


Since 1996, MICC has provided transformative education and training for **autistic and neurodivergent adults** to live independently, work purposefully and **thrive in community**.

MICC has cultivated a broad network of public and private **partnerships** to ensure accessibility to our programs and **opportunities** for students/participants across Minnesota.

Within our innovative frame work of handson, skills-based learning and caring
guidance, MICC students/participants
accomplish things they never imagined, from
performing daily living tasks and building
self-sufficiency to developing and
sustaining a career, support system and
lifelong relationships. MICC students/
participants begin to see themselves in a new
light, gaining the confidence they need to
build the lives they want to live.

Autism Spectrum Disorder

- 1 in 36 children in Minnesota are diagnosed.
- 1 in 44 children in the U.S. are diagnosed.
- Males are currently 4.2x more likely to be diagnosed than females.

Minnesota's Growing Need

The number of children in Minnesota diagnosed with autism who are receiving special education services in the public school system increased by 138% since 2009 (MN Dept of Edu). This alarming increase is compounded by a lack of resources for autistic high school galactes.

- Only 1/3 have any postsecondary education, and less than half hold any paid employment within four years of graduating from high school.
- 87% continue living with parents after high school, and 24% are considered socially isolated.
- According to Drexel University, young adults with autism spectrum disorders have the lowest employment rate across disabilities, with some studies showing unemployment rates as high as 66%-85%.

At MICC

A lack of access to education, unemployment, and social isolation is not the reality of participants at MICC. Today, 95% of eligible participants are competitively employed. 100% of MICC community participants are living on their own, and 87% report having a strong social network.

Our Vision

A world where autistic and neurodivergent adults thrive, are accepted and valued.

MICC is paving a new path of possibilities for students/participants, the State of Minnesota and the disability community at large.

Bonding Request 2025 of \$11 million

We are asking for \$11 million to build a 27,000+ square foot innovative building. Our vibrant plans for new programmatic space include the following:

- Appropriate teaching and socializing areas to allow students to engage authentically with peers.
- Flexible classrooms designed for small and large group engagement, integrated technology and multi-purpose furniture, as well as space for physical fitness, yoga and meditation areas.
- Student support spaces for advisory services on continued education and employment,
- Staff offices promoting cross-department collaboration and flexibility for our expanding team.

Bonding Preparation

- Purchase of 1.38 acres in Richfield, MN.
- Collaborating with the City of Richfield to ensure project aligns with their 2040 plan.
- Launched a \$7M capital campaign in March 2023 to engage public & private support. with \$3.5M raised to date for the \$18M project.
- Selected development partners RSP, NTH, and Ancoats Construction.



The Need for Bonding Support

MICC has rapidly outgrown every space currently utilized by capacity and design.

- Facilities have now become the most significant barrier to serving current and future participants.
- Zero programmatic space is available for developing new programs to serve more.
- Current spaces are inaccessible, inefficient, and disjointed for program collaboration and resource sharing.
- Participants and staff deserve accessible classrooms and gathering spaces, positive sensory experiences and well-equipped facilities to deliver high-quality programming.
