QRIS is a systemic approach to:



Parent Aware (124D.142)

Parent Aware is Minnesota's QRIS

- Provides a set of Standards and Indicators, known as "kindergarten readiness best practices"
- Are based on research and public input
- Recognizes and rewards programs that use best practices
- Critical part of Minnesota's early care and education infrastructure


Parent Aware linkages

Linked to:

- Early Learning Scholarships (124D.165)
 - To accept scholarships, programs must have a Star Rating
- Child Care Assistance Program (119B.13)
 - 15% higher rate paid to programs with a Three-Star Rating
 - 20% higher rate paid to programs with a Four-Star Rating

Why quality care and education is important

Supports two important goals:

Support for families



School readiness for children



Who is eligible for Parent Aware?

Program types eligible:

- Licensed child care centers
- Licensed family child care providers
- Public school pre-kindergarten programs
- Head Start programs
- Combinations of above, through partnerships

Serve children 0 – 5

Voluntary

How do programs earn stars?

Flexible Framework:

Standards and Indicators describe best practices

Programs have flexibility in how they demonstrate quality

Programs show how they meet the Standards in the House Framework



Rating options for programs

Four rating pathways

- 1. Full: non-accredited, licensed child care programs
- 2. Accelerated: accredited, licensed child care programs and school-based pre-k meeting School Readiness standards
- 3. Automatic: Voluntary Pre-K and Head Start
- 4. Expedited: Rated child care centers with experienced directors that are expanding and opening new programs

Coaching and training



Training and coaching are available to help providers use best practices.

Quality improvement options for programs

Building Quality:

Option of 6 or 12 months

\$1,000 after completion

Proceed to Full-Rating process



Full-Rating:


6 months

6 – 15 hours of coaching support

Submit documentation

\$2500/\$3500 after 1-3 Star Rating

How Parent Aware helps parents



Lists all licensed programs with Star Rating

Developed with partners

Over 86,000 visitors in 2018

Consumer-friendly website

Of parents who had used the ParentAwareRatings.org website, 95 percent found it helpful and 84 percent found it easy to use. (Parent perceptions survey, 2015.)

Recent changes to Parent Aware

Continuous quality improvement is foundational to Parent Aware.

We tested **Parent Aware Star Ratings** to help *children do better*.

Parent Aware Validation Study

Other steps:

- Reviewed new research
- Asked for feedback from:
 - Early learning experts
 - Program leaders
 - Community leaders and advocates
 - Families

Recent changes to Parent Aware

What we learned:

Validation study:

Children made gains on critical school readiness skills Children in 3 and 4 Star Rated programs made greater gains Children in low-income families made greater gains

But we could still do better.


Recent changes to Parent Aware

Parent Aware was "remodeled".

- Updated Standards and Indicators
- Released October 2016
- Provided increased flexibility
 - More rating pathways
 - Flexible coaching options
 - Documentation options
 - Simplified training choices
 - More robust financial supports


Parent Aware rated programs

Number of Parent Aware rated programs, growth by year:





Percent Parent Aware rated programs, by program type:




Children served by Parent Aware rated programs

Children ages 0 – 5 in Parent Aware Rated programs, by program type:




Parent Aware rated programs


Children ages 0 – 5 in Parent Aware rated programs, by rating level:




Children served in Parent Aware Rated programs

Children receiving CCAP ages 0 - 5:

- As of July 2018, 10,360 attend a Rated program (54%)
- Up from 34% in 2014
- Goal: 65% of CCAP children ages
 0 5 in Parent Aware rated
 programs by 2021



Number of Rated, licensed child care programs by county



- 49 counties have 25% Rated or higher
- 18 counties have 10% Rated or lower
- 2 counties have no rated, licensed child care programs
