1.4 PROPERTY TAXES

1.5 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 272.02, is amended by adding a subdivision
1.6 to read:

1.7 Subd. 104. Certain property owned by an Indian tribe. Property is exempt that:

1.8 (1) is located in a county with a population greater than 28,000 but less than 29,000 as
1.9 of the 2010 federal census;

1.10 (2) was on January 2, 2016, and is for the current assessment owned by a federally
1.11 recognized Indian tribe or its instrumentality, that is located in Minnesota;

1.12 (3) was on January 2, 2016, erroneously treated as exempt under subdivision 7; and

1.13 (4) is used for the same purpose as the property was used on January 2, 2016.

1.14 EFFECTIVE DATE; APPLICATION. (a) This section is effective retroactively from
1.15 assessment year 2019.

1.16 (b) For assessment years 2019, 2020, and 2021, an exemption application under this
1.17 section must be filed with the county assessor by August 1, 2021. Property taxes paid on
1.18 property exempt under this section for taxes payable in 2020 and 2021 shall be refunded
1.19 by the county by September 1, 2021.

2.1 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 273.124, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

2.2 Subdivision 1. **General rule.** (a) Residential real estate that is occupied and used for
2.3 the purposes of a homestead by its owner, who must be a Minnesota resident, is a residential
2.4 homestead.

2.5 Agricultural land, as defined in section 273.13, subdivision 23, that is occupied and used
2.6 as a homestead by its owner, who must be a Minnesota resident, is an agricultural homestead.

2.7 Dates for establishment of a homestead and homestead treatment provided to particular
2.8 types of property are as provided in this section.

2.9 Property held by a trustee under a trust is eligible for homestead classification if the
2.10 requirements under this chapter are satisfied.

2.11 The assessor shall require proof, as provided in subdivision 13, of the facts upon which
2.12 classification as a homestead may be determined. Notwithstanding any other law, the assessor
2.13 may at any time require a homestead application to be filed in order to verify that any
2.14 property classified as a homestead continues to be eligible for homestead status.

2.15 Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, the Department of Revenue may, upon
2.16 request from an assessor, verify whether an individual who is requesting or receiving
2.17 homestead classification has filed a Minnesota income tax return as a resident for the most
2.18 recent taxable year for which the information is available.

2.19 When there is a name change or a transfer of homestead property, the assessor may
2.20 reclassify the property in the next assessment unless a homestead application is filed to
2.21 verify that the property continues to qualify for homestead classification.

2.22 (b) For purposes of this section, homestead property shall include property which is used
2.23 for purposes of the homestead but is separated from the homestead by a road, street, lot,
2.24 waterway, or other similar intervening property. The term "used for purposes of the
2.25 homestead" shall include but not be limited to uses for gardens, garages, or other outbuildings
2.26 commonly associated with a homestead, but shall not include vacant land held primarily
2.27 for future development. In order to receive homestead treatment for the noncontiguous
2.28 property, the owner must use the property for the purposes of the homestead, and must apply
2.29 to the assessor, both by the deadlines given in subdivision 9. After initial qualification for
2.30 the homestead treatment, additional applications for subsequent years are not required.

2.31 (c) Residential real estate that is occupied and used for purposes of a homestead by a
2.32 relative of the owner is a homestead but only to the extent of the homestead treatment that
2.33 would be provided if the related owner occupied the property. For purposes of this paragraph

3.1 and paragraph (g), "relative" means a parent, stepparent, child, stepchild, grandparent,
 3.2 grandchild, brother, sister, uncle, aunt, nephew, or niece. This relationship may be by blood
 3.3 or marriage. Property that has been classified as seasonal residential recreational property
 3.4 at any time during which it has been owned by the current owner or spouse of the current
 3.5 owner will not be reclassified as a homestead unless it is occupied as a homestead by the
 3.6 owner; this prohibition also applies to property that, in the absence of this paragraph, would
 3.7 have been classified as seasonal residential recreational property at the time when the
 3.8 residence was constructed. Neither the related occupant nor the owner of the property may
 3.9 claim a property tax refund under chapter 290A for a homestead occupied by a relative. In
 3.10 the case of a residence located on agricultural land, only the house, garage, and immediately
 3.11 surrounding one acre of land shall be classified as a homestead under this paragraph, except
 3.12 as provided in paragraph (d).

3.13 (d) Agricultural property that is occupied and used for purposes of a homestead by a
 3.14 relative of the owner, is a homestead, only to the extent of the homestead treatment that
 3.15 would be provided if the related owner occupied the property, and only if all of the following
 3.16 criteria are met:

3.17 (1) the relative who is occupying the agricultural property is a grandchild, child, sibling,
 3.18 ~~or parent, grandparent, stepparent, stepchild, uncle, aunt, nephew, or niece~~ of the owner of
 3.19 the agricultural property or of the spouse of the owner;

3.20 (2) the owner of the agricultural property must be a Minnesota resident;

3.21 (3) the owner of the agricultural property must not receive homestead treatment on any
 3.22 other agricultural property in Minnesota; and

3.23 (4) the owner of the agricultural property is limited to only one agricultural homestead
 3.24 per family under this paragraph.

3.25 Neither the related occupant nor the owner of the property may claim a property tax
 3.26 refund under chapter 290A for a homestead occupied by a relative qualifying under this
 3.27 paragraph. For purposes of this paragraph, "agricultural property" means the house, garage,
 3.28 other farm buildings and structures, and agricultural land.

3.29 Application must be made to the assessor by the owner of the agricultural property to
 3.30 receive homestead benefits under this paragraph. The assessor may require the necessary
 3.31 proof that the requirements under this paragraph have been met.

3.32 (e) In the case of property owned by a property owner who is married, the assessor must
 3.33 not deny homestead treatment in whole or in part if only one of the spouses occupies the

4.1 property and the other spouse is absent due to: (1) marriage dissolution proceedings, (2)
4.2 legal separation, (3) employment or self-employment in another location, or (4) other
4.3 personal circumstances causing the spouses to live separately, not including an intent to
4.4 obtain two homestead classifications for property tax purposes. To qualify under clause (3),
4.5 the spouse's place of employment or self-employment must be at least 50 miles distant from
4.6 the other spouse's place of employment, and the homesteads must be at least 50 miles distant
4.7 from each other.

4.8 (f) The assessor must not deny homestead treatment in whole or in part if:

4.9 (1) in the case of a property owner who is not married, the owner is absent due to
4.10 residence in a nursing home, boarding care facility, or an elderly assisted living facility
4.11 property as defined in section 273.13, subdivision 25a, and the property is not otherwise
4.12 occupied; or

4.13 (2) in the case of a property owner who is married, the owner or the owner's spouse or
4.14 both are absent due to residence in a nursing home, boarding care facility, or an elderly
4.15 assisted living facility property as defined in section 273.13, subdivision 25a, and the property
4.16 is not occupied or is occupied only by the owner's spouse.

4.17 (g) If an individual is purchasing property with the intent of claiming it as a homestead
4.18 and is required by the terms of the financing agreement to have a relative shown on the deed
4.19 as a co-owner, the assessor shall allow a full homestead classification. This provision only
4.20 applies to first-time purchasers, whether married or single, or to a person who had previously
4.21 been married and is purchasing as a single individual for the first time. The application for
4.22 homestead benefits must be on a form prescribed by the commissioner and must contain
4.23 the data necessary for the assessor to determine if full homestead benefits are warranted.

4.24 (h) If residential or agricultural real estate is occupied and used for purposes of a
4.25 homestead by a child of a deceased owner and the property is subject to jurisdiction of
4.26 probate court, the child shall receive relative homestead classification under paragraph (c)
4.27 or (d) to the same extent they would be entitled to it if the owner was still living, until the
4.28 probate is completed. For purposes of this paragraph, "child" includes a relationship by
4.29 blood or by marriage.

4.30 (i) If a single-family home, duplex, or triplex classified as either residential homestead
4.31 or agricultural homestead is also used to provide licensed child care, the portion of the
4.32 property used for licensed child care must be classified as a part of the homestead property.

4.33 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective beginning with property taxes payable
4.34 in 2022 and thereafter.

5.1 Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 273.124, subdivision 3a, is amended to read:

5.2 Subd. 3a. **Manufactured home park cooperative.** (a) When a manufactured home park
5.3 is owned by a corporation or association organized under chapter 308A or 308B, and each
5.4 person who owns a share or shares in the corporation or association is entitled to occupy a
5.5 lot within the park, the corporation or association may claim homestead treatment for the
5.6 park. Each lot must be designated by legal description or number, and each lot is limited to
5.7 not more than one-half acre of land.

5.8 (b) The manufactured home park shall be entitled to homestead treatment if all of the
5.9 following criteria are met:

5.10 (1) the occupant or the cooperative corporation or association is paying the ad valorem
5.11 property taxes and any special assessments levied against the land and structure either
5.12 directly, or indirectly through dues to the corporation or association; and

5.13 (2) the corporation or association organized under chapter 308A or 308B is wholly
5.14 owned by persons having a right to occupy a lot owned by the corporation or association.

5.15 (c) A charitable corporation, organized under the laws of Minnesota with no outstanding
5.16 stock, and granted a ruling by the Internal Revenue Service for 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status,
5.17 qualifies for homestead treatment with respect to a manufactured home park if its members
5.18 hold residential participation warrants entitling them to occupy a lot in the manufactured
5.19 home park.

5.20 (d) "Homestead treatment" under this subdivision means the classification rate provided
5.21 for class 4c property classified under section 273.13, subdivision 25, paragraph (d), clause
5.22 (5), ~~item (ii)~~, and the homestead market value exclusion under section 273.13, subdivision
5.23 35, does not apply.

5.24 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective beginning with property taxes payable
5.25 in 2022 and thereafter.

5.26 Sec. 4. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 273.124, subdivision 9, is amended to read:

5.27 Subd. 9. **Homestead established after assessment date.** Any property that was not
5.28 used for the purpose of a homestead on the assessment date, but which was used for the
5.29 purpose of a homestead on December ~~1~~ 31 of a year, constitutes class 1 or class 2a.

5.30 Any taxpayer meeting the requirements of this subdivision must notify the county
5.31 assessor, or the assessor who has the powers of the county assessor under section 273.063,
5.32 in writing, by December ~~15~~ 31 of the year of occupancy in order to qualify under this

6.1 subdivision. The assessor must not deny full homestead treatment to a property that is
6.2 partially homesteaded on January 2 but occupied for the purpose of a full homestead on
6.3 December ~~1~~ 31 of a year.

6.4 The county assessor and the county auditor may make the necessary changes on their
6.5 assessment and tax records to provide for proper homestead classification as provided in
6.6 this subdivision.

6.7 If homestead classification has not been requested as of December ~~15~~ 31, the assessor
6.8 will classify the property as nonhomestead for the current assessment year for taxes payable
6.9 in the following year, provided that the owner of any property qualifying under this
6.10 subdivision, which has not been accorded the benefits of this subdivision, may be entitled
6.11 to receive homestead classification by proper application as provided in section 375.192.

6.12 The county assessor may publish in a newspaper of general circulation within the county
6.13 a notice requesting the public to file an application for homestead as soon as practicable
6.14 after acquisition of a homestead, but no later than December ~~15~~ 31.

6.15 The county assessor shall publish in a newspaper of general circulation within the county
6.16 no later than December 1 of each year a notice informing the public of the requirement to
6.17 file an application for homestead by December ~~15~~ 31.

6.18 In the case of manufactured homes assessed as personal property, the homestead must
6.19 be established, and a homestead classification requested, by May 29 of the assessment year.
6.20 The assessor may include information on these deadlines for manufactured homes assessed
6.21 as personal property in the published notice or notices.

6.22 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective beginning with assessments in 2021.

6.23 Sec. 5. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 273.124, subdivision 13, is amended to read:

6.24 Subd. 13. **Homestead application.** (a) A person who meets the homestead requirements
6.25 under subdivision 1 must file a homestead application with the county assessor to initially
6.26 obtain homestead classification.

6.27 (b) The commissioner shall prescribe the content, format, and manner of the homestead
6.28 application required to be filed under this chapter pursuant to section 270C.30. The
6.29 application must clearly inform the taxpayer that this application must be signed by all
6.30 owners who occupy the property or by the qualifying relative and returned to the county
6.31 assessor in order for the property to receive homestead treatment.

7.1 (c) Every property owner applying for homestead classification must furnish to the
7.2 county assessor the Social Security number of each occupant who is listed as an owner of
7.3 the property on the deed of record, the name and address of each owner who does not occupy
7.4 the property, and the name and Social Security number of the spouse of each occupying
7.5 owner. The application must be signed by each owner who occupies the property and by
7.6 each owner's spouse who occupies the property, or, in the case of property that qualifies as
7.7 a homestead under subdivision 1, paragraph (c), by the qualifying relative.

7.8 If a property owner occupies a homestead, the property owner's spouse may not claim
7.9 another property as a homestead unless the property owner and the property owner's spouse
7.10 file with the assessor an affidavit or other proof required by the assessor stating that the
7.11 property qualifies as a homestead under subdivision 1, paragraph (e).

7.12 Owners or spouses occupying residences owned by their spouses and previously occupied
7.13 with the other spouse, either of whom fail to include the other spouse's name and Social
7.14 Security number on the homestead application or provide the affidavits or other proof
7.15 requested, will be deemed to have elected to receive only partial homestead treatment of
7.16 their residence. The remainder of the residence will be classified as nonhomestead residential.
7.17 When an owner or spouse's name and Social Security number appear on homestead
7.18 applications for two separate residences and only one application is signed, the owner or
7.19 spouse will be deemed to have elected to homestead the residence for which the application
7.20 was signed.

7.21 (d) If residential real estate is occupied and used for purposes of a homestead by a relative
7.22 of the owner and qualifies for a homestead under subdivision 1, paragraph (c), in order for
7.23 the property to receive homestead status, a homestead application must be filed with the
7.24 assessor. The Social Security number of each relative occupying the property and the name
7.25 and Social Security number of the spouse of a relative occupying the property shall be
7.26 required on the homestead application filed under this subdivision. If a different relative of
7.27 the owner subsequently occupies the property, the owner of the property must notify the
7.28 assessor within 30 days of the change in occupancy. The Social Security number of a relative
7.29 occupying the property or the spouse of a relative occupying the property is private data on
7.30 individuals as defined by section 13.02, subdivision 12, but may be disclosed to the
7.31 commissioner of revenue, or, for the purposes of proceeding under the Revenue Recapture
7.32 Act to recover personal property taxes owing, to the county treasurer.

7.33 (e) The homestead application shall also notify the property owners that if the property
7.34 is granted homestead status for any assessment year, that same property shall remain
7.35 classified as homestead until the property is sold or transferred to another person, or the

8.1 owners, the spouse of the owner, or the relatives no longer use the property as their
 8.2 homestead. Upon the sale or transfer of the homestead property, a certificate of value must
 8.3 be timely filed with the county auditor as provided under section 272.115. Failure to notify
 8.4 the assessor within 30 days that the property has been sold, transferred, or that the owner,
 8.5 the spouse of the owner, or the relative is no longer occupying the property as a homestead,
 8.6 shall result in the penalty provided under this subdivision and the property will lose its
 8.7 current homestead status.

8.8 (f) If a homestead application has not been filed with the county by December ~~15~~ 31,
 8.9 the assessor shall classify the property as nonhomestead for the current assessment year for
 8.10 taxes payable in the following year, provided that the owner may be entitled to receive the
 8.11 homestead classification by proper application under section 375.192.

8.12 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective beginning with assessments in 2021.

8.13 Sec. 6. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 273.13, subdivision 25, is amended to read:

8.14 Subd. 25. **Class 4.** (a) Class 4a is residential real estate containing four or more units
 8.15 and used or held for use by the owner or by the tenants or lessees of the owner as a residence
 8.16 for rental periods of 30 days or more, excluding property qualifying for class 4d. Class 4a
 8.17 also includes hospitals licensed under sections 144.50 to 144.56, other than hospitals exempt
 8.18 under section 272.02, and contiguous property used for hospital purposes, without regard
 8.19 to whether the property has been platted or subdivided. The market value of class 4a property
 8.20 has a classification rate of 1.25 percent.

8.21 (b) Class 4b includes:

8.22 (1) residential real estate containing less than four units, including property rented as a
 8.23 short-term rental property for more than 14 days in the preceding year, that does not qualify
 8.24 as class 4bb, other than seasonal residential recreational property;

8.25 (2) manufactured homes not classified under any other provision;

8.26 (3) a dwelling, garage, and surrounding one acre of property on a nonhomestead farm
 8.27 classified under subdivision 23, paragraph (b) containing two or three units; and

8.28 (4) unimproved property that is classified residential as determined under subdivision
 8.29 33.

8.30 For the purposes of this paragraph, "short-term rental property" means nonhomestead
 8.31 residential real estate rented for periods of less than 30 consecutive days.

9.1 The market value of class 4b property has a classification rate of 1.25 percent, except
9.2 that unclassified manufactured home property under clause (2) has a classification rate of
9.3 0.75 percent.

9.4 (c) Class 4bb includes:

9.5 (1) nonhomestead residential real estate containing one unit, other than seasonal
9.6 residential recreational property;

9.7 (2) a single family dwelling, garage, and surrounding one acre of property on a
9.8 nonhomestead farm classified under subdivision 23, paragraph (b); and

9.9 (3) a condominium-type storage unit having an individual property identification number
9.10 that is not used for a commercial purpose.

9.11 Class 4bb property has the same classification rates as class 1a property under subdivision
9.12 22.

9.13 Property that has been classified as seasonal residential recreational property at any time
9.14 during which it has been owned by the current owner or spouse of the current owner does
9.15 not qualify for class 4bb.

9.16 (d) Class 4c property includes:

9.17 (1) except as provided in subdivision 22, paragraph (c), real and personal property
9.18 devoted to commercial temporary and seasonal residential occupancy for recreation purposes,
9.19 for not more than 250 days in the year preceding the year of assessment. For purposes of
9.20 this clause, property is devoted to a commercial purpose on a specific day if any portion of
9.21 the property is used for residential occupancy, and a fee is charged for residential occupancy.
9.22 Class 4c property under this clause must contain three or more rental units. A "rental unit"
9.23 is defined as a cabin, condominium, townhouse, sleeping room, or individual camping site
9.24 equipped with water and electrical hookups for recreational vehicles. A camping pad offered
9.25 for rent by a property that otherwise qualifies for class 4c under this clause is also class 4c
9.26 under this clause regardless of the term of the rental agreement, as long as the use of the
9.27 camping pad does not exceed 250 days. In order for a property to be classified under this
9.28 clause, either (i) the business located on the property must provide recreational activities,
9.29 at least 40 percent of the annual gross lodging receipts related to the property must be from
9.30 business conducted during 90 consecutive days, and either (A) at least 60 percent of all paid
9.31 bookings by lodging guests during the year must be for periods of at least two consecutive
9.32 nights; or (B) at least 20 percent of the annual gross receipts must be from charges for
9.33 providing recreational activities, or (ii) the business must contain 20 or fewer rental units,

10.1 and must be located in a township or a city with a population of 2,500 or less located outside
10.2 the metropolitan area, as defined under section 473.121, subdivision 2, that contains a portion
10.3 of a state trail administered by the Department of Natural Resources. For purposes of item
10.4 (i)(A), a paid booking of five or more nights shall be counted as two bookings. Class 4c
10.5 property also includes commercial use real property used exclusively for recreational
10.6 purposes in conjunction with other class 4c property classified under this clause and devoted
10.7 to temporary and seasonal residential occupancy for recreational purposes, up to a total of
10.8 two acres, provided the property is not devoted to commercial recreational use for more
10.9 than 250 days in the year preceding the year of assessment and is located within two miles
10.10 of the class 4c property with which it is used. In order for a property to qualify for
10.11 classification under this clause, the owner must submit a declaration to the assessor
10.12 designating the cabins or units occupied for 250 days or less in the year preceding the year
10.13 of assessment by January 15 of the assessment year. Those cabins or units and a proportionate
10.14 share of the land on which they are located must be designated class 4c under this clause
10.15 as otherwise provided. The remainder of the cabins or units and a proportionate share of
10.16 the land on which they are located will be designated as class 3a. The owner of property
10.17 desiring designation as class 4c property under this clause must provide guest registers or
10.18 other records demonstrating that the units for which class 4c designation is sought were not
10.19 occupied for more than 250 days in the year preceding the assessment if so requested. The
10.20 portion of a property operated as a (1) restaurant, (2) bar, (3) gift shop, (4) conference center
10.21 or meeting room, and (5) other nonresidential facility operated on a commercial basis not
10.22 directly related to temporary and seasonal residential occupancy for recreation purposes
10.23 does not qualify for class 4c. For the purposes of this paragraph, "recreational activities"
10.24 means renting ice fishing houses, boats and motors, snowmobiles, downhill or cross-country
10.25 ski equipment; providing marina services, launch services, or guide services; or selling bait
10.26 and fishing tackle;

10.27 (2) qualified property used as a golf course if:

10.28 (i) it is open to the public on a daily fee basis. It may charge membership fees or dues,
10.29 but a membership fee may not be required in order to use the property for golfing, and its
10.30 green fees for golfing must be comparable to green fees typically charged by municipal
10.31 courses; and

10.32 (ii) it meets the requirements of section 273.112, subdivision 3, paragraph (d).

10.33 A structure used as a clubhouse, restaurant, or place of refreshment in conjunction with
10.34 the golf course is classified as class 3a property;

11.1 (3) real property up to a maximum of three acres of land owned and used by a nonprofit
11.2 community service oriented organization and not used for residential purposes on either a
11.3 temporary or permanent basis, provided that:

11.4 (i) the property is not used for a revenue-producing activity for more than six days in
11.5 the calendar year preceding the year of assessment; or

11.6 (ii) the organization makes annual charitable contributions and donations at least equal
11.7 to the property's previous year's property taxes and the property is allowed to be used for
11.8 public and community meetings or events for no charge, as appropriate to the size of the
11.9 facility.

11.10 For purposes of this clause:

11.11 (A) "charitable contributions and donations" has the same meaning as lawful gambling
11.12 purposes under section 349.12, subdivision 25, excluding those purposes relating to the
11.13 payment of taxes, assessments, fees, auditing costs, and utility payments;

11.14 (B) "property taxes" excludes the state general tax;

11.15 (C) a "nonprofit community service oriented organization" means any corporation,
11.16 society, association, foundation, or institution organized and operated exclusively for
11.17 charitable, religious, fraternal, civic, or educational purposes, and which is exempt from
11.18 federal income taxation pursuant to section 501(c)(3), (8), (10), or (19) of the Internal
11.19 Revenue Code; and

11.20 (D) "revenue-producing activities" shall include but not be limited to property or that
11.21 portion of the property that is used as an on-sale intoxicating liquor or 3.2 percent malt
11.22 liquor establishment licensed under chapter 340A, a restaurant open to the public, bowling
11.23 alley, a retail store, gambling conducted by organizations licensed under chapter 349, an
11.24 insurance business, or office or other space leased or rented to a lessee who conducts a
11.25 for-profit enterprise on the premises.

11.26 Any portion of the property not qualifying under either item (i) or (ii) is class 3a. The
11.27 use of the property for social events open exclusively to members and their guests for periods
11.28 of less than 24 hours, when an admission is not charged nor any revenues are received by
11.29 the organization shall not be considered a revenue-producing activity.

11.30 The organization shall maintain records of its charitable contributions and donations
11.31 and of public meetings and events held on the property and make them available upon
11.32 request any time to the assessor to ensure eligibility. An organization meeting the requirement
11.33 under item (ii) must file an application by May 1 with the assessor for eligibility for the

12.1 current year's assessment. The commissioner shall prescribe a uniform application form
12.2 and instructions;

12.3 (4) postsecondary student housing of not more than one acre of land that is owned by a
12.4 nonprofit corporation organized under chapter 317A and is used exclusively by a student
12.5 cooperative, sorority, or fraternity for on-campus housing or housing located within two
12.6 miles of the border of a college campus;

12.7 (5)(i) manufactured home parks as defined in section 327.14, subdivision 3, ~~excluding~~
12.8 including manufactured home parks ~~described in items (ii) and (iii), (ii) manufactured home~~

81.16 (1) a map showing the boundaries of the proposed district;

81.17 (2) the time and place of the public hearing;

81.18 (3) a statement that all interested persons will be given an opportunity to be heard at the
 81.19 hearing regarding the proposed service charge; and

81.20 (4) a brief description of the proposed activities, improvements, and service charge.

81.21 Subd. 3. **Business owner determination.** A business must provide ownership information
 81.22 to the municipality. A municipality has no obligation to obtain other information regarding
 81.23 the ownership of businesses, and its determination of ownership shall be final for the purposes
 81.24 of this chapter. If this chapter requires the signature of a business owner, the signature of
 81.25 the authorized representative of a business owner is sufficient.

81.26 Subd. 4. **Service charges; relationship to services.** (a) A municipality may impose a
 81.27 service charge on a business pursuant to this chapter for the purpose of providing activities
 81.28 and improvements that will provide benefits to a business that is located within the tourism
 81.29 improvement district and subject to the tourism improvement district service charge. Each
 81.30 business paying a service charge within a district must benefit directly or indirectly from
 81.31 improvements provided by a tourism improvement association, provided, however, the
 81.32 business need not benefit equally. Service charges must be based on a percent of gross

82.1 business revenue, a fixed dollar amount per transaction, or any other reasonable method
 82.2 based upon benefit and approved by the municipality.

82.3 (b) Service charges may be used to cover the costs of collections, as well as other
 82.4 administrative costs associated with operating, forming, or maintaining the district.

82.5 Subd. 5. **Public hearing.** At the public hearing regarding the adoption of the ordinance
 82.6 establishing a tourism improvement district, business owners and persons affected by the
 82.7 proposed district may testify on issues relevant to the proposed district. The hearing may
 82.8 be adjourned from time to time. The ordinance establishing the district may be adopted at
 82.9 any time within six months after the date of the conclusion of the hearing by a vote of the
 82.10 majority of the governing body of the municipality.

82.11 Subd. 6. **Appeal to district court.** Within 45 days after the adoption of the ordinance
 82.12 establishing a tourism improvement district, a person aggrieved, who is not precluded by
 82.13 failure to object before or at the public hearing, may appeal to the district court by serving
 82.14 a notice on the clerk of the municipality or governing body. The validity of the tourism
 82.15 improvement district and the service charge imposed under this chapter shall not be contested
 82.16 in an action or proceeding unless the action or proceeding is commenced within 45 days
 82.17 after the adoption of the ordinance establishing a tourism improvement district. The petitioner
 82.18 must file notice with the court administrator of the district court within ten days after its
 82.19 service. The clerk of the municipality must provide the petitioner with a certified copy of
 82.20 the findings and determination of the governing body. The court may affirm the action
 82.21 objected to or, if the petitioner's objections have merit, modify or cancel it. If the petitioner
 82.22 does not prevail on the appeal, the costs incurred shall be taxed to the petitioner by the court
 82.23 and judgment entered for them. All objections shall be deemed waived unless presented on

82.25 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

82.26 Sec. 6. **[428B.03] SERVICE CHARGE AUTHORITY; NOTICE; HEARING**
 82.27 **REQUIREMENT.**

82.28 Subdivision 1. **Authority.** A municipality may impose service charges to finance an
 82.29 activity or improvement in the tourism improvement district that is provided by the
 82.30 municipality if the activity or improvement is provided in the tourism improvement district
 82.31 at an increased level of service. The service charges may be imposed in the amount needed
 82.32 to pay for the increased level of service provided by the activity or improvement.

83.1 Subd. 2. Annual hearing requirement; notice. Beginning one year after the
 83.2 establishment of the tourism improvement district, the municipality must hold an annual
 83.3 hearing regarding continuation of the service charges in the tourism improvement district.
 83.4 The municipality must provide notice of the hearing by publication in the official newspaper
 83.5 at least seven days before the hearing. The municipality must mail notice of the hearing to

83.22 (8) a statement that the petition requirement of section 428B.07 has either been met or
 83.23 does not apply to the proposed service charge.

83.24 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

83.25 Sec. 7. [428B.04] MODIFICATION OF ORDINANCE.

83.26 Subdivision 1. Adoption of ordinance; request for modification. Upon written request
 83.27 of the tourism improvement association, the governing body of a municipality may adopt
 83.28 an ordinance to modify the district after conducting a public hearing on the proposed
 83.29 modifications. If the modification includes a change to the rate, method, and basis of
 83.30 imposing the service charge or the expansion of the tourism improvement district's geographic
 83.31 boundaries, a petition as described in section 428B.07 must be submitted by impacted
 83.32 business owners to initiate proceedings for modification.

84.1 Subd. 2. **Notice of modification.** A municipality must provide notice of the hearing by
 84.2 publication in at least two issues of the municipality's official newspaper. The two
 84.3 publications must be two weeks apart and the municipality must hold a hearing at least three
 84.4 days after the last publication. Not less than ten days before the hearing, the municipality
 84.5 must mail notice to the business owner of each business subject to the service charge by
 84.6 the tourism improvement district. The notice must include:

84.7 (1) a map showing the boundaries of the district;

84.8 (2) the time and place of the public hearing;

84.9 (3) a statement that all interested persons will be given an opportunity to be heard at the
 84.10 hearing regarding the proposed service charge; and

84.11 (4) a brief description of the proposed modification to the ordinance.

84.12 Subd. 3. **Hearing on modification.** At the public hearing regarding modification to the
 84.13 ordinance, a person affected by the proposed modification may testify on issues relevant to
 84.14 the proposed modification. Within six months after the conclusion of the hearing, the
 84.15 municipality may adopt the ordinance modifying the district by a vote of the majority of
 84.16 the governing body in accordance with the request for modification by the tourism
 84.17 improvement association and as described in the notice.

84.18 Subd. 4. **Objection.** If the modification of the ordinance includes the expansion of the
 84.19 tourism improvement district's geographic boundaries, the ordinance modifying the district
 84.20 may be adopted after following the notice and veto requirements in section 428B.08;
 84.21 however, a successful objection will be determined based on business owners who will pay
 84.22 more than 50 percent of the service charge in the expanded area of the district. For all other
 84.23 modifications, the ordinance modifying the district may be adopted following the notice
 84.24 and veto requirements in section 428B.08.

84.25 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

84.26 Sec. 8. **[428B.05] COLLECTION OF SERVICE CHARGES; PENALTIES.**

84.27 The service charges imposed under this chapter may be collected by the municipality,
 84.28 tourism improvement association, or other designated agency or entity. Collection of the
 84.29 service charges must be made at the time and in the manner set forth in the ordinance. The
 84.30 entity collecting the service charges may charge interest and penalties on delinquent payments
 84.31 for service charges imposed under this chapter as set forth in the municipality's ordinance.

84.32 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

85.1 Sec. 9. **[428B.06] TOURISM IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION.**

85.2 Subdivision 1. **Composition and duties.** The tourism improvement association must

85.18 A municipality may not establish a tourism improvement district under section 428B.02
85.19 unless impacted business owners file a petition requesting a public hearing on the proposed
85.20 action with the clerk of the municipality.

85.21 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

85.22 Sec. 11. **[428B.08] VETO POWER OF OWNERS.**

85.23 Subdivision 1. **Notice of right to file objections.** The effective date of an ordinance or
85.24 resolution adopted under this chapter must be at least 45 days after it is adopted by the
85.25 municipality. Within five days after the municipality adopts the ordinance or resolution,
85.26 the municipality must mail a summary of the ordinance or resolution to each business owner

86.8 Subdivision 1. **Procedure for disestablishment.** An ordinance adopted under this chapter
86.9 must provide a 30-day period each year in which business owners subject to the service
86.10 charge may request disestablishment of the district. Beginning one year after establishment
86.11 of the tourism improvement district, an annual 30-day period of disestablishment begins
86.12 with the anniversary of the date of establishment. Upon submission of a petition from
86.13 impacted business owners, the municipality may disestablish a tourism improvement district
86.14 by adopting an ordinance after holding a public hearing on the disestablishment. Prior to
86.15 the public hearing, the municipality must publish notice of the public hearing on

86.23 hearing regarding disestablishment;

86.24 (3) the reason for disestablishment; and

86.25 (4) a proposal to dispose of any assets acquired with the revenues of the service charge
86.26 imposed under the tourism improvement district.

86.27 Subd. 2. **Objection.** An ordinance disestablishing the tourism improvement district
86.28 becomes effective following the notice and veto requirements in section 428B.08.

86.29 Subd. 3. **Refund to business owners.** (a) Upon the disestablishment of a tourism
86.30 improvement district, any remaining revenues derived from the service charge, or any
86.31 revenues derived from the sale of assets acquired with the service charge revenues, shall
86.32 be refunded to business owners located and operating within the tourism improvement

87.1 district in which service charges were imposed by applying the same method and basis that
 87.2 was used to calculate the service charges levied in the fiscal year in which the district is
 87.3 disestablished.

87.4 (b) If the disestablishment occurs before the service charge is imposed for the fiscal
 87.5 year, the method and basis that was used to calculate the service charge imposed in the
 87.6 immediate prior fiscal year shall be used to calculate the amount of a refund, if any.

87.7 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

87.8 **Sec. 13. [428B.10] COORDINATION OF DISTRICTS.**

87.9 If a county establishes a tourism improvement district in a city or town under this chapter,
 87.10 a city or town may not establish a tourism improvement district in the part of the city or
 87.11 town located in the county-established district. If a city or town establishes a tourism
 87.12 improvement district under this chapter, a county may not establish a tourism improvement
 87.13 district in the part of the city or town located in the city- or town-established district.

87.14 **Sec. 14. 4D AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROGRAMS REPORT.**

87.15 (a) No later than January 15, 2022, the commissioner of revenue, in consultation with
 87.16 the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency, must produce a report on class 4d property, as

- 88.5 rate of the 4d classification was reduced from 0.75 percent to 0.25 percent;

- 88.8 classified as 4d rather than 4a;
