

Minnesota's population at-a-glance

- Minnesota's 2018 population was estimated to be 5,611,179
- Minnesota's population grew 5.8% between 2010 and 2018, adding 307,254 residents.


Population Growth, 2010-2018



How might Minnesota congressional districts change if the state were to lose a seat?



Majority of the growth (83%) occurred in 7-county metro


- MN grew by 274,000 in 7 years


Political representation at the **state-level**, also based on census counts



Minnesota's labor force growth is projected to slow further over the next 10 years





All Ages: Net in-migration to Minnesota has increased in the past two years




International Net

Population by age and sex Minnesota, 2015




