is due under this  
 7.20 chapter.

7.21 **Sec. 2. [345A.102] INAPPLICABILITY TO FOREIGN TRANSACTION.**

7.22 This chapter does not apply to property held, due, and owing in a foreign country if the  
 7.23 transaction out of which the property arose was a foreign transaction.

## 7.24 **ARTICLE 2**

### 7.25 **UNCLAIMED PROPERTY; PRESUMPTION OF ABANDONMENT**

7.26 **Section 1. [345A.201] WHEN PROPERTY PRESUMED ABANDONED.**

7.27 Subject to section 345A.210, the following property is presumed abandoned if it is  
 7.28 unclaimed by the apparent owner during the period specified below:

7.29 (1) a traveler's check, 15 years after issuance;

8.1 (2) a money order, seven years after issuance;

8.2 (3) cooperative property, including any profit distribution or other sum held or owing  
8.3 by a cooperative to a participating patron is presumed abandoned only if it has remained  
8.4 unclaimed by the owner for more than seven years after it became payable or distributable;

8.5 (4) a state or municipal bond, bearer bond, or original-issue discount bond, three years  
8.6 after the earliest of the date the bond matures or is called or the obligation to pay the principal  
8.7 of the bond arises;

8.8 (5) a debt of a business association, three years after the obligation to pay arises;

8.9 (6) demand, savings, or time deposit, including a deposit that is automatically renewable,  
8.10 three years after the later of the maturity or the date of the last indication of interest in the  
8.11 property by the apparent owner, except a deposit that is automatically renewable is deemed  
8.12 matured three years after its initial date of maturity unless the apparent owner consented to  
8.13 renewal in a record on file with the holder at or about the time of the renewal;

8.14 (7) money or a credit owed to a customer as a result of a retail business transaction, other  
8.15 than in-store credit for returned merchandise, three years after the obligation arose;

8.16 (8) an amount owed by an insurance company on a life or endowment insurance policy  
8.17 or an annuity contract that has matured or terminated, three years after the obligation to pay  
8.18 arose under the terms of the policy or contract or, if a policy or contract for which an amount  
8.19 is owed on proof of death has not matured by proof of the death of the insured or annuitant,  
8.20 as follows:

8.21 (A) with respect to an amount owed on a life or endowment insurance policy, the earlier  
8.22 of:

8.23 i. three years after the death of the insured; or

8.24 ii. two years after the insured has attained, or would have attained if living, the limiting  
8.25 age under the mortality table in which the reserve for the policy is based; and

8.26 (B) with respect to an amount owed on an annuity contract, three years after the date of  
8.27 the death of the annuitant;

8.28 (9) funds on deposit or held in trust for the prepayment of funeral or other funeral-related  
8.29 expenses, the earliest of:

8.30 (A) two years after the date of death of the beneficiary;

8.31 (B) one year after the date the beneficiary has attained, or would have attained if living,  
8.32 the age of 105 where the holder does not know whether the beneficiary is deceased; or



9.1 (C) 30 years after the contract for prepayment was executed;

9.2 (10) property distributable by a business association in the course of dissolution, one  
9.3 year after the property becomes distributable;

9.4 (11) property held by a court, including property received as proceeds of a class action,  
9.5 three years after the property becomes distributable;

9.6 (12) property held by a government or governmental subdivision, agency, or  
9.7 instrumentality, including municipal bond interest and unredeemed principal under the  
9.8 administration of a paying agent or indenture trustee, one year after the property becomes  
9.9 distributable;

9.10 (13) wages, commissions, bonuses, or reimbursements to which an employee is entitled,  
9.11 or other compensation for personal services, including amounts held on a payroll card, one  
9.12 year after the amount becomes payable;

9.13 (14) a deposit or refund owed to a subscriber by a utility, one year after the deposit or  
9.14 refund becomes payable; and

9.15 (15) property not specified in this section or sections 345A.202 to 345A.208, the earlier  
9.16 of three years after the owner first has a right to demand the property or the obligation to  
9.17 pay or distribute the property arises.

9.18 Notwithstanding any provision in this section to the contrary, and subject to section  
9.19 345A.210, a deceased owner cannot indicate interest in the owner's property. If the owner  
9.20 is deceased and the abandonment period for the owner's property specified in this section  
9.21 is greater than two years, then the property, excluding any amounts owed by an insurance  
9.22 company on a life or endowment insurance policy or an annuity contract that has matured  
9.23 or terminated, shall instead be presumed abandoned two years from the date of the owner's  
9.24 last indication of interest in the property.

9.25 **Sec. 2. [345A.202] WHEN TAX-DEFERRED RETIREMENT ACCOUNT**  
9.26 **PRESUMED ABANDONED.**

9.27 (a) Subject to section 345A.210, property held in a pension account or retirement account  
9.28 that qualifies for tax deferral under the income tax laws of the United States is presumed  
9.29 abandoned if it is unclaimed by the apparent owner after the later of:

9.30 (1) three years after the following dates:

10.1 (A) except as in subparagraph (B), the date a communication sent by the holder by  
10.2 first-class United States mail to the apparent owner is returned to the holder undelivered by  
10.3 the United States Postal Service; or

10.4 (B) if such communication is re-sent within 30 days after the date the first communication  
10.5 is returned undelivered, the date the second communication was returned undelivered by  
10.6 the United States Postal Service; or

10.7 (2) the earlier of the following dates:

10.8 (A) three years after the date the apparent owner becomes 70.5 years of age, if  
10.9 determinable by the holder; or

10.10 (B) one year after the date of mandatory distribution following death if the Internal  
10.11 Revenue Code, as amended, United States Code, title 26, section 1, et seq., requires  
10.12 distribution to avoid a tax penalty and the holder:

10.13 (i) receives confirmation of the death of the apparent owner in the ordinary course of  
10.14 its business; or

10.15 (ii) confirms the death of the apparent owner under subsection (b).

10.16 (b) If a holder in the ordinary course of its business receives notice or an indication of  
10.17 the death of an apparent owner and subsection (a)(2) applies, the holder shall attempt, not  
10.18 later than 90 days after receipt of the notice or indication, to confirm whether the apparent  
10.19 owner is deceased.

10.20 (c) If the holder does not send communications to the apparent owner of an account  
10.21 described in subsection (a) by first-class United States mail, the holder shall attempt to  
10.22 confirm the apparent owner's interest in the property by sending the apparent owner an  
10.23 e-mail communication not later than two years after the apparent owner's last indication of  
10.24 interest in the property; however, the holder promptly shall attempt to contact the apparent  
10.25 owner by first-class United States mail if:

10.26 (1) the holder does not have information needed to send the apparent owner an e-mail  
10.27 communication or the holder believes that the apparent owner's e-mail address in the holder's  
10.28 records is not valid;

10.29 (2) the holder receives notification that the e-mail communication was not received; or

10.30 (3) the apparent owner does not respond to the e-mail communication not later than 30  
10.31 days after the communication was sent.

11.1 (d) If first-class United States mail sent under subsection (c) is returned to the holder  
11.2 undelivered by the United States Postal Service, the property is presumed abandoned three  
11.3 years after the later of:

11.4 (1) except as in paragraph (2), the date a communication to contact the apparent owner  
11.5 sent by first-class United States mail is returned to the holder undelivered;

11.6 (2) if such communication is sent later than 30 days after the date the first communication  
11.7 is returned undelivered, the date the second communication was returned undelivered; or

11.8 (3) the date established by subsection (a)(2).

11.9 **Sec. 3. [345A.203] WHEN OTHER TAX-DEFERRED ACCOUNT PRESUMED**  
11.10 **ABANDONED.**

11.11 (a) Subject to section 345A.210 and except for property described in section 345A.202  
11.12 and property held in a plan described in section 529A of the Internal Revenue Code, as  
11.13 amended; United States Code, title 26, section 529A, property held in an account or plan,  
11.14 including a health savings account, that qualifies for tax deferral under the income tax laws  
11.15 of the United States is presumed abandoned if it is unclaimed by the apparent owner three  
11.16 years after the earlier of:

11.17 (1) the date, if determinable by the holder, specified in the income tax laws and  
11.18 regulations of the United States by which distribution of the property must begin to avoid  
11.19 a tax penalty, with no distribution having been made; or

11.20 (2) 30 years after the date the account was opened.

11.21 (b) If the owner is deceased, property subject to this section is presumed abandoned two  
11.22 years from the earliest of:

11.23 (1) the date of the distribution or attempted distribution of the property;

11.24 (2) the date the required distribution as stated in the plan or trust agreement governing  
11.25 the plan; or

11.26 (3) the date, if determinable by the holder, specified in the income tax laws of the United  
11.27 States by which distribution of the property must begin in order to avoid a tax penalty.

11.28 **Sec. 4. [345A.204] WHEN CUSTODIAL ACCOUNT FOR MINOR PRESUMED**  
11.29 **ABANDONED.**

11.30 (a) Subject to section 345A.210, property held in an account established under a state's  
11.31 Uniform Gifts to Minors Act or Uniform Transfers to Minors Act is presumed abandoned

12.1 if it is unclaimed by or on behalf of the minor on whose behalf the account was opened  
12.2 three years after the later of:

12.3 (1) except as in paragraph (2), the date a communication sent by the holder by first-class  
12.4 United States mail to the custodian of the minor on whose behalf the account was opened  
12.5 is returned undelivered to the holder by the United States Postal Service;

12.6 (2) if the communication is re-sent later than 30 days after the date the first  
12.7 communication is returned undelivered, the date the second communication was returned  
12.8 undelivered; or

12.9 (3) the date on which the custodian is required to transfer the property to the minor or  
12.10 the minor's estate in accordance with the Uniform Gifts to Minors Act or Uniform Transfers  
12.11 to Minors Act of the state in which the account was opened.

12.12 (b) If the holder does not send communications to the custodian of the minor on whose  
12.13 behalf an account described in subsection (a) was opened by first-class United States mail,  
12.14 the holder shall attempt to confirm the custodian's interest in the property by sending the  
12.15 custodian an e-mail communication not later than two years after the custodian's last  
12.16 indication of interest in the property; however, the holder promptly shall attempt to contact  
12.17 the custodian by first-class United States mail if:

12.18 (1) the holder does not have information needed to send the custodian an e-mail  
12.19 communication or the holder believes that the custodian's e-mail address in the holder's  
12.20 records is not valid;

12.21 (2) the holder receives notification that the e-mail communication was not received; or

12.22 (3) the custodian does not respond to the e-mail communication not later than 30 days  
12.23 after the communication was sent.

12.24 (c) If first-class United States mail sent under subsection (b) is returned undelivered to  
12.25 the holder by the United States Postal Service, the property is presumed abandoned three  
12.26 years after the later of:

12.27 (1) the date a communication to contact the custodian by first-class United States mail  
12.28 is returned to the holder undelivered by the United States Postal Service; or

12.29 (2) the date established by subsection (a)(3).

12.30 (d) When the property in the account described in subsection (a) is transferred to the  
12.31 minor on whose behalf an account was opened or to the minor's estate, the property in the  
12.32 account is no longer subject to this section.

13.1 Sec. 5. **[345A.205] WHEN CONTENTS OF SAFE DEPOSIT BOX PRESUMED**  
13.2 **ABANDONED.**

13.3 Tangible property held in a safe deposit box and proceeds from a sale of the property  
13.4 by the holder permitted by law of this state other than this chapter are presumed abandoned  
13.5 if the property remains unclaimed by the apparent owner five years after the earlier of the:

13.6 (1) expiration of the lease or rental period for the safe deposit box; or

13.7 (2) earliest date when the lessor of the safe deposit box is authorized by law of this state  
13.8 other than this chapter to enter the safe deposit box and remove or dispose of the contents  
13.9 without consent or authorization of the lessee.

13.10 Sec. 6. **[345A.206] WHEN STORED-VALUE CARD PRESUMED ABANDONED.**

13.11 (a) Subject to section 345A.210, the net card value of a stored-value card, other than a  
13.12 payroll card or a gift card, is presumed abandoned on the latest of three years after:

13.13 (1) December 31 of the year in which the card is issued or additional funds are deposited  
13.14 into it;

13.15 (2) the most recent indication of interest in the card by the apparent owner; or

13.16 (3) a verification or review of the balance by or on behalf of the apparent owner.

13.17 (b) The amount presumed abandoned in a stored-value card is the net card value at the  
13.18 time it is presumed abandoned.

13.19 (c) If a holder has reported and remitted to the administrator the net card value on a  
13.20 stored-value card presumed abandoned under this section and the stored-value card does  
13.21 not have an expiration date, then the holder must honor the card on presentation indefinitely  
13.22 and may then request reimbursement from the administrator under section 345A.605.

13.23 Sec. 7. **[345A.208] WHEN SECURITY PRESUMED ABANDONED.**

13.24 (a) Subject to section 345A.210, a security is presumed abandoned after the earlier of  
13.25 the following:

13.26 (1) three years after the date a communication sent by the holder by first-class United  
13.27 States mail to the apparent owner is returned to the holder undelivered by the United States  
13.28 Postal Service or if such communication is re-sent no later than 30 days after the first  
13.29 communication is returned, the date the second communication is returned undelivered to  
13.30 the holder by the United States Postal Service; or

14.1 (2) five years after the date of the apparent owner's last indication of interest in the  
14.2 security.

14.3 (b) If the holder does not send communications to the apparent owner of a security by  
14.4 first-class United States mail, the holder shall attempt to confirm the apparent owner's  
14.5 interest in the security by sending the apparent owner an e-mail communication not later  
14.6 than two years after the apparent owner's last indication of interest in the security; however,  
14.7 the holder promptly shall attempt to contact the apparent owner by first-class United States  
14.8 mail if:

14.9 (1) the holder does not have information needed to send the apparent owner an e-mail  
14.10 communication or the holder believes that the apparent owner's e-mail address in the holder's  
14.11 records is not valid;

14.12 (2) the holder receives notification that the e-mail communication was not received; or

14.13 (3) the apparent owner does not respond to the e-mail communication not later than 30  
14.14 days after the communication was sent.

14.15 (c) If first-class United States mail sent under subsection (b) is returned to the holder  
14.16 undelivered by the United States Postal Service, the security is presumed abandoned in  
14.17 accordance with subsection (a)(2).

14.18 (d) If a holder, in the ordinary course of business, receives notice or an indication of the  
14.19 death of an apparent owner, the holder shall attempt, not later than 90 days after receipt of  
14.20 the notice or indication, to confirm whether the apparent owner is deceased. Notwithstanding  
14.21 the standards set forth in subsections (a), (b), and (c), if the holder either receives  
14.22 confirmation of the death of the apparent owner in the ordinary course of business or confirms  
14.23 the death of the apparent owner under this subsection, then the property shall be presumed  
14.24 abandoned two years after the date of the owner's death.

14.25 **Sec. 8. [345A.209] WHEN RELATED PROPERTY PRESUMED ABANDONED.**

14.26 At and after the time property is presumed abandoned under this chapter, any other  
14.27 property right or interest accrued or accruing from the property and not previously presumed  
14.28 abandoned is also presumed abandoned.

14.29 **Sec. 9. [345A.210] INDICATION OF APPARENT OWNER INTEREST IN**  
14.30 **PROPERTY.**

14.31 (a) The period after which property is presumed abandoned is measured from the later:

- 15.1 (1) the date the property is presumed abandoned under sections 345A.201 to 345A.211;  
15.2 or
- 15.3 (2) the latest indication of interest by the apparent owner in the property.
- 15.4 (b) Under this chapter, an indication of an apparent owner's interest in property includes:
- 15.5 (1) a record communicated by the apparent owner to the holder or agent of the holder  
15.6 concerning the property or the account in which the property is held;
- 15.7 (2) an oral communication by the apparent owner to the holder or agent of the holder  
15.8 concerning the property or the account in which the property is held, if the holder or its  
15.9 agent contemporaneously makes and preserves a record of the fact of the apparent owner's  
15.10 communication;
- 15.11 (3) presentment of a check or other instrument of payment of a dividend, interest payment,  
15.12 or other distribution, or evidence of receipt of a distribution made by electronic or similar  
15.13 means, with respect to an account, underlying security, or interest in a business association.
- 15.14 (4) activity directed by an apparent owner in the account in which the property is held,  
15.15 including accessing the account or information concerning the account, or a direction by  
15.16 the apparent owner to increase, decrease, or otherwise change the amount or type of property  
15.17 held in the account;
- 15.18 (5) a deposit into or withdrawal from an account at a financial organization, except for  
15.19 an automatic debit or credit previously authorized by the apparent owner or an automatic  
15.20 reinvestment of dividends or interest; and
- 15.21 (6) subject to subsection (e), payment of a premium on an insurance policy.
- 15.22 (c) An action by an agent or other representative of an apparent owner, other than the  
15.23 holder acting as the apparent owner's agent, is presumed to be an action on behalf of the  
15.24 apparent owner.
- 15.25 (d) A communication with an apparent owner by a person other than the holder or the  
15.26 holder's representative is not an indication of interest in the property by the apparent owner  
15.27 unless a record of the communication evidences the apparent owner's knowledge of a right  
15.28 to the property.
- 15.29 (e) If the insured dies or the insured or beneficiary of an insurance policy otherwise  
15.30 becomes entitled to the proceeds before depletion of the cash surrender value of the policy  
15.31 by operation of an automatic premium loan provision or other nonforfeiture provision

16.1 contained in the policy, the operation does not prevent the policy from maturing or  
16.2 terminating.

16.3 (f) If the apparent owner has other property with the holder to which section 345A.201,  
16.4 paragraph (6), applies, the activity directed by the apparent owner toward any other accounts,  
16.5 including but not limited to loan accounts, at the financial organization holding an inactive  
16.6 account of the apparent owner shall be an indication of interest in all such accounts if:

16.7 (1) the apparent owner engages in one or more of the following activities:

16.8 (A) the apparent owner undertakes one or more of the actions described in subsection  
16.9 (b) regarding an account that appears on a consolidated statement with the inactive account;

16.10 (B) the apparent owner increases or decreases the amount of funds in any other account  
16.11 the apparent owner has with the financial organization; or

16.12 (C) the apparent owner engages in any other relationship with the financial organization,  
16.13 including payment of any amounts due on a loan; and

16.14 (2) the mailing address for the apparent owner in the financial organization's records is  
16.15 the same for both the inactive account and the active account.

16.16 **Sec. 10. [345A.211] KNOWLEDGE OF DEATH OF INSURED OR ANNUITANT.**

16.17 (a) In this section, "death master file" ("DMF") means the United States Social Security  
16.18 Administration Death Master File or other database or service that is at least as  
16.19 comprehensive as the United States Social Security Administration Death Master File for  
16.20 determining that an individual reportedly has died.

16.21 (b) With respect to a life or endowment insurance policy or annuity contract for which  
16.22 an amount is owed on proof of death, but which has not matured by proof of death of the  
16.23 insured or annuitant, the company has knowledge of the death of an insured or annuitant  
16.24 when:

16.25 (1) the company receives a death certificate or court order determining that the insured  
16.26 or annuitant has died;

16.27 (2) the company receives notice of the death of the insured or annuitant from the  
16.28 administrator or an unclaimed property administrator of another state, a beneficiary, a policy  
16.29 owner, a relative of the insured, a representative under the Probate Act of 1975, or an  
16.30 executor or other legal representative of the insured's or annuitant's estate and validates the  
16.31 death of the insured or annuitant;



17.1 (3) the company conducts a comparison for any purpose between a DMF and the names  
17.2 of some or all of the company's insureds or annuitants, finds a match that provides notice  
17.3 that the insured or annuitant has died, and validates the death; or

17.4 (4) the administrator or the administrator's agent conducts a comparison for the purpose  
17.5 of finding matches during an examination conducted under this chapter between a DMF  
17.6 and the names of some or all of the company's insureds or annuitants, and finds a match  
17.7 that provides notice that the insured or annuitant has died.

17.8 (c) A holder shall perform a comparison of its insureds' in-force policies, annuity  
17.9 contracts, and retained asset accounts against a DMF on at least a semiannual basis by using  
17.10 the full DMF once and thereafter using DMF updated files for future comparisons to identify  
17.11 potential matches of its insureds.

17.12 (d) A death master file match under subsection (b)(3) or (4) occurs if the criteria for an  
17.13 exact or partial match are satisfied.

17.14 (1) an exact match occurs when the Social Security number, first and last name, and  
17.15 date of birth contained in the holder's records matches exactly to the data contained in the  
17.16 DMF;

17.17 (2) a partial match occurs in any of the following circumstances:

17.18 (A) when the Social Security number contained in the data found in the holder's records  
17.19 matches exactly or in accordance with the fuzzy match criteria listed below to the Social  
17.20 Security number contained in the DMF, the first and last names match either exactly or in  
17.21 accordance with the fuzzy match criteria listed below, and the date of birth matches exactly  
17.22 or in accordance with the fuzzy match criteria listed below;

17.23 (B) when the holder's records do not include a Social Security number or where the  
17.24 Social Security number is incomplete or otherwise invalid, and there is a first name, last  
17.25 name, and date of birth combination in the holder's data that is a match against the data  
17.26 contained in the DMF where the first and last names match either exactly or in accordance  
17.27 with the fuzzy match criteria listed below and the date of birth matches exactly or in  
17.28 accordance with the fuzzy match criteria listed below;

17.29 (C) if there is more than one potentially matched individual returned as a result of the  
17.30 process described in paragraphs (A) and (B) above, the holder shall search the Social Security  
17.31 numbers obtained from the DMF for the potential matched individuals against Accurint for  
17.32 Insurance or an equivalent database. If a search of those databases shows that the DMF  
17.33 Social Security number is listed at the address in the holder's records for the insured, a

18.1 partial match will be considered to have been made only for individuals with a matching  
18.2 address;

18.3 (D) fuzzy match criteria includes the following:

18.4 (i) a first name fuzzy match includes one or more of the following: a nickname; an initial  
18.5 instead of a full first name; accepted industry standard phonetic name-matching algorithm;  
18.6 data entry mistakes with a maximum difference of one character with at least five characters  
18.7 in length; a first and last name are provided and cannot be reliably distinguished from one  
18.8 another; use of interchanged first name and middle name; a misused compound name; and  
18.9 the use of a "Mrs." in conjunction with a spouse's name where the date of birth and Social  
18.10 Security number match exactly and the last name matches exactly or in accordance with  
18.11 the fuzzy match criteria listed herein;

18.12 (ii) a last name fuzzy match includes one or more of the following: Anglicized forms  
18.13 of last names; compound last name; blank spaces in last name; accepted industry standard  
18.14 phonetic name-matching algorithm; a first and last name are provided and cannot be reliably  
18.15 distinguished from one another; use of apostrophe or other punctuation; data entry mistakes  
18.16 with a maximum difference of one character for last name with at least eight characters in  
18.17 length; and married female last name variations;

18.18 (iii) a date of birth fuzzy match includes one of the following: two dates with a maximum  
18.19 of two digits in difference, but only one entry mistake per full date is allowable; transposition  
18.20 of the month and date portion of the date of birth; if the holder's records do not contain a  
18.21 complete date of birth, then a fuzzy match date of birth will be found to exist where the data  
18.22 available in the holder's records does not conflict with the data contained in the DMF; if  
18.23 the holder provided a first and last name match, either exactly or in accordance with the  
18.24 fuzzy match criteria herein and the Social Security number matches exactly against the  
18.25 DMF, the date of birth is a fuzzy match if the holder provided a date of birth that is within  
18.26 two years of the DMF-listed date of birth;

18.27 (iv) a Social Security number fuzzy match includes one of the following: two Social  
18.28 Security numbers with a maximum of two digits in difference, any number position; two  
18.29 consecutive numbers are transposed; and the Social Security number is less than nine digits  
18.30 in length, but at least seven digits, and is entirely embedded within the other Social Security  
18.31 number;

18.32 (3) the DMF match does not constitute proof of death for the purpose of submission to  
18.33 an insurance company of a claim by a beneficiary, annuitant, or owner of the policy or  
18.34 contract for an amount due under an insurance policy or annuity contract;

19.1 (4) the DMF match or validation of the insured's or annuitant's death does not alter the  
19.2 requirements for a beneficiary, annuitant, or owner of the policy or contract to make a claim  
19.3 to receive proceeds under the terms of the policy or contract;

19.4 (5) an insured or an annuitant is presumed dead if the date of the person's death is  
19.5 indicated by the DMF match under either subsection (b)(3) or (4), unless the insurer has  
19.6 competent and substantial evidence that the person is living, including but not limited to a  
19.7 contact made by the insurer with the person or the person's legal representation.

19.8 (e) This chapter does not affect the determination of the extent to which an insurance  
19.9 company before the effective date of this chapter had knowledge of the death of an insured  
19.10 or annuitant or was required to conduct a DMF comparison to determine whether amounts  
19.11 owed by the company on a life or endowment insurance policy or annuity contract were  
19.12 presumed abandoned or unclaimed.

19.13 **Sec. 11. [345A.211] DEPOSIT ACCOUNT FOR PROCEEDS OF INSURANCE**  
19.14 **POLICY OR ANNUITY CONTRACT.**

19.15 If proceeds payable under a life or endowment insurance policy or annuity contract are  
19.16 deposited into an account with check or draft-writing privileges for the beneficiary of the  
19.17 policy or contract and, under a supplementary contract not involving annuity benefits other  
19.18 than death benefits, the proceeds are retained by the insurance company or the financial  
19.19 organization where the account is held, the policy or contract includes the assets in the  
19.20 account.

19.21 **ARTICLE 3**  
19.22 **UNCLAIMED PROPERTY; RULES FOR TAKING CUSTODY OF PROPERTY**  
19.23 **PRESUMED ABANDONED**

19.24 **Section 1. [345A.301] ADDRESS OF APPARENT OWNER TO ESTABLISH**  
19.25 **PRIORITY.**

19.26 In sections 345A.301 to 345A.307, the following rules apply:

19.27 (1) The last known address of an apparent owner is any description, code, or other  
19.28 indication of the location of the apparent owner which identifies the state, even if the  
19.29 description, code, or indication of location is not sufficient to direct the delivery of first-class  
19.30 United States mail to the apparent owner.

19.31 (2) If the United States postal zip code associated with the apparent owner is for a post  
19.32 office located in this state, this state is deemed to be the state of the last known address of

20.1 the apparent owner unless other records associated with the apparent owner specifically  
20.2 identify the physical address of the apparent owner to be in another state.

20.3 (3) If the address under paragraph (2) is in another state, the other state is deemed to be  
20.4 the state of the last known address of the apparent owner.

20.5 (4) The address of the apparent owner of a life or endowment insurance policy or annuity  
20.6 contract or its proceeds is presumed to be the address of the insured or annuitant if a person  
20.7 other than the insured or annuitant is entitled to the amount owed under the policy or contract  
20.8 and the address of the other person is not known by the insurance company and cannot be  
20.9 determined under section 345A.302.

20.10 **Sec. 2. [345A.302] ADDRESS OF APPARENT OWNER IN THIS STATE.**

20.11 The administrator may take custody of property that is presumed abandoned, whether  
20.12 located in this state, another state, or a foreign country, if:

20.13 (1) the last known address of the apparent owner in the records of the holder is in this  
20.14 state; or

20.15 (2) the records of the holder do not reflect the identity or last known address of the  
20.16 apparent owner, but the administrator has determined that the last known address of the  
20.17 apparent owner is in this state.

20.18 **Sec. 3. [345A.303] IF RECORDS SHOW MULTIPLE ADDRESSES OF APPARENT**  
20.19 **OWNER.**

20.20 (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), if records of a holder reflect multiple addresses  
20.21 for an apparent owner and this state is the state of the last known address, this state may  
20.22 take custody of property presumed abandoned, whether located in this state or another state.

20.23 (b) If it appears from records of the holder that the last known address of the apparent  
20.24 owner under subsection (a) is a temporary address and this state is the state of the next most  
20.25 recently recorded address that is not a temporary address, this state may take custody of the  
20.26 property presumed abandoned.

20.27 **Sec. 4. [345A.304] HOLDER DOMICILED IN THIS STATE.**

20.28 (a) Except as provided in subsection (b) or section 345A.302 or 345A.303, the  
20.29 administrator may take custody of property presumed abandoned, whether located in this  
20.30 state, another state, or a foreign country, if the holder is domiciled in this state, another state,  
20.31 or a governmental subdivision, agency, or instrumentality of this state and:

21.1 (1) another state or foreign country is not entitled to the property because there is no last  
21.2 known address of the apparent owner or other person entitled to the property in the records  
21.3 of the holder; or

21.4 (2) the state or foreign country of the last known address of the apparent owner or other  
21.5 person entitled to the property does not provide for custodial taking of the property.

21.6 (b) Property is not subject to custody of the administrator under subsection (a) if the  
21.7 property is specifically exempt from custodial taking under the law of this state, another  
21.8 state, or foreign country of the last known address of the apparent owner.

21.9 (c) If a holder's state of domicile has changed since the time the property was presumed  
21.10 abandoned, the holder's state of domicile in this section is deemed to be the state where the  
21.11 holder was domiciled at the time the property was presumed abandoned.

21.12 **Sec. 5. [345A.305] CUSTODY IF TRANSACTION TOOK PLACE IN THIS STATE.**

21.13 Except as provided in sections 345A.302 to 345A.304, the administrator may take custody  
21.14 of property presumed abandoned whether located in this state or another state if:

21.15 (1) the transaction out of which the property arose took place in this state;

21.16 (2) the holder is domiciled in a state that does not provide for the custodial taking of the  
21.17 property, except that if the property is specifically exempt from custodial taking under the  
21.18 law of the state of the holder's domicile, the property is not subject to the custody of the  
21.19 administrator; and

21.20 (3) the last known address of the apparent owner or other person entitled to the property  
21.21 is unknown or in a state that does not provide for the custodial taking of the property, except  
21.22 that if the property is specifically exempt from custodial taking under the law of the state  
21.23 of the last known address, the property is not subject to the custody of the administrator.

21.24 **Sec. 6. [345A.306] TRAVELER'S CHECK, MONEY ORDER, OR SIMILAR**  
21.25 **INSTRUMENT.**

21.26 The administrator may take custody of sums payable on a traveler's check, money order,  
21.27 or similar instrument presumed abandoned to the extent permissible under United States  
21.28 Code, title 12, sections 2501 through 2503, as amended.

22.1 Sec. 7. **[345A.307] BURDEN OF PROOF TO ESTABLISH ADMINISTRATOR'S**  
22.2 **RIGHT TO CUSTODY.**

22.3 Subject to this chapter, if the administrator asserts a right to custody of unclaimed  
22.4 property and there is a dispute concerning such property, the administrator has the initial  
22.5 burden to prove:

22.6 (1) the amount of the property;

22.7 (2) the property is presumed abandoned; and

22.8 (3) the property is subject to the custody of the administrator.

22.9 **ARTICLE 4**

22.10 **UNCLAIMED PROPERTY; REPORT BY HOLDER**

22.11 Section 1. **[345A.401] REPORT REQUIRED BY HOLDER.**

22.12 (a) A holder of property presumed abandoned and subject to the custody of the  
22.13 administrator shall report in a record to the administrator concerning the property. A holder  
22.14 shall submit an electronic report in a format prescribed by, and acceptable to, the  
22.15 administrator.

22.16 (b) A holder may contract with a third party to make the report required under subsection  
22.17 (a).

22.18 (c) Whether or not a holder contracts with a third party under subsection (b), the holder  
22.19 is responsible:

22.20 (1) to the administrator for the complete, accurate, and timely reporting of property  
22.21 presumed abandoned; and

22.22 (2) for paying or delivering to the administrator property described in the report.

22.23 Sec. 2. **[345A.402] CONTENT OF REPORT.**

22.24 (a) The report required under section 345A.401 must:

22.25 (1) be signed by or on behalf of the holder and verified as to its completeness and  
22.26 accuracy;

22.27 (2) be filed electronically, unless exception is granted, and be in a secure format approved  
22.28 by the administrator which protects confidential information of the apparent owner;

22.29 (3) describe the property;

23.1 (4) except for a traveler's check, money order, or similar instrument, contain the name,  
23.2 if known, last known address, if known, and Social Security number or taxpayer identification  
23.3 number, if known or readily ascertainable, of the apparent owner of property with a value  
23.4 of \$50 or more;

23.5 (5) for an amount held or owing under a life or endowment insurance policy or annuity  
23.6 contract, contain the name and last known address of the insured, annuitant, or other apparent  
23.7 owner of the policy or contract and of the beneficiary;

23.8 (6) for property held in or removed from a safe deposit box, indicate the location of the  
23.9 property, and where it may be inspected by the administrator;

23.10 (7) contain the commencement date for determining abandonment under sections  
23.11 345A.201 to 345A.211;

23.12 (8) state that the holder has complied with the notice requirements of section 345A.501;

23.13 (9) identify property that is a nonfreely transferable security and explain why it is a  
23.14 nonfreely transferable security; and

23.15 (10) contain other information prescribed by the administrator.

23.16 (b) A report under section 345A.401 may include in the aggregate items valued under  
23.17 \$50 each. If the report includes items in the aggregate valued under \$50 each, the  
23.18 administrator may not require the holder to provide the name and address of an apparent  
23.19 owner of an item unless the information is necessary to verify or process a claim in progress  
23.20 by the apparent owner.

23.21 (c) A report under section 345A.401 may include personal information as defined in  
23.22 section 345A.401(a) about the apparent owner or the apparent owner's property.

23.23 (d) If a holder has changed its name while holding property presumed abandoned or is  
23.24 a successor to another person that previously held the property for the apparent owner, the  
23.25 holder must include in the report under section 345A.401 its former name or the name of  
23.26 the previous holder, if any, and the known name and address of each previous holder of the  
23.27 property.

23.28 **Sec. 3. [345A.403] WHEN REPORT TO BE FILED.**

23.29 (a) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (b) and subject to subsection (c), the  
23.30 report under section 345A.401 must be filed before November 1 of each year and cover the  
23.31 12 months preceding July 1 of that year.

24.1 (b) Subject to subsection (c), the report under section 345A.401 to be filed by an insurance  
24.2 company must be filed before May 1 of each year for the immediately preceding calendar  
24.3 year.

24.4 (c) Before the date for filing the report under section 345A.401, the holder of property  
24.5 presumed abandoned may request the administrator to extend the time for filing. The  
24.6 administrator may grant an extension. If the extension is granted, the holder may pay or  
24.7 make a partial payment of the amount the holder estimates ultimately will be due. The  
24.8 payment or partial payment terminates accrual of interest on the amount paid.

24.9 **Sec. 4. [345A.404] RETENTION OF RECORDS BY HOLDER.**

24.10 A holder required to file a report under section 345A.401 shall retain records for ten  
24.11 years after the later of the date the report was filed or the last date a timely report was due  
24.12 to be filed, unless a shorter period is provided by rule of the administrator. The holder may  
24.13 satisfy the requirement to retain records under this section through an agent. The records  
24.14 must contain:

24.15 (1) the information required to be included in the report;

24.16 (2) the date, place, and nature of the circumstances that gave rise to the property right;

24.17 (3) the amount or value of the property;

24.18 (4) the last known address of the apparent owner, if known to the holder; and

24.19 (5) if the holder sells, issues, or provides to others for sale or issue in this state traveler's  
24.20 checks, money orders, or similar instruments, other than third-party bank checks, on which  
24.21 the holder is directly liable, a record of the instruments while they remain outstanding,  
24.22 indicating the state and date of issue.

24.23 **Sec. 5. [345A.405] PROPERTY REPORTABLE AND PAYABLE OR**  
24.24 **DELIVERABLE ABSENT OWNER DEMAND.**

24.25 Property is reportable and payable or deliverable under this chapter even if the owner  
24.26 fails to make demand or present an instrument or document otherwise required to obtain  
24.27 payment.



25.1 **ARTICLE 5**25.2 **UNCLAIMED PROPERTY; NOTICE TO APPARENT OWNER OF PROPERTY**  
25.3 **PRESUMED ABANDONED**25.4 **Section 1. [345A.501] NOTICE TO APPARENT OWNER BY HOLDER.**

25.5 (a) Subject to subsection (b), the holder of property presumed abandoned shall send to  
25.6 the apparent owner notice by first-class United States mail that complies with section  
25.7 345A.502 in a format acceptable to the administrator not more than 180 days nor less than  
25.8 60 days before filing the report under section 345A.401 if:

25.9 (1) the holder has in its records an address for the apparent owner which the holder's  
25.10 records do not disclose to be invalid and is sufficient to direct the delivery of first-class  
25.11 United States mail to the apparent owner; and

25.12 (2) the value of the property is \$50 or more.

25.13 (b) If an apparent owner has consented to receive e-mail delivery from the holder, the  
25.14 holder shall send the notice described in subsection (a) both by first-class United States
