1.5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.6	Section 1. [144.2925] CONSTRUCTION.
1.7	Sections 144.293 to 144.297 shall be construed to protect the privacy of a patient's health
1.8	records in a more stringent manner than provided in Code of Federal Regulations, title 45,
1.9	part 164. For purposes of this section, "more stringent" has the meaning given to that term
1.10	in Code of Federal Regulations, title 45, section 160.202, with respect to a use or disclosure
1.11	or the need for express legal permission from an individual to disclose individually
1.12	identifiable health information.
1.13	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.
1.14	Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 144.293, subdivision 2, is amended to read:
1.15	Subd. 2. Patient consent to release of records. A provider, or a person who receives
1.16	health records from a provider, may not release a patient's health records to a person without:
1.17	(1) a signed and dated consent from the patient or the patient's legally authorized
1.18	representative authorizing the release;
1.19	(2) specific authorization in Minnesota law; or

(3) a representation from a provider that holds a signed and dated consent from the

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patient authorizing the release.

2.2	applies to health records released on or after that date.

2.4	Subd. 4. Duration of consent. Except as provided in this section, a consent is valid for
2.5	one year or for a period specified in the consent or for a different period provided by
2.6	Minnesota law.
2.7	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment and
2.8	applies to health records released on or after that date.
2.9	Sec. 4. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 144.293, subdivision 9, is amended to read:
2.10	Subd. 9. Documentation of release. (a) In cases where a provider releases health records
2.11	without patient consent as authorized by Minnesota law, the release must be documented
2.12	in the patient's health record. In the case of a release under section 144.294, subdivision 2,
2.13	the documentation must include the date and circumstances under which the release was
2.14	made, the person or agency to whom the release was made, and the records that were released.
2.15	(b) When a health record is released using a representation from a provider that holds a
2.16	consent from the patient, the releasing provider shall document:
2.17	(1) the provider requesting the health records;
2.18	(2) the identity of the patient;
2.19	(3) the health records requested; and
2.20	(4) the date the health records were requested.
2.21	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment and
2.22	applies to health records released on or after that date.

2.25	requesting health records using consent, a person warrants that the consent:

2.27	(2) accurately states the patient's desire to have health records disclosed or that there is
2.28	specific authorization in Minnesota law.

- 3.7 (c) When disclosing health records, a person releasing health records warrants that the person:
- (1) has complied with the requirements of this section regarding disclosure of healthrecords;
 - (2) knows of no information related to the request that is false; and
- 3.12 (3) has complied with the limits set by the patient in the consent.
- 3.13 <u>EFFECTIVE DATE.</u> This section is effective the day following final enactment and applies to health records released on or after that date.

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
