Why the Minnesota Zoo Matters to Minnesota

- **Economic engine:** \$320M annual impact
- **Minnesota's top year-round gated attraction:** 1.4M visitors statewide
- **Unique state agency:** Only 36% state-funded
- **Education & access:** 83K students from 1,000 schools, Free to Explore program, and reach to all 87 counties
- **State reputation:** AZA-accredited, nationally recognized for Conservation and Education programs


This is a major state asset that largely pays for itself - but its infrastructure does not.



Decades of Deferred Maintenance Now Create Safety and Operational Risk

- Among the worst facility condition ratings of all state agencies
- 1/3 of 125 structures in poor or crisis condition
- \$78M facilities backlog that continues to grow (not including grounds)
- Elevated risk to visitors, staff, and animals


At this stage, the risk is not whether something will fail - it's whether we fix it in a planned way or through emergency spending.

Human & Animal Safety Risk

The Zoo has the **worst incident rate of all state agencies** according to MnSAFE FY26 Q1 results.



Zoo incident rates compared to all state agencies 2019 - 2025

58% increase in incidents among staff performing animal care work since 2017

65 total incidents among staff performing animal care & animal health work in the last 12 months

Staff incidents = USDA/OSHA/AZA regulation risk

Governor's Recommendation: \$4,000,000

- The Governor's bonding recommendation for the Zoo includes \$4M, which we deeply appreciate
- Those dollars will go to the highest-risk systems:
 - Utilities
 - Life support
 - Roofs
 - And emergency issues that cannot wait



Emergency Renovation: \$6,000,000

- The Zoo's top priority is building a modern, fully functional Animal Hospital
- Thanks to \$11M in state support last year, and over \$12M in private contributions, we've made significant progress
- But the project is still \$6M short for a complete facility



The current facility was built in 1975 and lacks essential infrastructure to meet USDA and modern veterinary standards, posing risks to both animals and humans.



Emergency Renovation: \$6,000,000

- Because of the urgent need for a new hospital, we are building the new facility on a smaller footprint, attached to the existing Animal Hospital in A-Building
- This new hospital will accommodate the essential medical functions but does not include space for staff offices, storage, or administrative functions
- A-Building, the oldest building on campus, must be renovated to support these critical hospital staffing needs



Deteriorating animal holding spaces in A-Building make it impossible to properly house animals for treatment.

Emergency Renovation: \$6,000,000

- **\$6M in asset preservation is urgently needed to fund renovation** of A-Building's envelope, systems, and workspaces to remove asbestos, meet code requirements, and serve the Zoo's needs going forward
- Without this renovation, the state's investment in the new Animal Hospital cannot operate as intended, and the Zoo cannot provide the level of care our animals require

Completing A-Building is not optional—it's essential to ensuring that the new Animal Hospital fulfills its purpose for animal care, staff operations, and the safety of all on campus.
